Interjections, Interruptions, and Disorder: Members with the call will be heard in silence, 623, 1038, 1040, 1041, 1949, 3672

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ACTING-SPEAKER (MR R. F. CHAPPELL) (continued):

Members wishing to converse should do so outside the Chamber, **6663**; and private discussions being conducted in the Chamber and discussion to determine the business of the House should be conducted quietly, **6663**.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: Expressions withdrawn voluntarily: "the Minister is a dill", 3657; "Minister sewers", 3664.

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Member referring to copious notes, **3854.** 

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Procedure: A member wishing to participate in debate should seek the call, **3855.** 

Relevance: A member was directed to return to the substance of the debate, 2131, 3675, 4672; scope of the bill, 3847, 5135.

A member discussing matters of only passing relevance to the motion was asked to keep these matters brief and return **quickly** to the **subject** of the debate, **3675**.

A member leading for the Opposition was entitled to canvass matters widely but was asked to wme to the points at issue, **5515**.

**Debate:** Members will refrain from commenting in debate about visitors to the public gallery, **2299.**

**Grievance Debate:** Parameters of grievance debate, as set by Speaker **Kelly** and adopted by Speaker **Rozzoli**: members (1) should restrict themselves to matters of concern to themselves, their electorates or their community generally and should not ventilate inappropriate matters: (2) must confine themselves to one subject of particular concern to them and their electorate; may not canvass a number of matters in one contribution, even though they have sufficient time to do so; and (3) must not attack the conduct of other members under the guise of having a grievance noted, 5734.

**Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder:** A member was directed to cease interjecting, 344; and the House was called to order. 5780.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: Expression required to be withdrawn: "his speech was prepared by someone outside the Parliament and he read it word for word", 6147.

A member's references to examples to support his argument were ruled to be relevant, **1423**.

A member may illustrate points by referring briefly to specific matters but should not generally debate them, 1044.

Members may make only brief reference to matters they believe ought to be contained in bills but which are not, **619.**

**Chair:** Members will direct their remarks through the Chair, **1809.** 

**Division:** Casting vote, 1634, 1654, 1768, 1800, 1804, 1809, 1823, 6056.

Because of doubt whether the bar of the House was **lifted** to enable a member to enter after the doors had been ordered locked, the division bells were rung again, **4459**.

Extension of Time: In Committee stages of a bill there is no provision for a member's time to speak to be extended, 4604.

Interjections, Interruptions, and Disorder: The Committee was called to order, 1800, 5357.

#### Points of Order:

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**Relevance:** A member was directed to return to the subject of the clause [amendment], **1636**, **1645**, 4466, **4604**, **4606**, **4607**, **5357**.

    - Members who move about the Chamber during division are grossly disorderly, **1771.**
    - **Documents:** A member should identify a document from which he is quoting at length and, if that cannot be done, should make only passing reference to it. **768.**
    - Interjections, Interruptions and Disorder: Members will not have private conversations in the Chamber, 1367; members wishing to converse will do so outside the Chamber, 4645, 5363; and shall leave the Chamber quickly and quietly, 576, 760, 765, 1761.
    - Members will not interject, **603**, 4469.
    - Members [and Ministers] addressing the Chair **will** be heard in silence, 605, **762**, **1367**.
    - Members will not converse across the table [Chamber]. 753, 1365, 1373, 4468, 4469, 5368.
    - A member was canvassing a **ruling** and trifling with the Chair, **762**.
    - It is **disorderly** for members to converse with visitors to the public gallery, **764.**

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- Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of the Chair *(continued):* 
  - CHAIRMAN OF **COMMITTEES** (MS **WENDY SUSAN MACHIN**) (continued):
    - Members should not move about the Chamber, **1367**; and those who do so during division are being grossly disorderly, **1771**.
    - The rules of order apply in Committee, **5363**; and during and after division, **571**.
    - A member was asked not to behave as he had done in the Chamber, **4472.**
    - Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: The use of the word "screwed" was not vital to the context of the debate, and members should refrain from using such language unless it was absolutely necessary in the context of the debate, 1765.
    - Expression required to be withdrawn: "liar", **5368.**
    - Points of Order: A point of order must be concluded before a member may take a further point of order, **709.**

Not Upheld in Part: Relevance, **5926**, **5927**.

Upheld:

Debate on amendments is specific, **710**, **5361**.

Upheld in Part: Member giving example, **5926**, **5927**.

Procedure: Members should audibly seek the call, **6013.** 

Relevance: A member was directed to address the clause [amendment] under consideration, 574, 591, 710, 752, 755, 762, 770, 4065, 4469, 5368, 5918, 5926, 5927, 5929, 5930.

- Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of **the** Chair (continued):
  - CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEES (Ms WENDY SUSAN MACHIN) (continued):
    - At the Committee stage members may debate only specific matters and not make a second reading speech, **5918**.
    - Tedious Repetition: A member was asked to introduce new material in debate to avoid being tediously repetitive, 772; and was warned against being repetitive, 5927.

#### AS DEPUTY-SPEAKER:

- Amendments: A member may foreshadow amendments during debate on the second reading of a bill but may not state them formally, **3389.**
- Chair: Members will direct their remarks through the Chair, 972,1017, 2532, 3401, 3858.
- Debate: A member who wishes to participate in debate should seek the call in the usual way. **958**, **961**.
- **Debate** may be enthusiastic but members should temper their language and phraseology, 4000.
- A members is entitled to canvass administrative matters generally but should not delve too deeply into a ministerial portfolio and was directed not to pursue that line further, 4003.
- Documents: A member cannot move that a Minister should incorporate a document in *Hansard*, 1941. A member is not permitted to table or incorporate documents; only Ministers have that privilege, 1935.
- A member quoting at length from a document, letter or newspaper report must verify the document, 1933.
- A member who referred to in detail and quoted total passages from a document would be asked to identify the

document and its author, but not if general reference only were made, 1934.

A member unwilling to disclose the identity of the author of a document would be asked to make general reference only to the document, **1934**.

Grievance Debate: A member may raise only one issue in a grievance debate, **2538**, **5745**; but would be in order if able to link two separate matters to show they formed the one subject, **5745**.

Interjections, interruptions and Disorder: A member reading a newspaper in the House was being disorderly, 1227.

A member who asks a question will listen in silence to the reply, **2106.** 

Members will not interject [converse] across the table, 1940, 2529, 4304, 5572.

Public gallery visitors may be removed for disorderly conduct, 1011, 2138, 2277.

Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: A member who objects to a remark made in the House must use the forms of the House to raise such objection 1219.

Points of Order: In **speaking** to a point of order it is not appropriate to debate the truth of a matter, **5577.** 

Not Upheld:

Relevance, 975, 1941, 3688, 3691, 5573.

Upheld:

Relevance, **3389**, **4003**. Two subjects debated in grievance debate, **5745**.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and **Opinions** of the Chair *(continued):* 

DEPUTY-SPEAKER (MS WENDY SUSAN MACHIN) (continued):

Private Members' Statements: Members may not refer to more than one subject, **5745.** 

Procedure: Members should obey convention and refer to Ministers by their portfolios and members by their titles and electorate names, **1016**, **4000**.

Relevance: A member was directed to confine his remarks to the leave of the bill, 1010, 4269, 4300, 5572, 5573, 5576, 5577.

Although Ministers and members often refer to issues not related directly to a bill that does not permit debate on **subsidiary** matters. **5573.** If a **Minister** in his second reading speech refers briefly to a particular matter a member speaking subsequently is entitled only to refer equally briefly to that matter. **5577.** 

Sub Judiie Rule: The Chair sought the assurance of a member that his **raising** of a matter would not jeopardise any future court action, **5745**.

# MR SPEAKER (THE HON. KEVIN RICHARD ROZZOLI):

Election, 23. Resentation to Governor, **29.** 

Amendments: The House may not consider more than one amendment at a time, **1432**; although notice of intention to propose a further amendment may be alluded **to, 1432**.

A member debating an amendment to a motion is entitled to move a further amendment only if the first amendment is not proceeded with, 128

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Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and **Opinions** of the Chair *(continued):* 

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. K.R. ROZZOLI) (continued):

Standing Order 198, which states "Amendments may be proposed to a proposed amendment as if such proposed amendment were an original question", appears to allow a member the right to proceed to move an amendment consequential to the amendment moved, that is, an amendment to improve the original amendment, but is qualified by Standing Order 195, which states "No amendment shall be proposed in any part of a question after a later part has been amended or has been proposed to be amended, unless the proposed amendment has been, by leave of the House, withdrawn.", 1432.

Members may refer to amendments generally but may not reread each amendment, **3335.** 

Censure: Debate on any motion of censure is very serious and should be conducted in an orderly manner, **3589**.

Chair: The Chair is responsible for the order of the House, **1287**, **4238**.

Members will address their remarks through the Chair, 300, 301, 359, 1395,2975, 3617,4486,5306,5320; and not converse with the Minister at the table, 705.

The Chair **will** hear in silence a member with the call, **2510**.

The Chair has no power to order a member to retract a statement but a member offended by such statement has a right to make a personal explanation, **2077.** 

The Chair deplores the **trivialising** of Question T i e , **5540**.

Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of the Chair *(continued):* 

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (continued):

The Chair is impartial and has no role in saving or otherwise assisting a government, nor is that the intention of the Chair in any of its rulings, **3636.** 

A member's motion required sober consideration, **3636**.

It is for the Chair to determine whether a matter, prima facie, is one of privilege, **3357.** 

Member asked to unequivocally and unconditionally withdraw a reflection on the Chair, **71.** Member apologised and said he had no intention of showing disrespect for the Chair, **96.** Aspersions against the Chair are a matter of grave disorder, **5308.** 

A member was flouting a ruling, **97**, **707**, **1899**.

Debate: Members making maiden speeches should be given the courtesy of silence in the House, **3026**.

Members will refer to other members by their titles or electorate names, not by their personal names, **3210**, **3987**, **4000**.

Members should seek an extension of speaking time three minutes before their prescribed time is exhausted, **3423.** Although that time had passed, the question was put, **3815.** The matter is customary procedure and not one of restrictive decision by the **Chair**, **3814.** 

Distinguished Visitors: Former members of Parliament, 3571.

- SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (continued):
  - Division: A division was called off because a member who was present was paired, **1433**.
  - Pairs arrangements are not covered by standing orders, **1433**.
  - The Chair was unable to determine whether a member had voted differently in division from the way indicated when calling a division, 3444.
  - During division the House will maintain decorum, **3445.**
  - Casting vote, **199**, 466, **847**, **1325**, **1828**, **1907**, **3654**, **6288**.
  - Documents: Standing orders preclude members from reading into debate large sections of documents, regardless of their source, the contents of which should be paraphrased, **356**, **1400**; although members could read small extracts, **1400**.
- Standing orders do not provide for a member other than a Minister to table documents, **4483**, **6205**. It is a matter for a Minister whether he wishes to table a document. **1897**.
- **A** member was directed to clearly identify a document, the source, the signatures and the date, **6205**.
- Though the veracity of the contents of a letter could not be fully determined the Chair was of opinion that sufficient had been said in points of order to place the letter in correct context, **6205.**
- Extension of Tie: A member was grossly out of order in stating that the Opposition had no objection to the

    - Premier being granted an extension of time to make a ministerial statement, **52.**
    - Members seeking an extension of **speaking** time should do so three minutes before their prescribed time is exhausted, **3423**. Although that time had passed, the question was put. **3815**. The matter is customary procedure and not one of restrictive decision by the Chair, **3814**.
    - Hansard: A member having asked the Chair to request another member to correct the *Hansard*, the Chair was of opinion that in circumstances of allegation and counter-allegation the *Hansard* record stands, 3811.
  - interjections, interruptions and **Disorder:** Members **wishing** to converse should do so outside the Chamber, **60**, **204**, **295**, **350**, **695**, **1204**, **1562**. **1611**, **1745**, **1894**, **1904**, **4421**, **4481**, **4492**, **4623**, **4787**, **4812**, **5081**,5306,5763,5962,5973,6689, 6695.
  - A serious matter should be treated as such, 65. Debate on a motion of censure is very serious and should be conducted in an orderly manner, **3589**.
  - Members with the call should be heard in silence. 137, 138, 296, 419, 431, 553. 700, 892. 980, 1123, 1128, 1268, 2510, 4235, 4492, 5072, 5073, 5294. 5307, 5542, 5765, 5767.
  - Members in the Chamber will not converse loudly among themselves, 1309, 4787; or interject [converse] across the Chamber, 2963, 4778, 5320; and excessive interjection [conversation] made it difficult for members to hear what was said, 5293, 5307.

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- Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of the Chair *(continued)*:
  - **SPEAKER,** MR (THE HON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (continued):
    - Members with the call are permitted to respond to interjections, **705**; but should ignore them, **557**.
    - Members would have a chance to contribute to debate and should restrain themselves until they have the call, **158**; and a member who had contributed to debate should refrain from interjecting, **1405**.
    - The Chair was pleased to see members in good humour, **3164**, but warned members to contain that good humour and all extreme forms of behaviour, **892**; so that it does not intrude on the orderly conduct of proceedings, **3164**.
    - Members should maintain decorum, 3221,4497; including during division, 3445. A member walking about the Chamber during debate was behaving indecorously, 698.
    - Although at times indecorous language is used in the House, it behoves party leaders to set for members a proper example, **4033**.
    - The Chair controls the order of the House, **1287**, **4238**. A member who had been called to order previously and directed not to interject was told to get on with his speech, **1304**.
    - A member was warned that if he flouted a ruling he would be asked to resume his seat, **70**; and a Minister who flouted a ruling was asked to resume his seat, **1899**.
    - Members were deemed to be on three calls, **5308**; and warned that those who attracted the further attention of the Chair would be removed from the Chamber immediately, **2508**, **3165**, **5308**; or named, **3447**.

  - SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (continued):
    - Behaviour by members was unacceptable. **287. 2507**; and a warning was given. **5294.**
    - Members who continued to flout the Chair's advice to act with decorum were warned about being disciplined under Standing Order **387**, **4816**.
    - The House was called to order, **981**, **1387**, **1744**.
    - Ministerial answers should be heard in silence. **79**, **1382**, **1386**. **3981**. **4243**, **4416**; as constant interjection merely prolongs them, **79**,**1129**,**3353**,**4413**, **4414**, **4497**.
    - A Minister with the call may respond [briefly] to interjections, 6193, 6685; but a Minister was told to ignore interjections and continue with his answer, 557.1129; and members who do not wish a Minister diverted from his answer should not interject, 6914; so that the Minister will not feel the need to respond, 79, 6685.
    - Public gallery visitors were asked to sit, 4622; remain silent, 5545; and not interrupt or try to participate in the proceedings of the Chamber, 4816, 5545. A woman visitor was removed, 5545. The public gallery was cleared, 4622.
    - Members should be silent in Question Tie, 4814; to maximise its value, 5766; as interjections are disruptive, 4815; waste time, 3315, 3348, 4815; erode the opportunity of members to ask further questions, 79, 4243; and preclude members from asking the maximum number of questions, 4815.
    - The level of **interjection** made it **difficult** for Question T i e to continue in

    - orderly fashion, **3169.** The Chair found it impossible to hear a question and asked a member to repeat it, **4235.**
    - The tally of members called to order during Question Time continues until its conclusion, **2984.**
    - Members asked to Resume **Seat:** Mr **Whelan, 71;** Mr Phillips, **1899;** Mr Yabsley, **5546.**
    - Member Removed: Ms Allan, 3173
    - Ministerial Statements: A ministerial statement projects a government's future policy, and matters of fact fall outside the general parameters of such a statement, **982**. A ministerial statement cannot give information about legislation proposed by groups outside Parliament, **4237**.
    - No form of the House permits a member to debate a ministerial statement, **3974**.
    - The Leader of the Opposition during reply to a ministerial statement was told to address himself to only matters raised in the statement, **4033**; and not to stray too far into areas beyond those mentioned in the statement, **4034**.
    - **Notices** of Motion: Under Standing Order **107** no member, except a Minister, may give more than one notice of motion consecutively, **70**.
    - Offensive and Objectionable Remarks, Imputations and Aspersions: Expressions required to be withdrawn: "Who are you protecting", 1135; "boofhead", 4506; [a member] "lied", 3641, 3642, 4692; "the Nats . . . snouts . . . in the trough", 5321; and an apology ordered, "bugger", 6261.

- Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of the Chair (continued):
  - SPEAKER, MR (THEHON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (continued):
    - A member was asked to withdraw his allegation of improper conduct by other **members**, **1133**.
    - A member was warned that his terminology in a point of order was grossly disorderly, **5303**.
    - Aspersions against the Chair are grave matters of disorder, **5308.**
    - A member cannot ask that an offensive expression about another member be withdrawn. **4697.**
    - When a member interjected "The west again" the Speaker said that there was absolutely no need for such interjection as it was entirely without justification and would not impress those in the public gallery, 3802.
    - Withdrawals must be made without qualification, **4692**.
    - Personal Explanation: When a member sought to make a personal explanation, there being not one dissenting voice, the House granted that leave and the member was entitled to be heard in silence, 3446.

The Chair determines whether a matter, prima facie, is one of privilege. **3357.** 

The House must determine whether the privilege of the House has been intruded upon, **1132.** 

A member who rises on a matter of privilege and who intends to proceed to move a motion should make that clear during the speech, otherwise the Chair might not necessarily accept that that was intended and might accept the matter as being one of personal explanation, 3357. A member seeking to establish a breach of privilege must first establish a prima facie case and then must move and speak to the motion. 1116.

A member who had established prima facie a matter of privilege and had moved a motion but did not speak to it, after which another member had been called upon to speak, could seek only to speak to the motion subsequently if the government removed the motion for discussion immediately or if the Opposition in Question T i e moved for suspension of standing orders or if the Opposition accepted an assurance from the Leader of the House that at the conclusion of Question T i e he would move suspension of standing orders, 1118.

A member had established prima facie a matter of privilege. 1118, 3359. A prima facie matter of privilege takes the priority in business set out in Standing Order 108 or Standing Order 111(b); otherwise it remains on the business paper and is dealt with in due course, without priority, 1118; except

A member seeking to support his motion on a matter of privilege must concentrate on the threats that had been made to him and show how that action had impeded the performance of his duty, 1134; and should confine his remarks to matters that establish an attack on his parliamentary privilege and morally should not by his remarks prejudice external investigations of the matter. 1134.
  - A member speaking to a motion on a matter of privilege in which matters were the subject of criminal charges was told that it would be wise to name particular persons only on the minimum number of occasions he felt that was necessary, 1131.

  - The Leader of the Opposition in making an official announcement of Opposition leaders, whips and leader of the House was directed not to make other remarks, **31**.
  - A Minister who had commenced his reply could not retract it in order to enable another member to contribute to the debate, **193**.
  - Two members not supporting the government having spoken in succession, the call was given to a member supporting the government, 4498. Three government members were called consecutively to ask questions without notice because no Opposition member sought the call, 3798.
  - **Standing** orders provide that it is not appropriate for members to use recording devices in the House, **6226**; and a member using a portable computer in the Chamber was told that the practice was out of order, **6226**.
  - A member who brought into the Chamber a glass of water was told that that was outside the practices of the House. **6214.**

A member concerned about the length of a question should raise a point of order before or immediately upon conclusion of the question, **5074**.

An answer to a question that is specific in content must be restricted to providing relevant information, **984**; and there is a limit to general discourse that may be allowed, **985**. A Minister will give the House factual information and not debate the matter, **1898**.

A Minister was told to return to the question, 1387, 2235, 3344, 3353, 3792,4232,4243,5303,5540, 5546, 6193, 6195.

Factual information may be obtained by **asking** a question without notice, **2069.** A question **seeking** factual information has never been held to be subject to the rule of anticipation of debate, **1902,2067,4236.** A question **seeking** factual information is permissible prior to debate on the subject taking place, **5074.** The ruling on a question without notice not anticipating debate did not apply, **1902.** 

The Chair has no authority to direct how a Minister shall reply to a question, **4239.** 

Though occasionally Ministers are permitted to provide limited background information when Assembly, Legislative: Rulings, Observations and Opinions of **the** Chair *(continued)*:

SPEAKER, MR (THE HON. K. R. ROZZOLI) (conrinued):

answering questions, a question was specific and the answer should be restricted to providing relevant information. **984**, **985**; and the Minister should return to the substance of the matter or resume his seat, **985**.

The Chair was concerned about the length of a Minister's answer, 287, 4237; and asked a Minister to conclude the answer as quickly as possible, 76, 287, 1129, 1387, 1568, 1744, 1898, 2235, 4237, 4413; but had no authority to direct a Minister to conclude his answer, 4413. The Chair had not heard enough of a Minister's reply to a question to determine whether it formed a ministerial statement. 5296. A Minister's answer had not been sufficiently long to warrant the sanction of being a ministerial statement, 1898. Minister's answer of eleven minutes was too long and he was asked to conclude his answer quickly, 1898. A member who had asked a question and objected to the length of the reply failed in taking a point of order because the final part of the question had broadened its parameters, 1126.

A member who directed a question to the Speaker was told that the Speaker does not discuss in public matters of policy of the Parliament but that the member could direct such a question in chambers. **6485**.

A member who asks a question should listen to the answer in silence, 430, 983, 1123, 1127, 1281, 1392. Members should listen in silence to both questions and answers, 1562, 1752. 1753. 3162, 3164, 3168. Members should exercise restraint and maintain a sense of decorum and decency during Question T i e, 3169.

    - Reports: A member who sought to speak to a tabled committee report was told there was no provision for that but that the matter could be set down for debate at the appropriate time. Standing orders were suspended and leave was granted to the member to speak, **5977**.
  - Special Adjournment: The Chair adopted previous rulings that on the Special Adjournment members may canvass to a limited extent matters they believe should be brought before the House, 97.
  - Sub **Judice** Rule: The sub **judice** rule cannot be invoked on the presumption that charges will result **from** investigations being **carried** out, **1134**.
  - Suspension of Standing Orders: In a motion for suspension of standing orders which foreshadowsthe bringing on for debate of a bill, the substantive debate that would follow the carriage of the motion is in fact the debate on that bill, therefore a wider range of material may be used in arguing for suspension of standing orders to bring on a bill than would be the case where the suspension of standing orders is to bring on a substantive motion, 2059.

notice of motion on the business paper it is possible for amendment of the motion in regard to the manner in which the matter can be brought before the Parliament, 2061; the standing and sessional orders prescribe only that the person moving the motion for the suspension of the standing orders may speak to that motion, and the member proposing the amendment may move the amendment at any time during his address, 2062.

Standing orders having been suspended in unusual fashion, covering the whole of the debate on a notice of motion, the Chair had no latitude to allow an amendment to the original motion to be moved as a specific member had the right of reply for five minutes before the question was put, 1435.

A member speaking in reply to a motion for suspension of standing orders has a less onerous requirement than the mover, but the address must be a reply, 2958.

In seeking to establish a motion for suspension of standing orders there is no requirement to establish urgency; the member has to convince the House that standing orders should be suspended, 3979.

In a motion for suspension of standing orders which required three speakers favouring and three against, the Chair felt it inappropriate to elicit information about the views of members before giving the call and interpreted that as being six speakers in all, three from the government side and three members not supporting the government, 2963.
