# 20 Application of statutory instruments

  - (b) where specified provisions of that Act or those ordinances are applied under paragraph (a), that they so apply with specified modifications by way of omission from, addition to or partial substitution for those provisions; and
  - (c) whether or not specified provisions of that Act or those ordinances are applied under paragraph (a), that specified provisions additional to those of the Principal Act and the ordinances made under that Act apply to or in relation to any matter or thing authorised or required to be done under this Act.
    - (2) A provision of a proclamation referred to in this section may—
- (a) apply generally or be limited in its application by reference to specified exceptions or factors; or
  - (b) apply differently according to different factors of a specified kind; or
  - (c) authorise any matter or thing to be from time to time determined, applied or regulated by any specified person or body,

or may do any combination of those things.

  - (a) employed by, or under contract to, the Corporation dissolved by section 6, the Egg Marketing Board abolished by section 73 of the repealed Act or Thomas Nationwide Transport for the purpose of carrying produce for or on behalf of the dissolved Corporation; and
  - (b) making a claim for compensation under this section.

- (2) The arbitration panel is to consist of 3 persons appointed by the Corporation, of whom:
  - (a) 1 is to be a person nominated by the Corporation; and
  - (b) 1 is to be a person nominated by the Transport Workers Union (NSW Branch) as a representative of that trade union; and
  - (c) 1 is to be an arbitrator appointed in accordance with rules made under the District Court Act 1973.
  - (3) The arbitration panel may, if it considers necessary, make an award for payment of compensation to a sub-contract carrier who has suffered or may suffer loss as a result of the enactment of this Act.
  - (4) In determining whether compensation is payable and the amount of payment, the arbitration panel is to have regard to:
    - (a) the type of contract the sub-contract carrier had with the dissolved Corporation, the abolished Board or Thomas Nationwide Transport; and
    - (b) the duration of the contracts with all or any of those bodies; and
    - (c) the likelihood of the carrier being able to utilise the motor vehicle used to carry the dissolved Corporation's produce for some other commercial purpose; and
    - (d) the loss suffered or likely to be suffered by the carrier as a consequence of the enactment of this Act; and
    - (e) any previous decisions regarding legal proceedings conducted by the carrier in relation to the contracts concerned; and
    - (f) any other factor it considers relevant.
  - (5) If the arbitration panel determines that compensation is to be paid to a claimant under this section and the 3 members of the panel are unable to agree on the sum of compensation to be paid, then the amount to be paid to the claimant under the award of the panel is to be the highest average sum as determined by 2 of the members.
    - (6) The award of the arbitration panel is binding on the Corporation.
    - (7) Payment of compensation is to be made out of:
    - (a) money borrowed by the Corporation; or
    - (b) money provided by Parliament.
  - (8) Sections 50-60 apply to claims for compensation under this section in the same way as they apply to claims made under the Hen Quota Payment Scheme.

### Amendment of Local Government Act 1919 No. 41, s. 500

3. The Local Government Act 1919 is amended by omitting section 500 and by inserting instead the following section:

### 10 Work on private land

- 500. (1) The council may, on the application of the owner or occupier of land or premises, carry out paving, kerbing, guttering, roadmaking, draining, tree-planting or gardening on the land or connect the premises to water, gas, electricity or 15 sewerage mains or carry out any other works whatever which may be lawfully carried out on the land or premises.
  - (2) Work may be carried out under this section only if the applicant pays or agrees to pay:

 (a) an amount equal to the actual cost to the council of carrying out the work; or

- (b) an amount estimated by the council to be higher than, equal to or lower than the actual cost and agreed on by the council and the applicant before the carrying out of the work.
- 25 (3) A decision to carry out work for an amount agreed on under subsection (2) (b) must be made by a resolution:
  - (a) passed at a meeting of the council open to the public;
  - (b) containing the reasons for the decision, where the agreed amount is estimated by the council to be less than the actual cost to the council of carrying out the work.
  - (4) This section does not apply to work that may be carried out under section 499.

  - (b) on land that is owned or occupied by:
    - (i) a public benevolent institution; or
    - (ii) a public charity; or
    - (iii) a non-profit making organisation which uses the land for the benefit of the community; or
  - (c) on any land, where the work is carried out as a consequence of damage cuased to the land by a natural disaster, such as flood, fire or earthquake.
- (4) A decision to carry out work for an amount agreed on under subsection (3) must be made by a resolution:
  - (a) passed at a meeting of the council open to the public; and
  - (b) containing the reasons for the decision

- (3) Despite the repeal of the regulations under the State Bank Act 1981, the provisions of the regulations made pursuant to clause 3 of Schedule 1 to that Act are, with any necessary adaptations, to be taken to be regulations made under this Act.
- (4) The person holding office as elected director of the State Bank Board immediately before the dissolution of that Board is to be taken to have been elected as elected director of the board of the Corporation, for the balance of his or her term of office."

- (3) Work may be carried out under this section by the council at an amount that is less than the actual cost to the council of carrying out the work and that is agreed on by the council and the applicant before the carrying out of the work if the work is carried out:
  - (a) on land that is vested in the New South Wales Aboriginal Land Council, a Regional Aboriginal Land Council or a Local Aboriginal Land Council constituted under the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983; or
  - (b) on land that is owned or occupied by:
    - (i) a public benevolent institution; or
    - (ii) a public charity; or
    - (iii) a non-profit making organisation which uses the land for the benefit of the community; or
  - (c) on any land, where the work is carried out as a consequence of damage caused to the land by a natural disaster, such as flood, fire or earthquake.
- (4) A decision to carry out work for an amount agreed on under subsection (3) must be made by a resolution:
  - (a) passed at a meeting of the council open to the public; and
  - (b) containing the reasons for the decision.

- (2) The Minister may not consent to such an application unless the Minister has received and considered a written report made by, or on behalf of, the Director-General as to the circumstances of the application and in particular detailing:
  - (a) the history of the person to whom the application relates; and
  - (b) the needs of the person; and
  - (c) any relevant problems and factors; and
  - (d) management strategies which have been attempted to address those needs and to resolve those problems; and
  - (e) other placement, program or treatment arrangements for the person that have been tried or considered and found unsatisfactory, and the reasons why they were found unsatisfactory; and
  - (f) any other matters relating to the person's physical, emotional and social development and health.
- (3) A copy of the report is to be provided as soon as practicable to a barrister, solicitor or agent representing the person to whom the report relates.
- (4) In proceedings on an application for a general remand order under section 28A or an order under 28B, the court hearing the proceedings:
  - (a) must consider a report prepared by or on behalf of the Director-General in accordance with subsection (2) and tendered by the person making the application; and
  - (b) may order a report as to any matter that the court thinks fit and may adjourn the proceedings to enable the report to be prepared; and
  - (c) may consider such other evidence as it thinks appropriate in the circumstances of the case.
- (5) A person making an application under section 28A or 28B must call evidence or tender a written report from a person who has personal knowledge of the circumstances in which the person to whom the application relates would be accommodated in prison if the order was made.
- (6) A court, when making, varying or revoking an order or refusing an application under section 28A, 28B or 28D may make recommendations, taking into account the wishes of the person to whom the order or application relates, as to the appropriate accommodation, programs and treatment that should be made available for the person.
- (7) In any proceedings before a court on an application for the making, variation or revocation of an order under section 28A, 28B or 28D, the person to whom the application relates is entitled:
  - (a) to appear in the proceedings and to be heard and make submissions; and
  - (b) to be represented by a barrister or solicitor, or with the leave of the court, by an agent; and
  - (c) to call evidence; and
  - (d) to tender reports or other material; and
  - (e) to cross-examine the author of any report tendered in support of the application; and
  - (f) without subjecting himself or herself to cross-examination, to make a written or an oral statement in relation to any evidence called or any report or other material tendered in relation to the application.

(8) Any matter which is heard by a court for the purpose of determining whether or not to make, vary or revoke such an order is not admissible as evidence in the criminal proceedings concerned unless the matter would otherwise be admissable as evidence in those criminal proceedings.

## Person to be informed of a decision to seek a transfer to prison

28H. A person in relation to whom it is proposed to make an order under section 28, or an application for the making, variation or revocation of an order under section 28A, 28B or 28D (2) (b) must be informed immediately by the superintendent of the detention centre in which the person is detained of:

- (a) the decision to seek such an order or make such an application; and
- (b) the person's rights:
  - (i) to oppose the order or application; and
  - (ii) to inform a friend or relative; and
  - (iii) to obtain advice from a solicitor or barrister; and
  - (iv) if a general remand order is made under section 28A or an order is made under section 28B, to seek a variation or revocation of the order under section 28D; and
  - to be represented at any proceedings, and must be given reasonable opportunities to exercise those rights.

#### Recording of reasons for transfer orders

- 28L (1) The Minister or the court, as the case may be, must record the reasons for making, varying or revoking an order under section 28, 28A, 28B or 28D or for rejecting an application under section 28D.
- (2) A copy of the record of those reasons is to be provided to the person who is the subject of the order as soon as practicable.
