(Resolution.)

That an Address be presented to the Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause the necessary steps to be taken to make provision in the Estimates for the payment of Members of the Legislative Assembly.

EMPLOYERS LIABILITY BILL.

Clause 3. An action for the recovery under this Act of compensation for an injury shall not be maintainable unless notice that injury has been sustained is given within ~~six~~ **twelve** weeks and the action is commenced within ~~six~~ **twelve** months from the occurrence of the accident causing the injury or in case of death within twelve months from the time of death. Provided always that the want of such notice shall be no bar to the maintenance of such action if ~~the~~ **a** Judge shall be of opinion that there was reasonable excuse for such want of notice.

The Clause having been amended as indicated,—

INCOME TAX BILL.

Clause 26. The following provisions shall have effect and the directions therein contained shall be complied with by the respective persons concerned therewith for the purposes of assessing income tax *viz.*—

- Provisions and directions in furtherance of assessment.
- Returns of companies.
- Returns may be forwarded by post.
- Commissioners may require further returns.
- Assessor may enter and ask questions.
- If assessment wrong new one may be ordered.
- Income tax of Commissioners.
- (i) The returns to be furnished by every company shall contain such particulars be in such form and be furnished to the Commissioners at such time as may respectively be prescribed. At the foot of every such return there shall be added a declaration by the public officer furnishing it that the same is true and accurate in all particulars.
- (ii) Any returns required to be furnished by any person or company may be posted to the address of the District Commissioners.
- (iii) The Commissioners or any District Commissioner may when and so often as he thinks necessary require any person to make a further or fuller returns respecting any matter authorized by this Act or prescribed by regulation.
- (iv) Any assessor or person authorized by a Commissioner or District Commissioner may enter at any reasonable hour during the daytime upon land or premises for the purpose of assessing the same and may put to the occupier or owner thereof any questions touching any of the particulars thereof which he is required to furnish.
- (v) If the Commissioners or any District Commissioners shall think that any assessment made by any assessor is unfair or incorrect they may direct another assessment to be made in place thereof by any person whom they may select for the purpose.
- (vi) If any Commissioner or District Commissioner is liable to income tax under this Act the assessment of the same shall be examined by such person as the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council may from time to time by notification published in the *Gazette* appoint in that behalf instead of by the Commissioners. And such person shall have the like powers in respect of the assessment of such incomes as are hereinbefore conferred on the Commissioners in respect of other incomes. And every Commissioner shall have the like right of appeal from assessment as any other person.
- (vii) For the purpose of assessing any land to income tax under this Act the Commissioner and District Commissioners and all persons employed under this Act shall have the like powers and authorities as they have for the purpose of assessing land to land-tax under the "Land Tax Act 1886" and all taxpayers under this Act in respect of land shall be subject to the like obligations liabilities and penalties in respect to the assessment of such land to income tax as they are subject to in respect of its assessment to land tax. (*Read.*)

Any married person who at the time of the institution of his or her suit shall have resided in this Colony for "two" years and upwards may present a petition to the Supreme Court in the form prescribed by the "Matrimonial Causes Act" (thirty-six Victoria number nine) or by the Rules made under the same praying on one or more of the grounds in this section mentioned that such marriage may be dissolved—
- (I) On the ground that the respondent has without just cause or excuse deserted the petitioner and without any such cause or excuse left him or her so deserted during three years and upwards. Petitions for Divorce.
Grounds for Divorce.
- (II) Or on the ground that the respondent by long-continued habits of drunkenness during three years and upwards has habitually left the petitioner without the means of support or being a wife has habitually neglected her domestic duties or rendered herself unfit to discharge them. Desertion.
Habitual drunkenness.
- (III) Or on the ground that at the time of the presentation of the petition the respondent is under sentence or a commuted sentence for a capital crime or to penal servitude for three years or upwards or being a husband has by reason of frequent convictions for crime left his wife habitually without the means of support. Crime.
- (IV) Or on the ground that within two years previously the respondent has been convicted of an assault upon the petitioner occasioning actual bodily harm or of having attempted to murder the petitioner or of having assaulted him or her with intent to inflict grievous bodily harm or on the ground that the respondent has repeatedly assaulted and cruelly beaten the petitioner. (*Read.*) Cruelty assaults, &c.
