Commenting upon or challenging an answer by the Premier would tend to open a debate and therefore is out of order on the motion for adjournment, 4932.

On the motion for the adjournment, an hon. member may discuss a matter of importance to his own constituents or constituency, and leaders of parties may discuss matters of State-wide and urgent public opinion, but general debate is not in order, 1096, 1491, 1501, 1502, 1503, 1504, 2119, 2120, 3113, 3184, 3565, 3981, 4933, 4935.

Controversial matters may not be discussed on the motion for adjournment, 4935.

On the motion for the adjournment, hon. members may not anticipate debate on a motion on the business paper which is likely to be taken "within a reasonable time," 1097.

The motion for adjournment is not an occasion for making a personal explanation, 3564; or an attack upon another hon. member, 3981.

Hansard: An hon. member is entitled to refer to, but may not read from, *Hansard* of the current session, 3982, 3986, 4991.

Imputations, Reflections, etc.:

A statement casting reflection upon a Minister and imputing improper motives in his administration is not in order (Standing Order 152), 102, 276.

An hon. member is entitled to make any statement he chooses, whether it be true or otherwise, but if he is challenged he should be prepared, if he wishes the House to give credence to his utterance, to substantiate it, 436.
