# PUBLIC STATUTES OF THE SESSION.

TWENTY-FOURTH PARLIAMENT—FOURTH SESSION.

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## AMBULANCE TRANSPORT SERVICE ACT (GEO. V, No. 5, 1919)—

An Act to make better provision for rendering first aid to, and for the transport of sick and injured persons, and for that purpose to establish a board with certain powers and duties; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. D. Storey, 10 September, 1919. Assented to, 10 November, 1919.]

## APPROPRIATION ACT (GEO. V, No. 2, 1919)—

An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain sums to make good the supplies granted for the service of the year from the 1st day of July, 1919, to the 30th day of June, 1920 (inclusive of both dates); to adjust the vote "Advance to Treasurer," 1918-19, Consolidated Revenue Fund, for supplementary charges during the period from the 1st day of July, 1918, to the 30th day of June, 1919 (inclusive of both dates); to cover payments "Unauthorised in Suspense," Consolidated Revenue Fund, for urgent claims on account of services of the year 1918-19; to provide for public works and other services out of the Public Works Fund; and to provide for services out of the Closer Settlement Fund; and for purposes connected with and incidental to the above objects. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. J. C. L. Fitzpatrick, 26 September, 1919. Assented to, 3 October, 1919.]

## BALLINA TO BOOYONG RAILWAY ACT (GEO. V, No. 24, 1919)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a line of railway from Ballina to Booyong; to provide for the use of the said line during construction; to authorise the construction of the said line on, along, or by the side of any road or highway; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 5 November, 1919. Assented to, 5 December, 1919.]

## BILLS OF SALE (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 17, 1919)—

An Act to make provision with regard to the discharge of bills of sale; to remove certain anomalies in regard to the protection afforded by a bill of sale; and to amend the Bills of Sale Act of 1898, and the Small Debts Recovery Act, 1912. [Initiated in the Council by the Hon. J. Garland, 28 August, 1919. Assented to, 3 December, 1919.]

## BROUGHTON HALL AND COAST HOSPITAL EXTENSIONS CONSTRUCTION ACT (GEO. V, No. 7, 1919)—

An Act to sanction the construction of extensions to Broughton Hall and the Coast Hospital; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon and incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 5 September, 1919. Assented to, 20 November, 1919.]

## CLARENCE RIVER (NORTHERN BREAKWATER) ACT (GEO. V, No. 19, 1919)—

An Act to sanction the construction of a breakwater on the northern side of the entrance to the Clarence River; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 7 October, 1919. Assented to, 5 December, 1919.]

**CLOSER SETTLEMENT (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 46, 1919)—**

An Act to extend the provisions of the Closer Settlement Acts; to make further provision for the purchase by discharged soldiers and sailors of certain tenures under the Crown Lands Acts; to limit the commission which may be charged by agents on certain sales of land; to amend the Acts relating to closer settlement; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ashford, 12 November, 1919. Assented to, 22 December, 1919.]

**COBAR WATER SUPPLY (REDUCTION OF DEBT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 4, 1919)—**

An Act to write off a part of the debt of the Council of the Municipality of Cobar, in respect of works of water supply. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 5 September, 1919. Assented to, 10 November, 1919.]

**CONVEYANCING ACT (GEO. V, No. 6, 1919)—**

An Act to amend and consolidate the law of property and to simplify and improve the practice of conveyancing; and for such purposes to amend certain Acts relating thereto. [Initiated in the Council by the Hon. J. Garland, August, 1919. Assented to, 13 November, 1919.]

**CROWN LANDS (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 44, 1919)—**

An Act to amend and declare the law relating to Crown lands; to amend the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913, and the Crown Lands (Amendment) Act, 1917; and for other purposes. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ashford, 7 October, 1919. Assented to, 22 December, 1919.]

**EARLY CLOSING (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 49, 1919)—**

An Act to regulate the times of closing of hairdressers' and tobacconists' shops and chemists' and druggists' shops, and public and private dispensaries; to prohibit night baking; for the above purposes to amend the Acts relating to early closing, the Saturday Half-holiday Act, 1910, and the Bread Act, 1901; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. James, 27 November, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]

**FIRE BRIGADES (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 40, 1919)—**

An Act to further amend the Fire Brigades Act, 1909. [Initiated in the Assembly by Sir George Fuller, 3 December, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]

**GILMORE TO BATLOW RAILWAY ACT (GEO. V, No. 20, 1919)—**

An Act to sanction the construction of a line of railway from Gilmore to Batlow; to authorise the construction of the said line on roads; to provide for the use of the said line during construction; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 5 November, 1919. Assented to, 5 December, 1919.]

**HOUSING (EXTENSION) ACT (GEO. V, No. 31, 1919)—**

An Act to make further provision for erecting and purchasing dwelling-houses for the people; to borrow moneys and make financial arrangements for such purposes; to amend the Housing Act, 1912, and the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. D. R. Hall, 13 November, 1919. Assented to, 16 December, 1919.]

**HYDRO-ELECTRIC DEVELOPMENT (CONSTRUCTION) ACT (GEO. V, No. 48, 1919)—**

An Act to sanction the construction of hydro-electric works at Barren Jack, on the Tumut River and its tributaries, and on the Nymboida River, with transmission lines and necessary subsidiary works for the distribution of electricity therefrom; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 7 October, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]



## INCOME-TAX (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 3, 1919)—

An Act to increase the amount of the income-tax payable in the year 1920; and for that purpose to amend certain Acts. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. J. C. L. Fitzpatrick, 1 October, 1919. Assented to, 21 October, 1919.]

## INDUSTRIAL ARBITRATION (AMENDMENT) ACT, (GEO. V, No. 50, 1919)—

An Act to amend the law relating to industrial arbitration in connection with certain public servants; to amend the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912, the Industrial Arbitration (Amendment) Act, 1916, the Industrial Arbitration (Amendment) Act, 1918, the Industrial Arbitration (Further Amendment) Act, 1918, the Public Service Act, 1902, and certain other Acts; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. James, 4 November, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]

## INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC RELIEF ACT (GEO. V, No. 45, 1919)—

An Act to afford relief in respect of certain losses, expenses, and obligations in connection with the influenza epidemic; to give effect to a certain proclamation published in the *Gazette* dated the 27th day of February, 1919; for that purpose to appoint a commission with certain powers and duties; to validate certain payments; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Oakes, 9 October, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]

## INTERSTATE DESTITUTE PERSONS' RELIEF ACT (GEO. V, No. 33, 1919)—

An Act for the relief of persons whose relatives liable to support them reside in another State of the Commonwealth; to make further provision for serving and executing certain summonses and maintenance orders; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Oakes, 20 November, 1919. Assented to, 16 December, 1919.]

## JUDGE'S RETIREMENT (AMENDMENT) ACT, (GEO. V, No. 22, 1919)—

An Act to declare and amend the law relating to certain judges' pensions; to amend the Supreme Court and Circuit Courts Act, 1900, the Judges Pensions (Amendment) Act, 1906, and the Judges Retirement Act, 1918; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. D. R. Hall, 19 November, 1919. Assented to, 5 December, 1919.]

## LIQUOR (AMENDMENT) ACT (GEO. V, No. 42, 1919)—

An Act to extend the period during which licensed and registered premises shall be closed at 6 o'clock; to suspend local option; to reduce the number of publicans' licenses, and to provide for compensation; to submit to a referendum the question of prohibition with compensation, and the question of the hour at which licensed and registered premises shall be closed; to give effect to such referendum; to limit the duration of agreements providing for an abatement of rent; to amend the Liquor Act, 1912, the Liquor (Local Option) Amendment Act, 1913, the Liquor Referendum Act, 1916, and the Liquor (Amendment) Act, 1916; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. D. R. Hall, 27 November, 1919. Assented to, 23 December, 1919.]

## LITHGOW WATER SUPPLY AND SEWERAGE ACT (GEO. V, No. 15, 1919)—

An Act to sanction the carrying out of works to extend the schemes of water supply and sewerage for the municipality of Lithgow; to amend the Public Works Act, 1912; and for purposes consequent thereon or incidental thereto. [Initiated in the Assembly by Mr. Ball, 7 October, 1919. Assented to, 27 November, 1919.]

**LOAN ACT (GEO. V, No. 27, 1919)—**

*Address in Reply: No comment could be permitted on a matter that was sub judice, 315.*

*Adjournment: Christmas Felicitations, obs., 3858.*

*Adjournment: A motion of adjournment to discuss two matters was out of order, 1882; a member who had deposited a notice of motion was entitled to vote against its withdrawal as the second notice for discussion, after the first motion had been ruled out of order, 1882; a motion of adjournment to discuss "the appointment of a board to supervise the distribution of relief"—to farmers—was very vague and very indefinite, and motions of this kind should be so clear and intelligible as to make the matter desired to be discussed quite patent, 2335; a motion of adjournment to discuss "the failure of the Government to make adequate provision for widows and distressed children" was not out of order on the ground that the matter might be discussed on a motion relating to the incorporation and promotion of the objects of a society for the welfare of mothers and babies—there was nothing to show that the society would provide for widows and children generally, 2409; a motion of adjournment to discuss the proposal, "that drastic action be taken by the Government to handle and control the increased cost of living, more particularly with regard to profiteering," was out of order, because it did not relate to a single specific matter of recent occurrence, 2537; for the same reason a motion of adjournment to discuss the urgency of amending the Public Health Act to afford greater protection against contagious diseases was out of order, 2594; inasmuch as the first motion drawn from the box could not be moved it was a nullity, and the Speaker should, therefore, proceed to draw a second notice from the box without motion being made, 2594; in regard to a motion of adjournment to discuss "the dismissal of the application by Judge Curlew of the miners' section of the Australian Workers' Union to have an agreement registered in the Arbitration Court," the Speaker could not say from the wording of the motion itself that it involved an attack upon the conduct of the judge. He would not hold that no decision given by a court could be discussed in the House, but any comment*



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on the conduct of the judge would be ruled out of order, 2599; a motion of adjournment to discuss "the failure of the Government to deal effectively with the conditions arising from this calamitous drought" did not deal with a definite matter so as to bring it within standing order 49, 2748; a motion of adjournment to discuss "the failure of the Government to retain wheat sufficient for seed and consumption, and to supply necessitous settlers with sustenance and fodder" was out of order, because it did not deal with a single specific matter of recent occurrence, 2884; a motion of adjournment to discuss "the amendment of the Miners' Accident Relief Act to provide for increased payments" did not refer to a specific matter of recent occurrence, and was therefore out of order, 3837.

**Alleged Attempted Bribery—Motion of Urgency:** A member could not move to suspend the standing orders to enable him to discuss as a matter of urgency, a motion of which he had given notice for the following day. This would be an infringement of the rule against the anticipation of discussion, 1052; a member could not on a point of order say that another member was stating something that was untrue, 1169.

**Chairman of Committees:** Notice of intention to move for the appointment of the Chairman of Committees could not be given with the consent of the House, except at the proper time, in accordance with standing order 74. Certain things could be done under the standing orders with concurrence, but there was no general provision under which any standing order could be set aside with concurrence, 417; a motion having been moved after notice for the appointment of a certain Member as Chairman of Committees, a proposal to substitute the name of another Member could not be accepted as an amendment, but could be treated as a substantive motion in the event of the original motion being defeated, 437.

**Strangers in the Gallery:** It was grossly irregular for a member in the House to converse with a stranger in the gallery, 1448.

**Members, Designations of:** Military titles under the rank of captain were not ordinarily referred to. Officers of the A.I.F. retained their rank on termination of their appointments as honorary rank in the Australian Military Forces, 3036.

**Personal Explanation:** There never had been a rule established or practised that there should be a reply to a personal explanation. When a Minister made a ministerial statement it had been the custom to allow the Leader of the Opposition to briefly reply on questions of fact, 801; a member could not under cover of a personal explanation contradict a statement made by another member, 1053; the inaccuracy of newspaper reports was not a matter for personal explanation, 1680; when a statement was challenged the member concerned might take a subsequent opportunity of replying to his critic, but could not do so under cover of a personal explanation, 2473; there could hardly be a personal explanation on something involved in a question addressed to a Minister which was not supposed to contain any statement of fact, 2532.

**Questions** must be asked for the purpose of eliciting information, 796; a statement outside the House regarding the duties of the party Whips could not be made the subject of a question, 1927; the rules regarding the asking of questions were admirably summarised at page 221 of the latest edition of "May," 2134; it was competent to raise a point of order regarding a question, but until the question was finished the Speaker could not say whether or not it was in order, 2471.
