# SECOND SESSION OF THE TWENTY-EIGHTH PARLIAMENT.

#### TUESDAY, 17 APRIL, 1928.

1. OPENING OF THE SESSION: -The House met at twelve o'clock at Noon, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the twenty-second day of March, 1928.

Mr. Speaker took the Chair.

The Clerk, by direction of Mr. Speaker, read a copy of the said Proclamation, as follows:-

"TO WIT. " (L.s.) " D. R. S. DE CHAIR, " Governor.

"New South Wales, | By His Excellency Sir Dudley Rawson Stratford DE CHAIR, Admiral in the Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependen-. cies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

"Whereas the Parliament of New South Wales now stands prorogued to Tues-"day, the twenty-seventh day of March, 1928; Now, I, Sir Dudley Rawson "STRATFORD DE CHAIR, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested "as Governor of the said State, do hereby further prorogue the said Parlia-"ment to Tuesday, the seventeenth day of April next: And I do further "announce and proclaim that the said Parliament shall assemble for the dis-"patch of business on the aforesaid seventeenth day of April next at twelve "o'clock at noon, in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, situate in Macquaric-street, in the City of Sydney: And the Members of the "Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively, are hereby required "to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

"Given under my Hand and Seal, at Sydney, this twenty-second day of "March, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and "twenty-eight, and in the eighteenth year of His Majesty's Reign.

### "GOD SAVE THE KING!"

2. Message from the Commissioners:—The Usher of the Black Rod, being admitted, delivered a Message, that "The Commissioners request the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council Chamber, to hear the Commission for opening of Parliament read."

The House went, and the Members of both Houses being scated, at the request of the President, the President said:-

"Honorable Members of the Legislative Council, and Members of the Legis-"lative Assembly,-

"His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to cause a Commission to be "issued, under the Public Scal of the State, constituting us Commissioners "to do all things necessary to be performed by the Governor in the name and "on the part of His Majesty the King, or in the name and on the part of His "Excellency the Governor of the State, in order to the opening and holding of "this Session of Parliament, to deliver a Message to the Legislative Assembly, "and to do all such other things as may be specially necessary to enable Parlia-"ment to perform acts which admit of no delay, as will more fully appear by "the Commission itself, which must now be read."

Whereupon the Clerk of the Parliaments, by direction of the President, read the said Commission, as follows:—

"George the Fifth, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

"To all to whom these presents shall come,-

" Greeting, "Whereas by Proclamation made on the Twenty-second day of March, 1928, His "Excellency Sir Dudley Rawson Stratford de Chair, Admiral in the Royal "Navy, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Member "of the Royal Victorian Order, Our Governor of our State of New South Wales "and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia, did, in pursuance of "the power and authority vested in him as Governor of Our said State, by "virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the reign of His late Majesty "King Edward the Seventh, being 'An Act to consolidate the Acts relating "to the Constitution,' proclaim that a Session of the Legislative Council "and Legislative Assembly constituted under the said Act, and com"posing the Parliament of Our said State of New South Wales,
"should commence and be holden on Tuesday, the Seventeenth day
"of April; And whereas, for certain causes, Our said Governor cannot "conveniently be present in person at the opening of the said Session: "Now know ye, that We, trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of Our "trusty and well-beloved the Honorable Frederick Flowers, President of the "said Legislative Council, the Honorable Francis Stewart Boyce, Attorney-"General and Vice-President of Our Executive Council of Our said State, and "the Honorable Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, members of the said Legislative "Council, do, with the advice of Our Executive Council of Our said State, give "and grant by the tenor of these presents unto the said Frederick Flowers, "Francis Stewart Boyce, and Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, so being such "President and Members of the said Legislative Council, or any two of them, "full power in Our name to open and hold the said Session of the said Legislative "Council and Legislative Assembly on the said Seventeenth day of April, or subsequent day, on Our behalf, to do all things necessary to be done in Our "name, or in the name of Our Governor of Our said State, in and about the "opening and holding of the said Parliament, to deliver a Message to the "Legislative Assembly, and to do all such other things as may be specially "necessary to enable Parliament to perform acts which admit of no delay: "Commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom it concerns to meet "in the said Parliament, that to the said Frederick Flowers, Francis Stewart "Boyce, and Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, or any two of them, they diligently "attend in the premises in the form aforesaid.

"In testimony whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made "Patent and the Public Scal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

"Witness Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir Dudler Rawson Stratford de "Chair, Admiral in Our Royal Navy, Knight Commander of the Most "Honourable Order of the Bath, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, "Governor of Our State of New South Wales and its Dependencies in "the Commonwealth of Australia, at Sydney, in New South Wales "aforesaid, this twelfth day of April, in the year of our Lord one "thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, and in the eighteenth year "of our Reign.

The President then said,-

"Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,—

"His Excellency the Governor has commanded us to acquaint you that certain "Bills of an urgent nature will be placed before you and that it is His Excel-"lency's desire that you take them into your earnest consideration."

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,--

"His Excellency has further commanded us to acquaint you that it is His "Excellency's desire that you will take such measures as may be deemed "expedient in connection with the financial requirements of the Public Services." And the House having returned,—

3. Adjournment:—The House adjourned on motion of Mr. Buttenshaw at seventeen minutes after Twelve o'clock until half-past Three o'clock, sharp, this day.

Privilege:-Mr. Lang submitted, as a matter of privilege, that the Wollondilly Electorate had not been properly constituted under the provisions of the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections (Further Amendment) Act, 1927, and that Mr. Speaker had no authority to issue a Writ for a By-election and that he should not proceed on the Writ and allow Mr. Morton to take his seat.

Mr. Speaker said that the Honorable Member, Mr. Lang, had not concluded with a motion, but in any case he ruled that Mr. Morton was entitled to be introduced and take his seat.

- (3.) Member Sworn:-Mark Fairles Morton, Esquire, was introduced, and having taken and subscribed the Oath of Allegiance and signed the Roll of the House, took his seat as Member for the Electoral District of Wollondilly.

### "ELECTION PETITION-NIELD v. BUTLER-HURSTVILLE.

The Committee of Elections and Qualifications duly appointed on 17th April, 1928, to whom was referred, on that date, the matter of a Petition from John Roscoe Nield, Esquire, against the return of Walter James Butler, Esquire, as Member for the Electoral District of Hurstville, together with the Progress Report from the Committee of Session 1927, have determined and do hereby declare:—

- (1.) That Walter James Butler, the sitting Member, was duly elected for the Electoral District of Hurstville.
- (2.) That the Petition of John Roscoe Nield is not frivolous nor vexatious.
- (3.) That the sum of £175 (One hundred and seventy-five pounds) be awarded Walter James Butler, the sitting Member, in respect of his professional costs and expenses, payable as follows:—£50 (Fifty pounds) being the deposit lodged by the Petitioner, and the balance £125 (One hundred and twenty-five pounds) to be paid by the Petitioner to Walter James Butler.
- (4.) That the Committee are of opinion, in view of the special circumstances of this case, that the expenses of the Petitioner should be reimbursed by the Crown to the amount of £350 (Three hundred and fifty pounds); being £175 (One hundred and seventy-five pounds) costs of the sitting Member awarded against the Petitioner, and £175 (One hundred and seventy-five pounds), representing his own costs and expenses.
- (5.) That the Committee recommend that the following be Gazetted as a Regulation in connection with future Elections, viz.:—Every Officer in charge of a polling booth shall as soon as conveniently may be after the close of the poll complete, sign, and forward to the Returning Officer of the electorate in which such polling booth is situated, a return according to the form hereunder of all absent votes polled at such booth. Mr. Speaker said he had carefully considered the two amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill. He was of the opinion that this was a money Bill, but that the amendments were of such a character that they really did not alter the provisions of the Bill as it left this Chamber, but gave effect to what was the clear intention of the Legislative Assembly.

By a peculiarity in the phraseology of subclause (c) (i) of clause 2, as the Bill left this House, it really made it necessary in the event of a booth license being required, say, for a period of seven days, to obtain seven different licenses. The first amendment made it clear that one license may be applied for and obtained for the whole period. The second amendment was merely consequential on the first.

No question arose as to additional taxation; in either case, the amount to be paid by the applicant for the license was £2 per day. Nor did the amendments affect even the machinery portion of the Bill, except perhaps in an infinitesimal degree.

Under all the circumstances, he was of opinion that the amendments were such as did not make it necessary for him to advise the House to insist upon its privileges. At the same time, he thought it right to make reference to the amendments in this way, as he was always most careful in seeing that the well-established privileges of this House in regard to money Bills were not in any way encroached upon.

He suggested that the amendments be considered, and a special entry to this effect be made in the Votes and Proceedings, and that the Message to the Legislative Council contain a statement that, in agreeing to the amendments, the Legislative Assembly did not waive any of its undoubted rights and privileges.

Ordered by Mr. Speaker, That the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill be taken into consideration forthwith.

On motion of Mr. Lee, Mr. Speaker left the Chair; and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and the Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to the Council's amendments.

On motion of Mr. Lee, the Report was adopted.

The Legislative Assembly has this day agreed to the amendments made by the Legislative Council, in the Bill, intituled "An Act to provide for the increase of certain license and other fees payable under the Liquor Act, 1912, as amended by subsequent Acts; to amend that Act as so amended and certain other Acts; and for purposes connected therewith,"—such amendments having been made to give effect to the intention of the Legislative Assembly; but desires that its agreement may not be drawn into a precedent, so as to warrant any supposition that the Assembly has waived any of its undoubted rights and privileges.


