### TUESDAY, 25 NOVEMBER, 1930.

1. OPENING OF PARLIAMENT:-The House met at Twelve o'clock noon, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the eighteenth day of November, 1930, of which a copy was read by William Rupert McCourt, Esquire, the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, as follows:-

"to wit. " (L.S.) " PHILIP GAME, " Governor.

"NEW SOUTH WALES, | By His Excellency Sir PHILIP WOOLCOTT GAME, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, Air Vice-Marshal on the Retired List of the Royal Air Force, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

"In pursuance of the power and authority vested in me as such Governor afore-"said by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the Reign of His late "Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'An Act to consolidate the Acts "'relating to the Constitution,' I do hereby proclaim that a Session of the "Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for the State of New South "Wales for the despatch of business shall commence and be holden on Tuesday, "the twenty-fifth day of November, at 12 o'clock noon, in the buildings known "as the Legislative Council Chambers, in Macquarie-street, in the City of "Sydney; and Members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative "Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give their attendance at the "said time and place accordingly.

"Given under my hand and seal, at Sydney, this eighteenth day of "November, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and "thirty, and in the twenty-first year of His Majesty's Reign.

8. MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONERS:—The Usher of the Black Rod being admitted delivered a Message, that "The Commissioners request the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council Chamber, to hear the Commission for opening of Parliament read."

The House went, and the President said,-

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the "Legislative Assembly,—His Excellency the Governor, not deeming it fit to be "personally present here this day, has been pleased to cause a Commission to be "issued, under the Public Seal of the State, constituting us Commissioners "to do all things necessary to be performed by the Governor in the name and "on the part of His Majesty the King, or in the name and on the part of His "Excellency the Governor of the State, in order to the opening and holding of "this Parliament, to deliver a Message to the Legislative Assembly, and to do "all such other things as may be specially necessary to enable Parliament to "perform acts which admit of no delay, as will more fully appear by the "Commission itself, which must now be read."

Whereupon the Clerk of the Parliaments, by direction of the President, read the said Commission, as follows:---

"George V, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British "Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of "India.

"To all to whom these presents shall come,-

" Greeting :

"WHEREAS by Proclamation made on the eighteenth day of November, 1930, "His Excellency Sir PHILIP WOOLCOTT GAME, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most "Excellent Order of the British Empire, Knight Commander of Our Most "Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, "Air Vice-Marshal on the Retired List of Our Royal Air Force, Governor of "Our State of New South Wales and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth "of Australia, did, in pursuance of the power and authority vested in him as "Governor of Our said State, by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of "the reign of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'An Act to "' Consolidate the Acts relating to the Constitution,' proclaim that a Session of "the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly constituted under the said "Act, and composing the Parliament of Our said State of New South Wales, "should commence and be holden on Tuesday, the twenty-fifth day of November: "And whereas, for certain causes, Our said Governor cannot conveniently be " present in person at the opening of the said Session: Now know ye, that we, " trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of our trusty and well-beloved "the Honorable Sir John Beverley Peden, President of the said Legislative "Council, the Honorable Albert Charles Willis, Vice-President of Our Executive "Council of our said State, and the Honorable Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, "Members of the said Legislative Council, do, with the advice of Our Executive "Council of our said State, give and grant by the tenor of these presents "unto the said Sir John Beverley Peden, Albert Charles Willis, and "Broughton Barnabas O'Conor, so being such President and Members of the said "Legislative Council, or any two of them, full power in Our name to open and "hold the said Session of the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly on "the said twenty-fifth day of November or subsequent day, on Our behalf, to do "all things necessary to be done in Our name, or in the name of Our Governor " of our said State, in and about the opening and holding of the said Parliament, "to deliver a Message to the Legislative Assembly, and to do all such things "as may be specially necessary to enable Parliament to perform acts which "admit of no delay: Commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom

"it concerns to meet in the said Parliament, that to the said Sir John Beverley "Peden, Albert Charles Willis, and Broughton Barnabas O'Conor or any "two of them, they diligently attend in the premises in the form aforesaid.

"In testimony whereof, we have caused these, Our Letters, to be made "Patent, and the Public Seal of Our said State, to be hereunto affixed.

"Witness Our trusty and well-beloved Sir Philip Woolcott GAME, Knight "Grand Cross of Our Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, "Knight Commander of Our Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Com-"panion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Air Vice-Marshal on the "Retired List of Our Royal Air Force, Governor of Our State of New "South Wales and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia, "at Sydney, in New South Wales, aforesaid, this twenty-fourth day of "November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and "thirty, and in the twenty-first year of Our Reign.

The Members of both Houses being seated at the request of the President,-The President said,-

"Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlemen of the "Legislative Assembly,-We have it in command from the Governor to inform "you,-That after Members of the Legislative Assembly shall have been "sworn, the causes of His Excellency calling this Parliament will be declared "to you; and it being necessary that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be "first chosen, it is His Excellency's pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the Legis-"lative Assembly, repair to your own Chamber, and there proceed to the election "of one of your number to be your Speaker."

And the House having returned,

4. COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER THE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE :- The Clerk informed the Assembly that he had received, through the office of the Premier, a Commission, under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, and bearing the Seal of the State, authorising the Honorable John Thomas Lang, Premier and Colonial Treasurer, the Honorable John Marcus Baddeley, Secretary for Mines and Minister for Labour and Industry, and the Honorable Mark Gosling, Colonial Secretary, or any one or more of them, to administer the Oath or Affirmation of Allegiance to the King, required by law to be taken or made and subscribed by every Member before he shall be permitted to sit or vote in the Legislative Assembly,-which Commission the Clerk read, as follows:-

The House then again unanimously calling him to the Chair, he was taken out of his place by Mr. Booth and Mr. McClelland, and conducted to the Chair, where, standing on the upper step, he returned his acknowledgments to the House for the great honor they had been pleased to confer upon him by unanimously choosing him to be their Speaker,-And thereupon sat down in the Chair.

Mr. Lang, Mr. Bavin, and Mr. Buttenshaw congratulated the Speaker.

Mr. Lang informed the House that he had ascertained that His Excellency the Governor would receive their Speaker at Government House at a quarter past Two o'clock this afternoon, and moved, That this House do now adjourn until Five minutes past Two o'clock This Day.

Question put and passed.

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The House adjourned accordingly, at Twenty-seven minutes before One o'clock, until Five minutes after Two o'clock p.m. This Day.

The House resumed pursuant to adjournment. Mr. Speaker took the Chair.

7. PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER :-- The House then proceeded to Government House to present their Speaker to His Excellency the Governor,

And having returned,-Mr. Speaker reported that the Assembly had been to Government House, where he informed the Governor that, immediately after the opening of Parliament to-day, the Legislative Assembly, in the exercise of their undoubted right, had proceeded to the election of their Speaker, that the choice had fallen upon him, and that he had now to present himself to His Excellency as their Speaker :---Whereupon His Excellency was pleased to offer him his congratulations.-That he had then, on behalf of the House, laid claim to all their rights and privileges, particularly to freedom of speech in debate, to free access to His Excellency when occasion should require, and that the most favourable construction should, on all occasions, be put upon their language and proceedings;-to all which His Excellency had readily assented.

Mr. Speaker then repeated his grateful thanks for the honour the House had been pleased to confer upon him.

6. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-New Administration :--- Mr. Lang informed the House that upon receipt of the resignation of the late Government on 31st October last His Excellency the Governor sent for him and commissioned him to form a Ministry. Upon his recommendation the Governor had been pleased to make the following appointments:-

THE GOVERNOR'S OPENING SPEECH:--Mr. Speaker reported that the House to-day attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament. For greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he laid upon the Table of the House, and ordered that it be recorded in the Votes and Proceedings, as follows:--

HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

1. It is with pleasure that 1 call you together for the discharge of your important duties in the first Session of the present Parliament.

2. My Advisers will submit to you measures designed to promote the public welfare in consonance with the wishes of the people as expressed at the General Elections.

3. In accordance with the definite mandate of the people legislation will be submitted to you for the abolition of the Legislative Council.

#### MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

4. The financial position calls for immediate attention and the unsatisfactory conditions prevailing in this regard will be brought under your review. Measures directed to a solution thereof will be submitted for your early consideration.

5. You will be asked to provide for the financial necessities of the Public Services of the State. Estimates of expenditure are being framed with a strict regard for economy and will be laid before you in due course.

HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, AND

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,-

6. The problem of the unemployed engages the carnest consideration of my Advisers. You will be requested to consider proposals designed to remedy the unprecedented volume of unemployment and to minimise the distress resulting therefrom.

7. A measure will be introduced to render more equitable and just the relations existing between the landlord and tenant.

8. The Fair Rents Court will have its power supplemented by legislation directed, *inter alia*, to affording adequate protection to tenants of shops.
 9. The difficulties confronting mortgagors and others owing to their

9. The difficulties confronting mortgagors and others owing to their incapacity to discharge obligations, which may result in foreclosure and the loss of their life's savings, require that early consideration be given by you to a measure of relief.

10. Legislation will be submitted for the purpose of repealing the Western Lands (Amendment) Act passed by the previous Administration.

11. A Bill will be introduced with the object of reorganising the Pricklypear Commission.

12. Steps will be taken to assemble a further conference of farmers to make a general review of the position of the industry with the object of evolving a system of organised marketing and stabilisation of prices.

13. You will be asked to consider proposals for the re-casting of the jurisdiction and powers of the Industrial Arbitration Court with a view to the restoration of more equitable industrial conditions.

14. A measure to restore the forty-four hours working week will be introduced.

15. An amendment of the Coal Mines Regulation Act will be submitted for your consideration.

I now invite your earnest consideration of the matters proposed as the subjects of your deliberations, and pray that, under the guidance of Divine Providence, your labours will conduce to the well-being and prosperity of this State.

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech, and to assure you of our unfeigned attachment to His Most Gracious Majesty's Throne and Person.

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2. We beg to assure Your Excellency that our earnest consideration will be given to the measures to be submitted to us, and that the necessary provision for the Public Service will be made in due course.

3. We join Your Excellency in the hope that, under the guidance of Divine Providence, our labours may be so directed as to advance the best interests of the State.

"We, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Members of the Legis-"lative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire to "express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech, and to assure you of our "unfeigned attachment to His Most Gracious Majesty's Throne and Person.

"2. We beg to assure Your Excellency that our earnest consideration will "be given to the measures to be submitted to us, and that the necessary pro-"vision for the Public Service will be made in due course.

- (c) threepence in the pound of the income from employment derived by every person other than a company during the income year commencing on the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and thirty, if such income is derived prior to the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, and one shilling in the pound of such income if derived on or after the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one.

Late in the afternoon, just before our last edition went to press, we learned of the error, and all that could be done then was to remove the report from the paper. A correction and expression of our regret appear (as you will see) in the same prominent position in to-day's issues.

The gallery reporter explained, when questioned upon the matter, that his shorthand note contained the word "ex-Premier," which he, by a blunder in his haste, transcribed into the report as "Premier."

It is recognised that the responsibility for the error is with the paper, whose conductors, I assure you, if that assurance be necessary, desire only to report Parliament fairly, and greatly regret the mistake which has occurred.

(k) An instrument made or executed bona fide by way of completion or confirmation of title whereby no greater benefit, legal or equitable, accrues to the person in whose favour the instrument is made or executed than he originally had or was entitled to have by virtue of, some other instrument which is duly stamped with ad valorem duty as a conveyance or declaration of trust, is chargeable with the duty of £1.

(l) A conveyance whereby the apparent purchaser of property that is vested in him upon trust for the person who was the real purchaser and who

has actually paid the purchase money therefor, conveys the same to the real purchaser, is chargeable with the duty of £1.

DECLARATION OF TRUST.

of the amount of 5s., and leases under subparagraph (b) of the same paragraph shall be chargeable, in respect of the total amount of the rental for the term, where the rent does not exceed £50, with a duty of the amount of 5s., and for every additional £50 or part of £50, with a duty of the amount of 5s.

(c) A lease or promise of or agreement for lease or hire of any property (not being a ship or vessel) made in consideration of a sum of money by way of premium, fine or foregift, shall be chargeable with the same duty as on a conveyance under paragraph (1), "Conveyances—Scales of Duty," herein, if made without rent, and if made also with a yearly rent (real or nominal), the same duty as aforesaid on the amount of premium and on the yearly rent the same duty as on a lease under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution.

(d) A lease or promise of or agreement for lease or hire of any property as aforesaid, where the consideration is nominal or where there is no consideration in money or money's worth, shall be chargeable with the same duty as on a conveyance of property of an unencumbered value equal to the value of the lease in question, under paragraph (2), "Conveyances—Scales of Duty," herein.

(e) A lease or promise of or agreement for lease or hire of any property as aforesaid, where the consideration or any part is an indeterminable amount, in addition to the duty that is to be charged on the rent according to the scale set out in paragraph (b) above there shall be charged the fixed duty of  $\pounds 1$  and also on the value of so much of the consideration as is capable of being valued the same duty as is chargeable under paragraph (1), "Conveyances—Scales of Duty," herein on property sold for a consideration equal to such value.

(f) Agreement for the hire of an electricity, gas, or water meter, under hand or under seal (adhesive stamp may be used) shall be chargeable with the duty of 1s.

(g) Exemptions from duty as a lease.—Where the sole consideration is a fixed rent at a rate of less than  $\pounds75$  a year a lease for a private dwelling-house only for a term of less than one year or a lease from the Crown under the Crown Lands Consolidation Act, 1913, or any Act amending the same; or a lease from the Crown under the Returned Soldiers Settlement Acts; or a lease from the Crown under the Prickly-pear Act, 1924-1930; or an occupation permit or forest lease from the Crown under the Forestry Act, 1916; or a lease from the Crown under the Closer Settlement Acts, is exempt.

#### LETTER OR POWER OF ATTORNEY.

The duty of £1 shall be charged on Letters or Powers of Attorney or other instruments in the nature of such, coming within paragraph (5) under the heading "Letter or Power of Attorney" in the Second Schedule to the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924.

#### MARKETABLE SECURITIES.

Every sharebroker shall, in the case of sales of marketable securities made by him in respect of which no instrument of transfer is executed, make at the prescribed times and in the prescribed manner and form a return to the Commissioner, verified by statutory declaration, showing the prescribed particulars of such sales, and pay to the Commissioner a sum equal to the amount which would have been payable as stamp duty if a transfer on each of such sales had been executed and duly stamped. Any sharebroker who pays any amount to the Commissioner under this section may retain the same out of any moneys in his hands belonging to the purchaser of the marketable security.

#### OPTIONS.

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The interest created by an agreement by which an option is given or taken to purchase or sell any property in New South Wales other than stock or marketable security, shall be deemed to be property for the purposes of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, and the agreement shall be liable to duty as an agreement for the sale or conveyance of property in New South Wales accordingly.

The ad valorem duty chargeable on the agreement, if any, made in pursuance of and by the exercise of the option shall be reduced by the amount of the ad valorem duty paid on the agreement creating the option.

Provided that if the value of the dutiable estate of such deceased when aggregated with the value of all his foreign assets does not, after deducting therefrom all debts actually due and owing by the deceased at the date of his death other than the debts referred to in subsection two of section one hundred and seven of the Stamp Dutics Act, 1920-1924, exceed one thousand pounds, no death duty shall be chargeable on any property passing by the intestacy or by the will of the deceased to any person who in the opinion of the Commissioner was dependent on the deceased for maintenance and support

DEBTS TO BE ALLOWED.

In computing the final balance of the estate of a deceased person for the purpose of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution-

(1). The allowance to be made under section 107 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, for unsecured debts shall extend only to those debts payable to persons domiciled or carrying on business within

New South Wales but not being in either case debts contracted for  $\alpha$ r in connection with a business or a branch of a business of the deceased located out of New South Wales save that—

(a) where there are no foreign assets, all unsecured debts so far as they are not allowed under the preceding provision of this paragraph may be deducted from the dutiable estate of the deceased;

(b) where there are foreign assets-

(i) all unsecured debts (so far as they are not allowed under the said preceding provision) payable to persons domiciled or carrying on

business out of New South Wales but being in either case debts contracted for or in connection with a business or branch of a business of the deceased located in New South Wales may be deducted from the dutiable estate of the deceased;

(ii) and matting and of any second of the deceased,

(ii) such portion only of any unsecured debt that is not allowed under the preceding provisions of this paragraph as exceeds the value of the foreign assets shall be deducted from the dutiable estate of the deceased.

(2) The allowance to be made for secured debts shall extend only to debts secured by mortgage, lien, or charge solely upon any part of the dutiable estate, save that--

(a) Where a debt is secured partly upon the dutiable estate and partly upon foreign assets, such portion only of such debt shall be allowed as bears the same ratio to the total debt as the value of the part of the dutiable estate so charged bears to the total value of the whole property of the deceased comprised in the security: Provided that no such allowance shall exceed the value of the part of the dutiable estate so charged.

(b) Where a debt secured solely upon any part of the foreign assets exceeds the value of the assets comprised in the security such portion of that excess may be allowed as the Commissioner thinks just and proper, having regard to the amount of the dutiable estate, the value of the foreign assets, the debts allowable out of the dutiable estate under the other provisions of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, and the whole of the debts of the decased.

#### DEDUCTIONS FROM DEATH DUTY.

Where the dutiable estate of a deceased person includes any property comprised in an instrument specified in subsection (2) of section 102 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and paragraphs 2 to 6 (both inclusive) of this resolution, there shall be deducted from the death duty assessed in respect of that property any ad valorem duty paid on such instrument, in respect of that property under Part III of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, less £1 for each separate instrument within the meaning of section 16 of the said Act, but not exceeding the amount of the death duty assessed in respect of that property.

HALF RATES ONLY CHARGEABLE,

Where the amount of the dutiable estate of a deceased person, when aggregated with the value of his foreign assets, does not, after deducting therefrom all debts actually due and owing by him at the time of his death other than the debts referred to in subsection two of section one hundred and seven of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, exceed three thousand pounds, death duty shall be chargeable at one-half the rate that would but for this provision be the rate prescribed by the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, on any property devolving by the intestacy on, or passing under the will of the deceased to his widow or to any of his children who at the time of his death were under 21 years of age, and on any other property included by the said Act and this resolution in the dutiable estate of the deceased the beneficial interest in which property is vested in, or on the death of the deceased passes to his widow or such child. The above reduction to half rates shall not apply to any such widow or child unless the Commissioner is satisfied that she or he was dependent upon the deceased for maintenance and support at the time of his death. .... 

Interest.

Except where administration is granted and issued and the death duty is paid within six months after the death of the deceased, interest at the rate of  $\pounds 10$  per cent, per annum of the amount of the duty payable shall be paid to the Commissioner by the administrator or person directed to deliver the account under section 120 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924.

Such interest shall be calculated from the date of the expiration of the said six months provided that in any case in which administration has been first granted out of Now South Wales the interest shall be calculated from the expiration of twelve months after the death of the deceased.

#### PROPERTY TO BE INCLUDED IN THE ESTATE.

In addition to the property of the deceased that is included in the estate of a deceased person for the purpose of assessment and payment of death duty under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, there shall also be included for such purposes the following:—

- (1) Where the deceased was domiciled in New South Wales, all personal property of the deceased situate outside New South Wales at his death (including all personal property so situate over which he had a general power of appointment, exercised by his will).
- (2) All property that a deceased person has at any time disposed of by will or by a settlement containing any trust in respect of that property to take effect after his death, made in the exercise of any special power of appointment (whether exercisable by the deceased alone or jointly with any other person), but so that the property to be included in the estate of the deceased shall be that which was at the time of his death subject to such trust.
- (3) The value (to be ascertained as at the date of the gift) of any property (not being property included in the estate under the provisions of subparagraph (b) of paragraph (2) of section 102 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, comprised in any gift made by a deceased person within three years before his death, and whenever made, including any money paid or other property conveyed or transferred by the deceased within such period in pursuance of a covenant or agreement made at any time by him without full consideration in money or money's worth:

Provided that the Commissioner may in his discretion reduce such value by the amount by which the value of the property given would in the ordinary course have depreciated in the hands of the deceased between the date of the gift and the date of his death:

Provided further that this subparagraph shall not apply to any such gift made to a public hospital or for the relief of poverty or the promotion of education in New South Wales.

- (4) Any property which or an interest in which a deceased person has at any time whatever, without full consideration in money or money's worth, caused to be conveyed to, or vested in, himself and any other person jointly, whether by disposition or otherwise, and whether by himself alone or in concert or by arrangement with any other person whatsoever so that a beneficial interest therein or in some part thereof passes or accrues by survivorship to any other person on the death of the deceased.
  - The value of the consideration in money or money's worth (if any) obtained by the deceased for the conveyance or vesting above mentioned shall be deducted from the value of the property included in the estate: Provided that no greater sum shall be so deducted than the difference between the value of such property and the value of the beneficial interests passing or accruing to any other person on the death of the deceased.
- (5) Any property owned by a deceased person immediately prior to the time of his death jointly with any other person to the extent of the beneficial interests therein passing or accruing by survivorship to any person on the death of the deceased.
- (6) The value (to be ascertained as at the date of the transfer or vesting) of the property described in subparagraph (l) of paragraph (2) of section 102 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, instead of the property so described but subject to the following:--
  - (i) The Commissioner may in his discretion reduce such value by the amount by which the value of the property transferred or vested would in the ordinary course have depreciated in the hands of the deceased between the date of the transfer or vesting and the date of his death; and
  - (ii) where property is included in the estate of a deceased person under this provision the shares or other consideration for the transfer shall not form part of the dutiable estate of the deceased.
- (7) Shares and stock held by a deceased person in any company, corporation, or society having a share register in New South Wales wherein such shares or stock are registered.
- (S) Legacies, bequests, and devises made by a deceased person shall be chargeable with death duty like other legacies, bequests, and devises.

REFUNDS.

(a) Where in the case of a deceased person death duty has been paid under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, on personal property situate in any part of His Majesty's Dominions other than New South Wales at such death, and it is shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that death duty (not being duty or tax under any Act of the Commonwealth of Australia) has been lawfully paid on such personal property to the part of His Majesty's Dominions in which such property is situate at such death in consequence of the death of the said deceased and of the property passing thereby, the Commissioner shall refund to the person who has paid the death duty under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, on such personal property an amount equal to the said death duty so paid thereon to the part of His Majesty's Dominions in which it is situate or to the said duty so paid thereon under the said Act and this resolution, whichever amount is the lesser. The Stamp Duties (Deductions) Act, 1904, is to be repealed.

(b) Where it is proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner that any property has been wrongly included in the dutiable estate of a deceased person the death duty paid in respect of such property shall be repaid by him, but (except in accordance with an order of the Court under section 124 of the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924) no refund shall be made in respect of any property wrongly included in the dutiable estate of any person whenever dying by reason or any mistake in the construction of the said Act, and no action or suit for recovery of any such refund shall be brought after three years from the date of payment.

#### SHAREHOLDERS IN COMPANIES.

Where a company (other than a company incorporated under the laws of New South Wales and having no share register outside New South Wales) carries on the business—

- (a) of mining for gold or other minerals as defined in the Mining Act, 1906, in New South Wales or of treating any such minerals;
- (b) of pastoral or agricultural production or timber-getting in New South Wales,

and a member of the company dies, wheresoever domiciled, there shall be charged and paid under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920, and any Act amending it, and this resolution (so far as they are applicable), without exemption or deduction, a duty on the value of the shares and stock in the company held by the member at the time of his death at the rate set out in the Schedule in this resolution for the death duty on an estate of a deceased person domiciled outside New South Wales, the final balance of which is equal to the value of the said shares and stock: Provided that where the company carries on any business outside New South Wales the duty under this heading payable by the company shall bear the same proportion to the said duty calculated according to the said Schedule as the value of the assets of the company situated in New South Wales bears to the total assets of the company wherever situated:

Provided further that where the company carries on the business of pastoral or agricultural production in New South Wales as mortgagee in possession only, no duty as aforesaid shall be payable by that company:

Provided further that where probate of the will or administration of the estate of any member of the company has been duly granted in New South Wales and the duty payable under the Stamp Duties Act, 1920, and any Act amending it and this resolution on such grant has been paid in respect of all shares and stock in the company held by such member at his death no duty under this heading shall be payable in respect of such shares and stock:

Provided further that the duty under this heading shall not attach to shares and stock registered in the share register kept in New South Wales of a company incorporated under the law of New South Wales.

For the purposes of this heading the term "assets" means the gross amount of all the real and personal property of the company of every kind including things in action, and without making any deduction in respect of any debts or liabilities of the company.

#### VARIATION OF DEFINITIONS.

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For the purposes of these resolutions and the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924--"Public Hospital" means a hospital which is an incorporated hospital or a separate institution within the meaning of the Public Hospitals Act, 1929.

"References in the Stamp Duties Act, 1920-1924, and this resolution, to gifts for the relief of poverty or the promotion of education include only gifts that have to be applied in New South Wales and that are intended to benefit the public or part of the public."

"(7) All interest accruing due on securities deposited shall be paid to the company depositing such securities as and when received by the Treasurer."

"(8) If it is proved to the satisfaction of the Treasurer that any company has acquired the share capital or the business of any other company a deposit as required by this Act by the acquiring company shall, if the Treasurer so certifies, be a sufficient compliance with the requirements of the Act."

"(9) For the purpose of computing the deposit required to be lodged by the acquiring company the premium income of that company shall be deemed to be the sum of the premium incomes of the acquiring company and of the company whose share capital or business has been acquired."

"(10) Any company, person, or association of persons (hereinafter called brokers) granting cover or receiving premiums, proposals, or requests in respect of general insurance business on behalf of or for transmission to any company, person, or association of persons, outside the State (hereinafter called the insurers) shall be deemed, for the purposes of this Act, to be a company carrying on in the State the insurance business to which the cover proposals, requests, or premiums relate, and such brokers shall make deposits of cash or securities under this Act accordingly. If several brokers act in respect of the granting of such cover, or in the doing of any of the acts aforesaid for one insurer or group or groups of insurers, the business deemed to be carried on by them under this section shall be regarded as a single insurance business, and the amount of any deposit required to be made under this Act shall be calculated accordingly."

4. STATE TRANSPORT (CO-ORDINATION) BILL:—The Order of the Day having been read, Mr. Speaker said he had looked into the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill. The Question of the right of the Legislative Council to make amendments which would affect the control of the public purse had been extensively dealt with, and the authorities thereon had been quoted in previous rulings in this House, notably in the lucid expositions given by Sir Daniel Levy in connection with the Income Tax (Management) Bill, 1928; Public Service (Salaries Reduction) Bill, 1930, and the Prevention and Relief of Unemployment Bill, 1930. He, therefore, would content himself with reading to the House the following Constitutional Rule from the Twelfth Edition of May's "Parliamentary Practice," page 510, which, in his opinion, contemplated amendments of the kind made in this Bill by the Legislative Council:—

> ". . . the Lords may not amend the provisions in Bills which they receive from the Commons, so as to alter, whether by increase or reduction, the amount of a rate or charge—its duration—mode of assessment, levy, collection, appropriation or management; or the persons who pay, receive, manage or control it; or the limits within which it is leviable."

It was his duty, as Speaker, to guard the privileges of the House, and he desired to direct the attention of the House to the nature of the amendments made by the Legislative Council, particularly the amendment in the proviso to subclause 5 of Clause 18. That amendment, amendments in Clauses 3 and 12, and other amendments, in his opinion, infringed the rights of the Assembly because—

- (1) The method of assessment of the charge was altered by the amendment which altered the weight of the vehicle, and the weight of loading upon which the charge was to have been collected.
- (2) The limits within which the charge was leviable were altered by the removal of certain persons from liability to pay the charges contemplated by the Bill.

He did not intend to make any further comment. In calling attention to the nature of the amendments, he had discharged his duty, and the responsibility of considering the amendments rested in the hands of the House.

Mr. Lang made a Ministerial Statement as to the intentions of the Government in respect to the amendments made by the Legislative Council.

Mr. Bavin also addressed the House.

On motion of Mr. Lang, Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair, and the Chairman reported progress and obtained leave to sit again at a later hour of the Day.

#### 5. PUBLIC SERVICE SALARIES BILL :---

Disagrees to the amendment on page 8, clause 7, lines 36 and 37, which omits the words "the Railway Commissioners"; the amendment on line 38, which inserts after the word "trust" the word "or"; the amendment on lines 38 and 39, which omits the words "or the Main Roads Board"; the amendments on line 41, which (a) omit the word "Minister" and insert the word "board," and which (b) omit the word "Minister's'" and insert the word "board's," because it is deemed necessary to have control by the Minister to effect co-ordination.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 9, which omits clause 9 and inserts new clause 9 in lieu thercof,—because the clause as originally drafted is essential for co-ordination.

Disagrees to the following amendments:--

Page 3, clause 3, lines 6 and 7, which omits the words "or in the course of any trade or business whatsoever."

Page 3, clause 3, lines 20 and 21, which omits the words "or in the course of "any trade or business whatsoever."

Page 3, clause 3, lines 24 and 25, which omits the words "or in the course of "any trade or business whatsoever."

Page 11, clause 12, which omits subclause (2).

Page 17, clause 18, line 9, which omits the words "capable of."

Page 17, clause 18, lines 9 and 10, which omits the words " (whether such weight "is carried or not)."

Page 17, clause 18, line 41, which inserts after the word "cxcceds" the words "a radius of," and omits the words "in length."

Page 18, clause 18, line 30, which inserts after the word "discretion" the words "on reasonable notice."

Page 21, which inserts a new clause to stand as clause 24,-

because these amendments affect the application of the taxation, alter the area and method of assessment of the charge, and, therefore, infringe the privileges of the Legislative Assembly.

Agrees to the amendment on page 12, clause 14, which adds certain provisos; but proposes to amend it by omitting the words-

"Provided that any person who is the holder of a current service license issued under the Transport Act, 1930, in respect of any such vehicle shall be entitled to a license under this Act for that vehicle, during the currency of such service license without payment therefor and if at any time the Board refuses to renew such license at its due date or from time to time on the expiration thereof unless such license shall have been cancelled under the provision of section twenty-one of this Act, such refusal shall be deemed a cancellation of such license within the meaning of section one hundred and fifty-eight of the Transport Act, 1930, by the Trust established under that Act and the provisions of sections one hundred and fifty-eight, one hundred and fifty-nine, one hundred and sixty, one hundred and sixty-one, and one hundred and sixty-two of such Act shall apply to such determination."

Page 3, clause 3, line 28. Omit "two hundred and"

Page 3, clause 4, subclause (1.) Omit paragraphs (a) and (b) insert-

"The salary of every officer shall be reduced as follows:-

By fifteen per cent. on that part of the salary which does not exceed two hundred pounds per annum.

By seventeen and one half per cent. on that part of the salary which exceeds two hundred pounds per annum but does not exceed four hundred pounds per annum.

By twenty per cent. on that part of the salary which exceeds four hundred pounds per annum but does not exceed six hundred pounds per annum.

By twenty-two and one-half per cent. on that part of the salary which exceeds six hundred pounds per annum but does not exceed eight hundred pounds per annum.

By thirty-two and one-half per cent. on that part of the salary which exceeds one thousand five hundred pounds per annum.

Provided that by the operation of this Act-

(1) Salaries of which the rate does not exceed two hundred and fifteen pounds per annum or four pounds two shillings and sixpence a week shall not be reduced by more than ten per cent.

(2) Salaries of which the rate exceeds two hundred and fifteen pounds per annum shall not be reduced below one hundred and ninetyfour pounds per annum.

Provided further that to every-

(1) Married male officer,

(2) Widower with dependent child or children,

(3) Widow with dependent child or children

whose salary does not exceed the rate of three hundred pounds per annum, there may, with the approval of the Governor, be granted by way of marriage allowance a rebate at a rate not exceeding fifteen pounds per annum from the deduction above prescribed. Salaries of which the rate exceeds three hundred pounds per annum shall not be reduced below two hundred and sixty-eight pounds per annum. Where by rationing of employment reduc-tion is made in the salary of any officer, the officer shall be given credit for the amount of such reduction as against the reduction to be made under this Act."

As recently as Session 1929-30, Sir Daniel Levy, the then Speaker, called attention to the amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Public Service (Salaries Reduction) Bill-a Bill similar in objective to the one now before the Chamber. In the Bill returned it would be found that the Legislative Council had made substantial alterations. The Bill, as it left this House, contained proposals for the reduction of certain salaries on a percentage basis and otherwise. It had been returned by the Legislative Council with amendments which made drastic variations in the original scheme. As Speaker, he directed attention to the nature of the amendments, and left the question of considering them to the House.

Whereupon Mr. Lang said that the Government considered that the amendments were an infringement of the rights and privileges of the Legislative Assembly. He, therefore, proposed in Committee to disagree with the amendments for that reason.

On the motion of Mr. Lang, Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair, and the Chairman reported that the Committee had disagreed with the Council's amendments.

The Legislative Council having had under consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 13th August, 1931, in reference to the Insurance Companies Deposits Bill,—

Does not insist upon its amendments in the Schedule on page 11, lines 9 to 28, which cover "General Insurance Business," and agrees to the Assembly's amendment which proposes to omit lines 9 to 28, on page 11, and insert a new Schedule to cover "General Insurance Business."

Disagrees to the Assembly's amendment upon the Council's amendment in clause 3, which added new subclauses (3) to (10) to that clause, by omitting new subclauses (3) to (9), inclusive.

Insists upon its other amendments in the Bill disagreed to by the Assembly for the following reasons:---

1. That the securities which may be lodged under the amendments are to be securities issued or guaranteed by the Government or the Parliament of the State or of the Commonwealth, and such securities will be a better protection to the policy-holders than a deposit of cash, which may be used as the Government thinks fit, and may not be available if and when needed.

2. That in the interests of policy-holders and for their protection an insurance company should be entitled to invest its funds in securities issued or guaranteed by the Government or the Parliament of the State or of the Commonwealth, and to keep its money invested in such securities, and should not be compelled to abstain from or to convert such investments in order that the deposits to be made in the Treasury should be in the form of cash instead of such Government securities as above mentioned to be held in trust for the companies depositing them.

3. That the necessity of making cash deposits at the present juncture may involve companies in serious financial loss through forced realisation of securities, and may impose undue financial strain upon some companies.



Disagrees to the amendment on page 19, clause 6, which adds at the end of the clause new subclause (5), because-

1. It encourages traffic in deposits which will be purchased by persons for the purpose of establishing a fund to pay death duties, and will thus benefit persons who are not now depositors.

2. It imports a preference in favour of one depositor or in favour of an assignce who was not previously a depositor.

3. The class of persons who would benefit by the amendment are those whose circumstances are affluent when compared with depositors generally.

4. Certain preferences which were included in the Bill as originally submitted to the Legislative Assembly were deleted in that Chamber. There is no justification for importing a new preference which has less to recommend it than many of the proposed preferences which were so deleted.

5. There is no justification for making this concession in relation to death duties unless a like concession is provided in relation to stamp duties, income-tax, license fees, and other ducs to the Crown.

Agrees to the amendment on page 25, clause 9, which adds new paragraph (c), but proposes to amend the amendment by omitting the words "section forty-four of the Government Savings Bank Act, 1906," and inserting the words "the Government Savings Bank Act, 1906, as amended by subsequent Acts."

Agrees to the other amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Bill.

And the Assembly requests the concurrence of the Legislative Council in its disagreement from, and amendment upon, the Council's amendments in the Bill.

1. The constitution of any form of Greater Sydney Council is allimportant. The method of election proposed by the Legislative Assembly would entail the use of the political machine and would inevitably result in the matter being considered from a purely party political aspect, and the civic importance of the election would be lost sight of. councils, with the probable result that they would not work in harmony or co-operation. The method suggested by the Council is based upon the broad franchise given by the Local Government Act, but the choice of members of the Greater Sydney Council would be made by the aldermen of the constituent councils, thus ensuring a harmonious working together of the whole local government machinery of the Greater Sydney Area.

2. The transference of the Sydney Harbour Trust to the Greater Sydney Council is wrong in principle. The shipping facilities that Sydney can offer should be under the control of Parliament. The Port of Sydney is the main outlet for the primary produce of the State. If it was under the control of a Greater Sydney Council the primary producers would have no say in its government, and the right they at present possess of making representations to Parliament would be practically destroyed.

3. The placing of the Fire Brigades Board under the Greater Sydney Council is a dangerous experiment with a body which has the duty of protecting life and property against fire. The proposal would split it into two parts, tending to increase the expense of maintenance and at the same time impair its efficiency. Every authority in every country fire district in New South Wales is in favour of the present administration, which is admitted to be the most efficient throughout the Commonwealth. Chief Officer Dane of London said, at the Fire Brigades Conference in that city, "We shall have to adopt the Australian system of Fire Brigades Board." The proposal in the Bill has met with opposition both from the insurance companies and from the councils who provide the Board's revenue, and from the employces of the Board itself. Under present conditions the Board's office can be used as a training ground for the whole State, and an employee even in a remote country town can by ability rise to the highest position at head office.

4. Many of the parks proposed to be taken away from the control of the State and placed under the Greater Sydney Council are essentially of a national character and significance. Neilsen Park and Wentworth House have no particular civic value although they are the birthplace of the Constitution. Taronga Park is as much a national possession as the Art Gallery. National Park and Ku-ring-gai Chase are national assets maintained out of the national purse. The clause is of a sweeping nature and the House is unable to guage the financial burden involved or what parks other than those specifically mentioned will be affected. The proposed transfer will create a threefold system, such parks as the Botanical Gardens and the Outer Domain being left under Government control, other parks under the Greater Sydney Council, and Hyde Park and smaller parks under local councils.

5. The proposal to transfer electrical undertakings maintained by the St. George County Council and by various municipal and shire councils is unnecessary. Although it was represented that the proposed transfer would result in economy and a better public service, the people in the areas affected, who must be taken to understand their own business, have protested strongly against the proposed transfer. These separate undertakings have grown up naturally in answer to a public demand, and it would not be wise to take them away from the people who have established them. If they are omitted from the proposal there will be nothing to prevent them joining up with the Greater Sydney supply whenever it is to the benefit of the people concerned that they should do so.

6. In view of the huge undertakings proposed to be transferred to the Greater Sydney Council (most of which carry heavy loan indebtedness) the question of burdening the City of Sydney with further loans requires careful consideration. The omission of clause 141 (1) (b) is a necessary precaution for the people against heavy financial burdens. Some of the undertakings which are transferred are heavily encumbered and are running at a loss. Under the Greater Sydney Council they should, as in the past, arrange their own finances and endeavour to live within their income. If moneys borrowed in respect of each undertaking can be secured upon every source of income of the city, a valuable safeguard upon careful finance will be taken away.

7. The special franchise provisions of the Bill are not warranted. The franchise under the Local Government Act and the Sydney Corporation Act has been frequently reviewed and discussed and is already of a very liberal nature. Under the present law practically every person with sufficient permanency of residence to be classified as a citizen is given a vote. Under the proposed franchise the passing visitor would have a voice in the government of the city.

8. The enlargement of the City of Sydney by the immediate addition to it of six municipalities and the subsequent addition of a further four is not in the best interests of the government of those areas. The experience gained by the City of Brisbane in creating a huge civic aggregation on a unified scheme has shown that such a change is not in the interests of economy.

2. The Crown has always actively asserted its ownership to the soil in the beds of non-tidal lakes, and owners of grants or alienated lands, measured to the banks of lakes, have, by accepting leases from the Crown and by paying rent, acknowledged the Crown's ownership.

3. The clause as amended would have no application to future grants or alienations of land on the banks of lakes, inasmuch as the practice of the Department of Lands for many years past has been to expressly exclude ownership in the soil of lake beds.

4. If the view taken by the Legislative Council is correct, the titles to a large area of land comprised in lake beds, already alienated by the Crown to persons other than owners on the banks of the lakes, may be adversely affected.

5. Hitherto the titles to such areas have been accepted as good titles, and advances have been made on the security of the same.

Disagrees to the amendment in clause 10, because,-

1. The amendment inserted by the Legislative Council is in direct conflict with the provisions of the Public Service Act, which require all officers of the Public Service to retire at the age of 65 years.

2. Chairmen of Local Land Boards are compelled by law to retire at the age of 65 years, and there is no reason why lay members of Local Land Boards should be retained for a period of five years longer than the chairmen.

And the Assembly requests the concurrence of the Legislative Council in its disagreements from the Council's amendments in the Bill.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 2, clause 2, line 23, which after the word "propelling" inserts the words "or auxiliary,"—because the Navigation Act of 1901 does not cover the inspection and certification of engines and boilers excepting those used as part of the propelling machinery of any ship.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 2, clause 2, line 24, which after the word "ship" inserts the words "and subject to survey as prescribed by the Department of Navigation, State or Federal, or by Lloyds' Register, or the British Corporation,"—because a State Act cannot override a Federal Law and inspection certificates of other bodies are accepted by Federal Navigation Authorities.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 3, clause 2, line 10, which after the word "ten" inserts the word "nominal,"-because it is not advisable to fix in the Act the character of the horse-power in respect of engines. This should be reckoned in a manner prescribed by Regulations.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 3, clause 2, which at the end of the clause adds new paragraph (e), because,—it limits the operation of the Bill and there would be no control over the design or safe working pressure certification of these vessels.

Disagrees to the amendment on pages 5 and 6, clause 5, which omits lines 32 to 41 inclusive on page 5, and lines 1 to 4 inclusive on page 6, and inserts the following words:—

"'Engine' means-

(a) winding engine being a piece of mechanism other than a crane or hoist fitted with a rotary drum having a cable rope or chain attached thereto, and used for lifting and/or lowering human beings, such mechanism being operated by power other than hand or animal power;
(b) locomotive cranes, that is, cranes mounted upon the superstructure of a locomotive engine running on railway lines used for general locomotive traffic;

(c) railroad locomotive engine;

(d) eranes on buildings in course of construction;

(e) steam navvies."

because,—the ten classes of certificates provided for in clause forty-four would be reduced to five.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 6, clause 5, line 18, which after the word "appointed" inserts the words "or licensed," as consequential upon its disagreement with the amendment on page 8, clause 6, which adds at the end of subclause (1) the words "and may issue to such persons who apply and who have the necessary qualifications under this part licenses to act as inspectors under this Act."

Disagrees to the amendment on page 8, clause 5, which omits lines 8 to 12 inclusive, as consequential upon its disagreement with the Council's definition of "Engine" in clause 5.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 8, clause 6, line 26, which at the end of subclause (1) adds the following words, " and may issue to such persons who apply and who have the necessary qualifications under this Part licenses to act as inspectors under this Act,"—because the amendment continues the present system of inspection of boilers by licensed inspectors.

The following Message sent to the Legislative Council:---

Mr. President,---

The Legislative Assembly having had under consideration the Legislative Council's Message, dated 24th September, 1931, requesting its concurrence in certain amendments made by the Council in the Coal Mines Regulation (Amendment) Bill,—

Disagrees to the amendment on page 4, clause 6, which inserts new subclause (6),—because the amendment would nullify the latter provisions of Section 22 (3) (a), and would relax the safety provisions of Section 22 of the Principal Act already in force.

Disagrees to the amendments on page 6, which omit clauses 9 and 10,because it is essential that the check-inspector be supplied with notice in order that he may properly investigate the matter.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 9, clause 12, which inserts new subclause (5),—because the Service Certificates would perpetuate the present system, and the Bill provides for a period of twelve months in which to obtain a certificate, and this is equivalent to granting a Service Certificate for a period of twelve months.

Disagrees to the amendments on pages 12 and 13, clause 16 (1) (b) (d), and (e),—because the vital parts of the provisions are taken away, making the rule of less value so far as safety is concerned than General Rule 4 now in operation.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 13, clause 16 (1) (c), line 28, which inserts after the word "normally" the words "and by inserting after the word 'gas' in general Rule 8 (1) (b) the words 'when sampled in the same manner provided for intake air under General Rule (1) (c) of the Principal Act",—because this amendment would defeat the whole purpose of the subclause, which is to have safety lamps installed when the air current in the return air-way at any time contains more than  $\frac{1}{2}$  percentum of inflammable gas, and not when it "normally" contains more, and is not in the interests of safety.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 13, clause 16 (1) (c), line 40, which omits the words "however small",—because endless disputes would be created, as some persons cannot see less than 2 to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of inflammable gas on the fiame of an ordinary safety-lamp, whilst a competent person would be able to detect 1 to  $1\frac{1}{4}$  per cent.

- (b) (i) Every bookmaker licensed or registered by any racing club to bet at meetings for greyhound-racing on any racecourse situate within forty miles of the General Post Office, Sydney, and who at any time during the year commencing on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, and ending on the thirtieth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, or during any subsequent year commencing on the first day of October and ending on the thirtieth day of September following, holds a license issued at any time by the racing club managing any such racecourse to carry on his business on any such racecourse, shall for each such year in which he holds such license pay to His Majesty a tax of the amount following:
  - If any such license is for the saddling paddock the amount of the tax shall be twenty pounds.
  - If no such license is for the saddling paddock the amount shall be ten pounds.

(ii) Every bookmaker licensed or registered by any racing club to bet at meetings for greyhound-racing on any racecourse situate beyond forty miles of the General Post Office, Sydney, and who at any time during the year commencing on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, and ending on the thirtieth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, or during any subsequent year commencing on the first day of October and ending on the thirtieth day of September following, holds a license issued at any time by the racing club managing any such racecourse to carry on his business on any such racecourse, shall for each such year in which he holds such license pay to His Majesty a tax of the amount following :-

- If any such license is for the saddling paddock the amount of the tax shall be ten pounds.
- If no such license is for the saddling paddock the amount shall be five pounds, . .

(i) for admission to the saddling paddock-

(a) where such person is a male, a tax of one shilling;

29. BOILER INSPECTION AND ENGINE-DRIVERS BILL :-- Mr. Speaker reported the following Message from the Legislative Council :---

MR. SPEAKER.

The Legislative Council having had under consideration the Legislative Assembly's Message, dated 25th September. 1931, a.m., in reference to the Boiler Inspection and Engine-drivers Bill,-

- Insists upon its following amendments, disagreed to by the Assembly,-
- Page 2, clause 2, line 23, which after the word "propelling" inserts the words "or auxilliary",-because the word must be retained to prevent duplication of inspection where the Navigation Act, 1901, or Lloyd's Register, or the British Corporation applies.

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- Page 2, clause 5, line 18, which after the word "appointed" inserts the words "or licensed," as consequential upon its insistence on its amendment on page 8, clause 6, which adds certain words at end of subclause (1).
- Page 8, clause 6, line 26, which at the end of subclause (1) adds the following words:—"and may issue to such persons who apply and who have the necessary qualifications under this part licenses to act as inspectors under this Act", because it provides for the most efficient, safe, and economical inspection of boilers, with the least interference and cost to enterprise and without cost to the Consolidated Revenue.
- Page 9, clause 6, which adds new subclause (4),-because this provides for the recognition of licensed inspectors at present licensed under the Factories and Shops Act, 1912.
- Page 19, clause 24, which omits subclauses (2), (3), and (4),—because the prescribed fees outlined by the Government are considerably in excess of the fees charged at the present time by licensed inspectors, and would more than double the cost to industry.
- Page 41, clause 66, lines 28 to 32, which omits paragraph (h),—because this is consequential on the Council's amendment in clause 47, which omits subclause (2) of that clause.
- Page 9, in clauses 7 and 8,—because they are consequential on the Council's insistence upon its amendment on page 8, clause 6, which adds new subclause (1).
- Page 22, clause 29, lines 28 and 29, which omits the words "upon payment of the prescribed fee," as consequential upon its insistence on its amendment in clause 24.
- Page 31, which omits clause 44 and inserts new clause 44, as consequential upon its insistence on its amendment in the definition of "Engine" in clause 5.

Page 32, clause 46, line 12, which omits the words "or boiler attendant."

- Page 32, clause 46, which omits subclause (4).
- Page 33, clause 47, lines 35 and 36, which omits the words "or attendant."
- Page 33, clause 47, line 36, which omits the words "or boiler"
- Pages 32 and 33, clause 47, line 40 on page 33, and lines 1 to 14 on page 34, which omits the words "or to any person employed as boiler attendant at a range of boilers in charge of a person who is the holder of a certificate of the class prescribed" and which omits subclause (2).
- Page 34, clause 49, lines 25 and 26, which omits "or takes charge of or attends to any boiler."
- Page 34, clause 49, lines 33 and 34, which omits the words "or takes charge of or attends to any boiler"
- Page 36, clause 55, lines 32 and 33, which omits the words "or boiler as the case may be"

Page 37, clause 56, lines 12 and 13, which omits the words "or attendants in charge of boilers or engines",-

for the reasons outlined for its amendment in clause 44.

Does not insist on its amendment on page 2, clause 2, line 24, disagreed to by the Assembly which after the word "ship" inserts the words "and subject to survey as prescribed by the Department of Navigation, State or Federal, or by Lloyd's Register, or the British Corporation," but proposes to amend the same by omitting the words "Department of Navigation, State or Federal" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Navigation Act of 1901",—because this overcomes the conflict between State and Federal law as objected to by the Legislative Assembly.

Does not insist on its amendment on page 3, clause 2, which adds new paragraph (e), but proposes to amend the clause by the insertion of the following new paragraph:—"(c) In respect of unfired pressure vessels only extend to the registration, design, inspection, and cortification thereof",—because this now gives control over the design and safe working pressure of these vessels.

Does not insist on its amendment on pages 5 and 6, clause 5, disagreed to by the Assembly, which omits lines 32 to 41, inclusive, on page 5, and lines 1 to 4, inclusive, on page 6, which inserts a new definition of "Engine," but proposes to amend it by omitting all words after "winding engine" in paragraph (a) and inserting the words "as herein defined"; by inserting the words "or hoists" after the word "cranes" in paragraph (d); and by adding at the end of paragraph (d) the words " and cranes or hoists having a lift exceeding fifty feet", because this now provides for the certification of drivers of engines that are dangerous to life and property. No case has been made out for the necessity

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of the certification of any other engine-drivers in which life and property would be endangered by the employment of non-certificated persons. Certification of drivers of engines of other than those set out would be a useless burden tc industry, with many disadvantages.

Does not insist upon its other amendments disagreed to by the Assembly And the Council requests the concurrence of the Legislative Assembly in its further amendments in clauses 2 and 5.

Insists on its amendment on page 4, clause 6, disagreed to by the Assembly, which inserts new subclause (6),—because the attention of highly-qualified electricians to these small sets is unnecessary. There is no risk of any danger either on the surface or in the underground places covered by the amendment.

Insists on its amendments on page 6, disagreed to by the Assembly, which omit clauses 9 and 10,—because the Bill would virtually give check inspectors the same status in a collicry as the Government inspectors, which is very undesirable.

Insists on its amendment on page 9, clause 12, disagreed to by the Assembly, which inserts new subclause (5),—because this amendment provides for the issue of certificates of competency as surveyors to persons now engaged as mine surveyors or previously engaged for two years as such. There is ample precedent for the issue of the "service" certificates, as they have in earlier periods of legislation in respect of coal-mining hean issued to managers, under-managers and deputies. A surveyor who has had this practical experience would be fully qualified to make accurate surveys, so that there would be no risk to be feared of errors such as the Bill seeks to guard against.

Insists on its amendments on pages 12 and 13, clause 16 (1) (b), (d), and (e), disagreed to by the Assembly,—because the amendments are designed to restore the provisions of General Rule (4) to those fixed in the Principal Act, which are as recommended by the Edmunds Commission which inquired into and rejected proposals similar to those embodied in the new rule proposed by the Bill. The restriction of the period within which the pre-work inspection is to be made (which is now fixed by the special rules at each colliery and is readily capable of reduction by amendment of the special rules if the Department of Mines thinks circumstances necessitate that course), and the provisions for two inspections in a shift, and that no place shall remain uninspected for an interval of more than five hours, will necessitate the employment of a very large number of extra deputies. This would involve considerable extra cost, which the recommendations of the Edmunds Commission showed to be unnecessary.

Insists on its amendments on page 13, clause 16 (1) (c), line 28, disagreed to by the Assembly,—because it is not possible to detect one-half per cent. of inflammable gas in a safety-lamp. This must be done by analysis, and the proposed amendment fixes the method by which samples of air are to be taken on the same basis as that prescribed in General Rule (1) (c) of the Principal Act. If this amendment is not made there is no prescribed manner in which the percentage of inflammable gas is to be determined.

Insists on its amendment on page 13, clause 16 (1) (c), line 34, disagreed to by the Assembly,—because gas in small quantities is very difficult to detect and bona fide differences of opinion may exist as to whether it is present or not. The inspector should therefore be under the obligation of "definitely" establishing its presence before he forces a colliery into the expense of installing safetylamps which the Court of Coal Mines Regulation may afterwards decide to be unnecessary.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 18, clause 24, which omits the words "with the approval of the Minister,"—because, it is deemed essential to have control by a Minister responsible to Parliament.

Disagrees to the amendments on pages 19 to 24, inclusive, which omit clauses 26 to 34, inclusive,—because, the power to vest milk in the Board is necessary for the proper regulation of the collection and distribution of milk and the maintenance of a minimum price to dairymen.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 27, which omits clause 38,—because the Government has a mandate to give the Board full trading power, and these powers are necessary for the purpose of the Act.

Disagrees to the amendment on page 41, which omits clause 46; and to the amendments on pages 32 to 36 inclusive, which omit clauses 48 to 60 inclusive; and to the amendments on pages 39 to 42 inclusive, which omit clauses 68 to 74 inclusive,—because these powers are necessary to the exercise of the powers proposed in clause 38 of the Bill.

Disagrees to the amendments on page 43, clause 75, which, after line 9, inserts new subclause (a) and which adds at the end of the clause new subclause (e), as consequential upon its disagreement with the amendment in clause 7, which inserts new subclause (2).

Disagrees to the amendment on page 45, clause 78, lines 28 and 29, which omits the words "or any property of which it has entered into possession pursuant to section 69 of this Act,"—because this power is essential for the exercise of powers proposed in clause 38.

Agrees to the other amendments made by the Legislative Council in the Bill.

And the Assembly requests the concurrence of the Legislative Council in its disagreements from the Council's amendments in the Bill.

- (3) All existing stocks are Commonwealth securities and can be redeemed or converted on maturity dates only under authority of the Loan Council. The State, therefore, has no power to redeem stocks and consequently should the deposit represented by securities need to be made readily available at any time the Government will be forced to realise on the bonds in the open market at the prevailing price, which at present is much below par. Consequently, the Government may not be in a position to honour its obligations to make available to the depositors the full value of their deposits if required.

And the Assembly requests the Legislative Council again to reconsider its disagreement with the Assembly's amendment to the Council's amendment in clause 3, and the Council's amendments insisted upon by the Council, with which the Assembly still insists upon disagreement.

The Legislative Council has this day agreed to the Bill, returned herewith, intituled, "An Act to provide for the regulation of the conditions of industries in certain particulars by means of industrial conciliation and arbitration; to establish and define the powers, jurisdiction, and procedure of an industrial commission, conciliation committees, and certain other tribunals; to amend the Supreme Court and Circuit Court Acts, 1900, and certain other Acts; to repeal the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912, the Industrial Arbitration (Amendment) Act, 1926, and certain other Acts; and for purposes connected therewith, with the amendments, including an amendment in the Title, indicated by the accompanying Schedule, in which amendments the Council requests the concurrence of the Legislative Assembly.

#### INDUSTRIAL CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL.

The commission shall be a superior court of record, and its seal shall be judicially noticed.

(2) A person to be qualified for appointment as a member shall be a puisne judge of the Supreme Court, a District Court judge, a barrister of not less than five years' standing, or a solicitor of not less than seven years' standing.

Each member shall, subject to this section hold office during good behaviour, shall have the same rank, title, status, and precedence and the same salary pension, and other rights as a puisne judge of the Supreme Court, and shall be removable from office in the same manner only as a judge of the Supreme Court is by law liable to be removed from his office.

Such salary and pension shall be charged upon and be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Each member shall retire on the day on which he attains the age of seventy years, unless he is granted retiring leave, in which case he shall retire on the expiration of such leave.

A member of the commission shall not be capable of accepting or holding any other office or any other place of profit within the State, except any such judicial office as may be conferred upon him by or under any law of the State. •: N2

that the profits of an industry are not sufficient to enable him to pay the wages or grant the conditions claimed, no person shall be required without his consent to produce his books, or to give evidence with regard to the trade sccrets, profits, losses, receipts, and outgoings of his business, or his financial position.

Where a person raises such objection he may be required, on the order of the chairman, to produce the books used in connection with the carrying on of the industry in respect of which the claim is made, and to give evidence with regard to the profits, losses, receipts, and outgoings in connection with such industry, but he shall not be required to give evidence regarding any trade secret, or, saving as hereinbefore provided, his financial position. No such evidence shall be given without his consent except in the presence of the members of the committee alone, and no person shall inspect such books except the chairman or an accountant appointed by the committee, who may report to the committee whether or not his examination of such books supports the evidence so given, but shall not otherwise disclose the contents of such books. Such accountant shall, before acting under this paragraph, take the oath prescribed in respect of members of a committee by section fifteen of this Act;"

(3) Where an order is made under subsection one of this section against any person, and the registrar or magistrate is of opinion that the breach was committed by the wilful act or default or such person, he may on motion or without motion, and in addition to any order made, grant a writ of injunction to restrain such person from committing further or other breaches of the award or industrial agreement.

If any person disobeys such writ of injunction he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable to imprisonment for any period not exceeding six months.

Such person may be committed for trial for such offence by any justice or justices acting under and in pursuance of the Justices Act, 1902, and any Acts amending the same, or by the court. For the purposes of such com-mittal the court shall have the powers of a justice or justices under the said Acts.'

The commission or magistrate may further order that the employee be reimbursed the wages lost by him, and the commission may also direct his reinstatement in his old or a similar position.

In any proceeding for an offence against this section, if all the facts and circumstances constituting the offence, other than the reason for the defendant's action, are proved, it shall lie upon the defendant to prove that he was not actuated by the reason alleged in the charge.

In a proceeding for an offence in respect of paragraph (d) of this section it shall not be necessary for the prosecution to prove among the facts and circumstances constituting the offence that the employer unreasonably refused leave.

A prosecution under this section may be taken before the commission or an industrial magistrate by the secretary of the industrial union concerned in the industry in which the employee alleged to have been so dismissed, injured, or prejudiced was employed: Provided always that if any party feels aggrieved by any decision of a magistrate, he may appeal in the prescribed manner to the commission.

No prosecution for an offence under this section shall be commenced except by leave of the commission."

  - (ii) that contribution to such separate fund shall not be a condition of admission to or membership of the said union;
  - (iii) that a member who does not contribute to such separate fund shall not be excluded from any benefits of the union or placed under any disability or at any disadvantage as compared with other members of the union by reason of his failure to so contribute.

(2) The expression "political objects" in the last preceding subsection means the payment of any expenses incurred either directly or indirectly by a candidate or prospective candidate for election to Parliament or to any public office, before, during, or after the election in connection with his candidature or election; or the holding of any meeting or the distribution of any literature or documents in support of any such candidate or prospective candidate; or the maintenance of any person who is a member of Parliament or who holds a public office; or the registration of electors, or the selection of a candidate for Parliament or any public office; or the holding of political meetings of any kind, or the distribution of political literature or political documents of any kind, unless the main purpose of the meeting or of the distribution of the literature or documents is the furtherance of the objects set out in the definition of "trade union" in section thirty-one of the Trade Union Act of 1881, or the maintenance and publication of a newspaper other than a non-political trade journal.

(3) The expression "public office" in the last preceding subsection means the office of member of any shire or municipal council, or the Municipal Council of Sydney, or of any public body which has power to raise money, either directly or indirectly, by means of a rate.

The provisions of this section shall apply to a union which is in whole or in part an association or combination of other unions, as if the individual members of the component unions were the members of that union and not the unions.

If any member of a trade union alleges that he is aggrieved by a breach of any rule relating to any of the matters mentioned in subsection (2) (b) of this section, he may complain to the commission, which commission, after giving the complainant and any representative of the union the opportunity of being heard, may, if it considers that such a breach has been committed, make such an order for remedying the breach as it thinks just under the circumstances, and any such order shall be binding and conclusive on all parties without appeal."

(3) If no application is made under this section after receipt of the notice by the employer or if an application is made and the notice is not set aside the employer shall make the deductions from the salary wages or remuncration of the employee and make payments thereof to the union as provided by this section. Any payments made by an employer to a union under this section shall for the purpose of this Act be considered as payments to the employee."

"57. After the commencement of this Act the entrance fee of any indus trial union of employees shall not exceed in the case of males two pounds and in the case of females ten shillings and the annual subscription due or payable by any member whether such subscription is payable annually or otherwise together with the levies imposed during any year shall not exceed in the case of males four pounds and in the case of females one pound provided that any industrial union of employees may apply to the industrial registrar for exemption from the provisions of this section."

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"58. (1) An industrial union of employees shall not impose a penalty or fine on any of its members for a breach or non-observance of any resolution of the union unless the terms of the resolution are clearly set out in the rules of the union.

A license shall not be issued or renewed unless the Minister or such magistrate determines that the applicant is a fit person to hold the license.

The magistrate shall for the purposes of any such inquiry and determination have the same powers as if he were sitting in a court of petty sessions, and the inquiry were a matter for hearing and determination therein.

The applicant and all persons who in the manner prescribed notify their objection to the issue or renewal of the license shall have notice of such inquiry and shall be entitled to be heard thereat, personally or by counsel, attorney, or agent. There shall be an appeal as prescribed by way of rehearing from the decision of a magistrate to the commission.

86. It shall be the duty of every holder of a license under this Part of this Act to keep as prescribed—

- (a) a register in which shall be entered the age, sex, trade or occupation, name and address of every person who applies to such licensee for employment, and pays a fee in respect of his application, and the name and nature of the employment required by him; and
- (b) a separate register in which shall be entered the name and address of every person who so applies for labour, and pays a fee in respect of his application, and the name and nature of the employment which he offers;
- (c) a further separate register of all engagements made by or through such license; and
- (d) the originals of all letters received by such licensee, or by his agents or servants in connection with his agency or business during the next preceding two years.

Such registers and letters shall, at all reasonable hours, be open to the inspection and examination of any officer appointed by the Minister for the purpose.

87. The scale of fees chargeable by and payable to licensees in respect of agencies or businesses to which their licenses relate shall be as prescribed, and the said scale of fees shall be posted, and kept posted, in some conspicuous place in the premises in which such agencies or businesses are carried on so as to be seen by all persons entering such premises.

88. (1) A licensee shall not, directly or indirectly-

- (a) demand or receive for or in respect of the registration or engagement of any person any greater or other fees than those prescribed;
- (b) take or accept any goods or chattels in payment, or as security for the payment of the prescribed fees, or receive or accept any reward or other consideration in addition to the said fees;
- (c) give or pay to any employer, or to the foreman or agent of any employer, for or in respect of the hiring of any employee any share or part of the prescribed fees; nor shall any employer, foreman, or agent, directly or indirectly take or receive from a licensee any share or part of such fees;
- (d) keep as lodgers any persons seeking employment, or have any shars or interest in the keeping of a lodging-house for such persons.

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(2) Any sum of money or any goods or chattels received, taken, accepted, given or paid in contravention of the provisions of the preceding subsection, may, notwithstanding that a penalty for such contravention may be enforced, be ordered by a magistrate to be forfeited to the Crown, or if such money, goods, or chattels shall have been exacted under duress exercised by the person receiving or taking the same to be repaid or redelivered to the person from whom the exaction has been made.

(3) The fact that any member of the licensee's household keeps any such persons as lodgers, or keeps any lodging-house for such persons, shall be prima facie evidence that the licensee so keeps such persons or has an interest in the keeping of such lodging-house as aforesaid.

(4) Every contract or agreement made between any licensee or member of his household and any other person relating to the keeping as lodgers of persons seeking employment, or to the keeping of a lodging-house for such persons, shall be illegal and void for all purposes.

89. Where any person who applies for employment or for labour has paid to any licensee a registration fee and such person does not obtain employment or labour through such licensee within fourteen days after registration as aforesaid, then the licensee shall upon demand repay and return to such person the fee so paid, less any out of pocket expenses incurred by the licensee in respect of such person: Provided that such demand shall be made within thirty days after the expiration of the period aforesaid, and that the amount of out of pocket expenses to be charged shall in case of dispute be fixed by the Minister or any officer appointed by him for the purpose.

90. A licensee shall not publish or cause to be published any false information or make any false promise concerning or relating to work or employment to anyone who registers for employment.

A licensec shall not make or cause to be made any false entries in the registers to be kept as in this Act provided.

91. Every conviction against a licensee shall be endorsed on his license by the court before or by whom such conviction is had, and, upon failure to deliver up his license for such endorsement or upon a third conviction within three years from the first conviction, the license shall be cancelled, and the clerk of the court shall notify the Minister for that purpose.

For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this section the judge, magistrate, or justice may order the defendant to produce and deliver up his license.

92. A person whose license has been cancelled shall not be entitled to hold a license until the expiration of one year from the date of such cancellation.

93. A licensee shall not be entitled to maintain an action for the recovery of fees unless at the trial he produces his license.

94. On satisfactory proof of loss or destruction of a license, and on the payment of one shilling, the Minister may, at the request of the licensee, issue a duplicate license bearing all endorsements, and such duplicate shall avail for all purposes as if it were the original license."

- (a) any deed, memorandum of mortgage, agreement, or instrument whatever, whereby security for payment of money is granted over, or
- (b) any equitable mortgage by deposit of title deeds or other instruments or papers of, or

(c) any charge for the securing of money (howsoever created) upon,

land of any estate or interest therein or any mortgage of or charge upon land or any estate or interest therein, whether land or estate or interest therein or such mortgage or charge forms the whole or part of the security, and notwithstanding the absence from New South Wales at any time of any specialty constituting or relating in any way to any debt.

And that for the purposes of this Resolution the amount secured by a mortgage shall mean the total amount of all the moneys secured by the mortgage at the said date on any account whatever other than interest which at that date has not been or is not liable to be capitalised or to have interest charged upon it in any other way:

(2) Provided that where a mortgage at the said date comprises other property in addition to land or any estate or interest therein, or any mortgage of or charge upon land or any estate or interest therein, for the purposes of this Resolution, the amount secured by the mortgage shall not exceed such sum as in the opinion of the Commissioner of Taxation represents the total value as at the said date of all the land and estates and interests in land and mortgages of and charges upon land or estates or interests therein subject to the mortgage:

(3) Provided further that where a mortgage at the said date is subject to a mortgage, for the purposes of this Resolution, the amount secured by the mortgage first mentioned in this proviso shall not exceed the sum by which the amount secured by that mortgage ascertained as hereinbefore provided exceeds the amount secured by the mortgage that is a mortgage of that mortgage ascertained as provided as aforesaid.

And that a mortgage owned by-

(a) the Crown; or

- (b) any hospital which is an incorporated hospital or a separate institution within the meaning of the Public Hospitals Act, 1929; or (c) any friendly society or branch registered under the Friendly Societies
- Act, 1912, or any amendment thereof; or
- (d) any trade union registered under the Trades Unions Act, 1881, or any amendment thereof; or
- (e) the Workers' Compensation Commission of New South Wales, as an investment of compensation money paid or payable on death or disability under any Act relating to compensation to workers or workmen,

shall be exempt from the said mortgage tax, provided that this exemption shall not extend to a mortgage of any such mortgage unless that sub-mortgage is itself within the exemption.

## BUSINESS UNDISPOSED OF AT THE CLOSE OF THE SESSION

(PROROGUED 16th MAY, 1932.) (DISSOLVED 18th MAY, 1932.)

#### QUESTIONS:-

1. Mr. HOAD to ask The PREMIER AND COLONIAL TREASURER,-

(1.) Will he inform the House whether it is a fact (a) that the woolgrowers of New South Wales are being robbed of millions of pounds each year owing to the woolbuyers combining and reducing the auction sales to a farce and a fraud by the adoption of the practice known as "lot splitting"; (b) that the so-called leaders of the growers have completely failed to protect them?

(2.) If the answers to the foregoing questions are in the affirmative, will he have the matter investigated, with a view to (a) bringing the "sales" under the provisions of the Stamp Duties Act, and thus compelling the brokers to immediately transfer the wool to the successful bidder at the auction at a nominal fee of 1d. a bale; and (b) imposing a prohibitive penalty of £10 per bale where the dummy buyer desires to split the purchase up amongst his associates?

2. Captain CHAFFEY to ask THE COLONIAL SECRETARY,-

(1.) Is it correct, as reported in the Press, that he as head of the Fisheries Department, has permitted persons at Cronulla and Bundeena to cast their fishing nets in Port Hacking?

(2.) Is it a fact that under the Port Hacking Fisheries Act permission to net fish cannot be given without the approval of the National Park Trust?

(3.) Is it a fact that some time ago the Department sought the permission of the Trust, which was refused on the grounds that experts regarded Port Hacking as the best fish-breeding ground on the South Coast; that netting would interfere with the fish propagation; that it was considered also that Port Hacking fishing should be restricted to line fishermen, hundreds of whom come from all suburbs to picnic or to spend their holidays or week-ends fishing in Hacking River, which borders National Park from Jibbon Head to Audley?

(4.) Is it a fact that the persons who have agitated for the reopening of Port Hacking, which has been closed by the National Park Trustees to net fishing for the past three years, consist of some fishermén whose reputations are well known to the local police and fisheries inspectors?

(5.) Is it a fact that some of these persons have previously been fined for breaches of the Fisheries Act, and that one in particular is under a bond not to offend again?

(6.) Is it a fact that certain of these persons have sworn a vendetta against the fisheries inspector, whose life has been threatened on several occasions?

(7.) Is it also a fact that those residents of Cronulla and campers opposite in the National Park, who have informed the fisheries inspector of breaches of the law, and supplied certain information, have been terrorised and notified that "spies" are likely to have their residences or camps destroyed during the absence of the occupiers, and that their boats or launches will be found to have disappeared? (8.) Is it a fact, as stated, that net fishing is taking place in Port Hacking under the very eyes of the police and fisheries inspector, and that it is common talk in Cronulla that these officers have been officially instructed not to prosecute the fishermen?

(9.) If this is so, will he inform the House whether he has given authority to break the law; and, if so, why he has done so?

(10.) Has the National Park Trust protested against this illegal act?

(11.) How long does he intend to allow this state of affairs to continue?

3. Mr. HOAD to ask The Minister for Labour and Industry,-

(1.) Is it a fact that it is stated that a world's shortage of "clothing" wools exists, and arising therefrom the mills of the world, including Australian, ration the available supplies?

(2.) Is it a fact that this arrangement results in greatly reduced prices to the woolgrowers and inferior articles to the consumers?

(3.) If this is so, will he have the matter closely investigated, and, if necessary, introduce legislation to compel the woollen mills to indicate the percentage wool content of all blankets, cloths, &c., woven in or sold in New South Wales?
