1. **OPENING OF THE SESSION.**—The House met at Fifteen minutes after Two o'clock, p.m., pursuant to a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing the date the sixth day of November, 1978, of which a copy was read by Mr R. E. A. Ward, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, as follows:

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR RODEN CUTLER, upon whom has been conferred the decoration of the Victoria Cross, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Knight of the Most Venerable Order of St John of Jerusalem, Governor of the State of New South Wales and its dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

"IN pursuance of the power and authority vested in me as Governor of the State of New South Wales by virtue of an Act passed in the second year of the reign of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, being 'an Act to consolidate the Acts relating to the Constitution,' I do hereby proclaim that a Session of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for the State of New South Wales for the despatch of business shall commence and be holden on Tuesday, the seventh day of November, 1978, at 2.15 o'clock in the afternoon in the buildings known as the Legislative Council Chambers, in Macquarie Street, in the City of Sydney; and Members of the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively, are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

"GIVEN under my Hand and Seal, at Sydney, this sixth day of November, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight and in the twenty-seventh year of Her Majesty's Reign.

3. MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONERS.—The Usher of the Black Rod, being admitted, delivered the following Message:

6. ELECTION OF SPEAKER.—Mr Petersen, addressing himself to the Clerk (who, standing up, pointed to him and then sat down), moved, That Lawrence Borthwick Kelly, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker—which motion was seconded by Mr Quinn.

And Mr Kelly, standing in his place, informed the House that he accepted nomination.

Question, "That Lawrence Borthwick Kelly, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker"—put by the Clerk and passed.

Whereupon Mr Petersen and Mr Quinn conducted Mr Kelly to the Chair, where, standing on the upper step, he returned his acknowledgments to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him—

And thereupon sat down in the Chair.

Mr Wran congratulated Mr Speaker.

Mr Wran then informed the House that he had ascertained that His Excellency the Governor would receive their Speaker at Government House at Half-past Four o'clock, p.m., This Day.

*Mr Speaker left the Chair at twenty-three minutes after Three o'clock, p.m., until Fifteen minutes after Four o'clock p.m.*

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*Mr Speaker resumed the Chair at the hour named.*

7. PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER.—The House then proceeded to Government House to present their Speaker to His Excellency the Governor—

And being returned—

Mr Speaker reported that the Assembly had been to Government House where he informed His Excellency the Governor that, immediately after the opening of Parliament to-day, the Legislative Assembly, in the exercise of their undoubted right, had proceeded to the election of their Speaker, that the choice had fallen upon him, and that he had to present himself to His Excellency as their Speaker—whereupon His Excellency was pleased to offer him his congratulations.

That he had then, in the name and on behalf of the House, laid claim to all their undoubted rights and privileges, particularly to freedom of speech in debate, to free access to His Excellency when occasion should require, and asked

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that the most favourable construction should, on all occasions, be put upon their language and proceedings; to all of which His Excellency readily assented.

Mr Speaker again expressed his appreciation for the honour the House had been pleased to confer upon him.

8. **MINISTERIAL ANNOUNCEMENT.**—Mr Wran informed the House that on 19 October, 1978, with a view to reconstructing the Ministry he submitted to the Governor his resignation as Premier and as a Member of the Executive Council, an action which involved the resignation of the whole of his colleagues.

His Excellency immediately commissioned him to form a new Ministry and on the same day he was sworn in as Premier and as a Member of the Executive Council and the following gentlemen were appointed by His Excellency as Members of the Executive Council and to the offices indicated:

Mr Wran also informed the House that the Minister for Planning and Environment would be represented in the House by the Minister for Corrective Services and that the Minister for Decentralisation and Minister Assisting the Premier will be represented by the Minister for Agriculture.

9. **LEADER OF THE HOUSE.**—Mr Wran informed the House that the Honourable F. J. Walker, LL.M., M.P., had been appointed Leader of the Government in the House.

10. **GOVERNMENT WHIP.**—Mr Wran informed the House that Mr J. P. Flaherty, M.P., had been reappointed Government Whip.

11. **LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION.**—Mr Mason informed the House of the election of himself as Leader of the Opposition, Bruce John McDonald as Deputy-Leader of the Opposition and Frederick Douglas Claude Caterson as Opposition Whip as from 24 October, 1978.



12. LEADER OF THE COUNTRY PARTY.—Mr Punch informed the House of the re-election of himself as Leader of the Country Party, James Caird Bruxner as Deputy-Leader of the Country Party and James Hugh Taylor as Country Party Whip as from 17 October, 1978.

14. LAW OF EVIDENCE BILL.—Mr Wran presented a Bill intituled "*A Bill to amend the law of evidence,*" and moved, *pro formâ*, That this Bill be now read a first time.

Question put and passed.

Bill read a first time.

15. MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONERS.—Mr Speaker reported that the House had this day attended the Commissioners in the Legislative Council Chamber where the Honourable David Paul Landa, on behalf of the Commissioners delivered the following Message:

HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

We have it in command from His Excellency the Governor to acquaint you that His Excellency desires that you take into your earnest consideration such matters as may be submitted to you.

HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL—

It being necessary that a President of the Legislative Council be first chosen, it is His Excellency's pleasure that you, Honourable Members of the Legislative Council, after new members shall have been sworn, proceed to the election of one of your number to be your President.

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—

It being necessary that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be first chosen, it is His Excellency's pleasure that you, Members of the Legislative Assembly, repair to your Chamber, and there, after Members shall have been sworn, proceed to the election of one of your number to be your Speaker.

We are further commanded to acquaint you that His Excellency desires that such measures be taken by you as may be deemed expedient to provide for the public services of the State.

16. MEMBERS—SEATING ARRANGEMENTS.—Mr Speaker said that the newly elected Parliament, with its large number of supporters of the Government, would create seating problems on certain occasions.

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Specifically, he said he had in mind when divisions were taking place and during question time. Desiring not to have structural alterations to the chamber, he believed that the most practical solution to the problem would be to allocate, at all times, the back cross benches on each side of the Chamber to supporters of the Government.

During divisions it would be deemed, therefore, that members occupying those benches would be voting with the Government, whether the Government were voting "aye" or "no".

Mr Speaker went on to say that technically, this would be in contradiction of the standing orders which required the "ayes" to be to the right and the "noes" to the left of the Chair respectively. He believed this, however, to be a minor breach when compared with the alternatives.

It was his intention that the compromise he had outlined would operate unless experience proved a further change was necessary or until such time as the House otherwise directed.

17. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEES.—Mr Bannon moved, That Thomas James Cahill be Chairman of Committees of the Whole House,—which motion was seconded by Mr Whelan.

Debate ensued.

Question put and passed.

Whereupon Mr Cahill made his acknowledgments to the House.

18. DEATH OF THOMAS PATRICK MURPHY, A FORMER MINISTER OF THE CROWN.—Mr Wran moved, That this House extends to the family of Thomas Patrick Murphy, a former Minister of the Crown, the deep sympathy of Members of the Legislative Assembly in the loss sustained.

And the motion having been seconded by Mr Mason and supported by Mr Cox, Mr Punch, Mr Renshaw, Mr McIlwaine, Mr K. J. Stewart and Mr Maher.

Question put and carried unanimously—Members and Officers of the House standing.

19. PETITIONS.—The Clerk announced that the following members had each lodged Petitions for presentation, viz.:

(1) Mr R. J. Brown, Mr R. J. Clough, Mr Jackson, Mr Mallam and Mr Taylor—from certain citizens of New South Wales praying that the Legislative Assembly will not allow any extension of Sunday trading in liquor in hotels or any other place where liquor is permitted; or consider any legislation for this purpose until a referendum is held to ascertain the wishes of the people.

(2) Mr Dowd—from certain citizens of New South Wales praying that the Legislative Assembly not rezone land reserved for the uncompleted section of the Warringah Expressway; the Southern Distributor between Ultimo and Huntley Street, Alexandria and the Western Distributor between Ultimo and the vicinity of Concord Road, at least until such time as other satisfactory alternatives have been investigated and placed before the people for community comment and assessment.

(3) Mr Moore—from certain citizens of New South Wales praying that the Legislative Assembly reverse the decision of the Minister for Transport to apply clearways, embracing substantial periods of the day, including weekends, to sections of the main and secondary road system within the next three years.

(4) Mr Caterson—from certain citizens of New South Wales praying that the Legislative Assembly (1) delay the formation of an Education Commission until the public is fully informed of its terms of reference and effects and (2) hold a full open inquiry on education in New South Wales.

#### 8. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS PAPER.—

Mr Speaker said that most members would be aware of the greatly increased number of written questions being received in comparison with those of but a few years ago. For example, in the session 1974–75, during which the House met on 57 days, 390 questions were asked; in the session 1976–78, of 118 sitting days, 1 319 questions were asked; and in the present session of only 18 sitting days, 521 questions had been asked. There was no justification in thinking that this trend would not continue.

With the Questions and Answers Paper averaging between 80 and 90 pages each day it was becoming increasingly difficult and on too many days impossible to have it available by the time the House met.

To alleviate some of the difficulties involved, which he need not detail, and in an effort to reduce the quite considerable and ever-increasing costs involved, he had approved of the following procedure being adopted.

On the first sitting day of each week the Questions and Answers Paper would contain all questions not answered. Should answers have been received since the previous sitting day the relevant question and answer would also appear on

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that day. On subsequent sitting days of that week the paper would contain only new questions together with any question previously asked, the answer to which had been received the previous day. In other words, Wednesday's paper would contain only new questions, and answers to questions received on Tuesday.

Thursday's paper would contain new questions received on both Tuesday and Wednesday, together with answers received on Wednesday. This change should make it possible to have the Questions and Answers Paper by the time the House met. Other changes might prove to be desirable or necessary.

Mr Speaker added that other parliaments receiving large numbers of questions had found it necessary to adopt procedures similar to that which he had approved.

**2.
