14. THE GOVERNOR'S OPENING SPETCH. Mr Speaker reported that the House had this day attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency had been pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament. For greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he laid upon the Table of the House, and ordered that it be recorded in the Fores and Proceedings, as tollows:

HONOLRABLE MEMBERS OF PARCIAMENT HERE ASSEMBLED.

You have been called together to consider legislation and financial measures to advance the programme approved by the people of New South Wales at the elections on 24th March, 1984.

The creation of jobs, the reduction of unemployment, the restoration of growth to the New South Wales economy and the weiture of the underprivateged remain the central tasks of my Government's programme.

As a result of fruitful co-operation between Federal and State Governments the task is now being carried out in conditions more favourable and with prospects of greater success than have existed at any time in the past decade.

Last year witnessed a massive capital works spending of over \$4,000 million which was the Jargest Capital Works Programme ever undertaken by a Government in Australia

The Government will continue the attack on unemployment in the coming year through its Capital Works Programme. The Treasurer, when presenting the Budget, will provide details of the Capital Works Programme which will provide for a still further increase in Capital Works expenditure which of course is so vital to the employment and intrastructure of this State.

The rate of unemployment in New South Wales now stands at 8.4 per cent compared with a figure of 10.4 per cent at this time last year.

The number of jobs created in New South Wales in the past twelve months was 77.500 which represents more than γ of the total number of new jobs created throughout Australia during that period

The cost of living index in New South Wales for the twelve months to June 1984 increased by 3.0 per cent and was the lowest of all States and well below the national average of 3.9 per cent.

I am again gratified to report to Honourable Members that the Budget for the 1983-84 financial year came in better than target and that the finances of New South Wales are in a sound and strong position.

My Government will continue to co-operate with the Federal Government in the exercise of budgetary restraint and fiscal responsibility to ensure the success of the simultaneous light against unemployment and inflation.

The key to this success remains national co-operation between governments, business and unions in wage and price restraint, within the framework of the Prices and Income Accord.

HONOURABLE MEMBERS

There will be no let up in efforts being made to create jobs and to reduce unemployment

Side by side with the co-operative measures at the national level, the Government has taken its own significant steps including the creation of a separate Ministry of Employment to fight unemployment.

Programmes such as the Youth Employment Scheme, the State Youth Corps and the State Government Youth Training Programme have provided opportunities for young people to work, many of them for the first time. The Youth Employment Scheme will be expanded to include young people up to age 25.

During 1983-84 more than 17 500 unemployed people have gained tobs on projects lunded under the Community Employment Programme.

Under the Wage Pause Programme, a \$69 million allocation during 1983-84 of funded projects sponsored by State and Local Government authorities and community groups, created some 7 500 jobs.

Whilst meeting job creation expenditure and employment targets, the Government has been equally successful in helping the most disadvantaged. More than two-thirds of the jobs created were filled by people who had been unemployed for more than nine months.

My Government will establish a Women's Directorate in the Department of Industrial Relations to advise on issues relating to women's employment.

A youth employment payroll tax incentives scheme for the private sector is underway. In its first year of operation it is expected that this will provide jobs for up to 6 000 young people.

My Government will continue to work with business, industry and the union-movement on future planning to extend the light against unemployment

The Government is developing a wide range of programmes to mark the 1988. Bicentenary

The emphasis will be given to projects that will have lasting value to the people of New South Wales and will make a contribution to the architectural heritage of the State.

Projects and activities will cost in excess of \$410 million.

The most important project for the State is the \$200 million redevelopment of Darling Harbour. This major project, which will include a Convention Exhibition Centre and a Space Theatre, will revitalise this historic section of the city and open up more of Sydney's magnificent harbour foreshores for public enjoyment.

Other major Bicentennial projects will be the Powerhouse Museum at Ultimo, extensions to the State Library, Art Gallery and Australian Museum. The Government has adopted imaginative designs to improve the physical appearance of Macquarie Street and the Circular Quay environs.

My Government will provide \$70 million for a State Bicentennial programme of commemorative, educational, community, aits and entertainment projects throughout New South Wales. Each local government area will receive a financial grant to assist in local programmes.

My Government has an ongoing power station construction programme to expand and ensure rehability of electricity supply

Expenditure on this programme will exceed \$950 million this year

The completion of Eraring power station, the largest and most modern in Australia, will provide a further 2 640 megawatts to the State's power system.

Construction work is proceeding on four 660 megawatt units at Bayswater power station, thus providing significant employment opportunities at the site and in supporting industries.

Broken Hill is to be given a new lease of life. The city and its mining operations will be linked to the State's electricity grid system at a cost of \$69 million to be funded jointly by the Electricity Commission and the mining companies. The companies will benefit from a revised mineral royalties scheme designed to encourage the mining of lower grade ores in existing mines and the encouragement of new mines.

The Government will give strong encouragement to industry for further exploration of oil and gas within the State.

Coal production in New South Wales during 1983-84 achieved a record level with strongest growth being in the Hunter Region

The export tonnage reached a record high of 33.5 million tonnes.

The completion of the Kooragang Coal Loader has increased the capacity of the Port of Newcastle from 25 million tonnes to 40 million tonnes per annum.

The Government has restructured the Maritime Services Board to make it more efficient and effective.

At Botany Bay, planning is proceeding for a new crude oil discharge facility to operate under more satisfactory environmental conditions.

Major port developments for the fishing and tourist industries are proceeding at Eden, and within the port of Sydney at Blackwattle Bay

At Port Botany 28 hectares of parkland at a cost of \$4 m.E.on will shortly be open to the public for both active and passive recreation.

Some \$162 million was spent last year and created more than 3 000 jobs in country areas on country water supply and sewerage works. This programme will be continued.

A major new dam is planned on the Blue Mountains to service the Fish River Water Supply Scheme

Work on Split Rock Dam near Manilla and enlargement of Gienbawn Damnear Scone is underway at a total estimated cost of \$96 million

Windamere Dam near Mudgee will be officially opened in October at an estimated cost of \$58 million.

My Government is formulating a State Water Plan so as to meet the water supply, flood mitigation and salimity control needs of the future. Good progress has been made on a salimity control works in the Murray Valley.

Construction of wastewater treatment works and an ocean outfall to dispose of sewage from Newcastle will begin next year

The construction of three deepwater ocean outfalls at Malabar, Bondi and North Head at an estimated cost of \$270 million, will proceed. This will have an enormous effect on alleviating sewage pollution on Sydney's beaches.

The past year has marked a significant improvement in industrial relations. The number of working days lost due to industrial disputes has fallen by 40 per cent.

My Government faily supports the Prices and Incomes Accord

The Occupational Health and Safety Council has been established and regulations to protect the health, safety and welfare of persons at work are being progressively introduced.

Legislation will be introduced to establish an Industry Training Council to ensure a comprehensive approach to developing the skills of the workforce

On the advice of the Manafacturing Advisory Council the Government has established two tripartite committees— the New South Wales Committees on Industry Revitalisation and Defence Industry Support

These Committees will have the task of recommending to the Government measures designed to ensure as far as practicable the maintenance and growth of the manufacturing industry and defence related industries.

My Government will establish an Investment Corporation to mobilise new capital for the private sector development by fostering new enterprises and expanding existing businesses.

This corporation will provide a vehicle for State equity participation in private sector development.

Since the Government's off-set programme was introduced two years ago to assist in creating new employment opportunities in industry, local industries have gained over \$21 million of additional work from overseas suppliers.

Regional industries are continuing to benefit from the incentives provided by my Government. During the last year some \$23 million was made available from the Country Industries Assistance Fund.

The Industry Development Boards in the State's nine regions are actively promoting economic development in their regions.

The importance of small business development as the basis of economic growth and diversity is recognized.

A new \$5 million Development lund has been established to assist small businesses, and legislation will be introduced to establish a Small Business Development Corporation, representing trade associations and independent small business proprietors

The Government will also establish an Industry Management Assistance Fund to help companies meet the costs of professional services to assist in their development.

A vital component of the Government's industry revitalisation strategy is to promote advanced technology

Major new initiatives have been successful in encouraging new advanced technology enterprises, and in introducing new methods and equipment into the State's traditional industries. Some \$3 million in assistance has been provided from the Advanced Technology Development Assistance Fund.

New international markets for computer software houses are being pursued. Joint venture arrangements between New South Wales software houses and Japanese computer hardware manufacturers are under negotiation following two successful trademissions to Tokyo.

Plans for a major computer Aided Design and Manufacture Centre are being developed. This new Centre will enable the transfer of technology relating to the use of computers to be applied to the special needs of the manufacturing industry.

The establishment of Technology Application Centres at Newcastle and Wollongong are planned as part of the Steel Industry Assistance Plan

The modernisation and upgrading of public transport continues to be a high priority for my Government.

The electrification of Sydney to Wollongong will be achieved by the end of 1986.

New rolling stock will continue to be built within New South Wales, providing employment opportunities in private industry

In the twelve months more than \$100 million will be spent on new locomotive and surburban and inter urban carriages.

The State's massive rail upgrading and track strengthening programme will continue

The programme of restoration and refurbishing of railway stations is being extended. More free commuter car parks will be provided.

Government bus and ferry services will continue to be upgraded

The single deck city bus replacement programme costing over \$10 million per annum will result in the delivery of two new buses per week

Five twin hull terries for Inner Harbour services are under construction at Carrington, Newcastle. A third new Maniy ferry has been constructed and will begin service shortly

A new hydrofoil with seating capacity of 235 will begin service shortly. A second vessel will be delivered next year.

"he Government is determined to take all necessary measures to reduce the road toll in New South Wales.

A Ministerial Road Safety Committee has been co-ordinating the Government's efforts and a package of counter measures developed

The Random Breath Testing Programme has had a dramatic effect in reducing the road tol! As a mark of the Government's commitment to the programme twenty new random breath testing mini-buses are being acquired and will be in use in both the metropolitan and country areas.

The Police highway Patrol activities have been extended and will provide a more visible deterrent to carelessness on our roads.

Heightened promotion and community education in road safety is underway to support the other measures which have been introduced

The Government has embarked on the biggest road building programme in the nation's history. It is aimed at improving the traffic flow, reducing travelling time, and making roads sale:

The 5 year programme provides for a record \$5 billion to be spent on works around the State. It contributes significantly to job creation throughout the whole State.

The citizens of New South Wales will enjoy the safety and convenience of freeway conditions stretching from Newcastle to Wollongong. As well, there will be a four lanc highway from Sydney to Albury.

Major improvements are being made on the F4 Freeway from Concord, the Hume Highway, the Newcastle-Sydney Freeway, and the Pacific Highway north of Newcastle, with particular emphasis on areas with a high accident rate

The improvement of the welfare of the underprivileged is central to my Government's overall programme. Nowhere is this central theme more emphasized than in the field of housing.

The Government will continue its expanded programme in the provision of public housing. This year, as in 1983-84, 5 000 new dwelling units will be commenced. Special funds have been allocated for Aboriginal and single low-income housing.

In 1983-84 some 3 000 residential lots were produced by the Land Commission and Crown Lands Office. A further 3 000 lots were being developed at June 1984. It is planned that funds will continue to be provided to ensure that sufficient low-cost land is available, especially for first home buyers.

The Government is supporting and active programme for community development on new estates. Funds provided under the Community Employment Programme will be utilized towards the building of further multi-purpose community centres and childrens playgrounds in new housing estates.

The Government's Home Ownership Made Fasier Schemes, have been nighly successful in providing homes for low to middle income earners. In 1983-84 some \$78 million was provided as low-interest loans, 971 homes were built under the State Project Schemes, and an additional \$10 million provided under the State First Mortgage Scheme.

The Housing Commission has adapted over 1 000 of its dwellings to facilitate occupation by disabled persons. This programme will be continued.

Funds will be provided specially for allocation to disabled persons by cooperative housing societies in 1984-85.

The Government is committed to the further development and improvement of the State's educational services.

It has involved and will further the involvement of the community in key decision making on educational priorities.

Legislation will be introduced to:

- * replace the two existing secondary study boards by a single Board of Education.
- enable school communities to establish school councils which will be representative of parents, communities and teachers.

The Government attaches a high priority to ensuring adequate staffing of schools in the country areas.

Special training courses have begun to meet the shortage of mathematics and science teachers.

Enrolments in TAFF have reached a record high in excess of 350 000 students.

Courses at both Trade and Certificate levels are under constant revision to ensure that vocational training is relevant to changing needs of industry

TAFE continues to give high priority to meeting the needs of disadvantaged groups in the provision of educational courses, facilities and programmes.

The building programme for schools and colleges will be in excess of \$230 million.

The Government is committed to ensuring high quality medical and hospital services to all the community.

Medicare is an essential feature of the Government Health Programme. Medicare has been in the past and will be in the future defended against any attempt to undermine it from any quarter.

My Government takes the same view about the Public Hospital System the maintenance and development of which is integral to proper health services to the community.

In recent months the surgery unit at Campbelltown Hospital, a specialized burns unit at Westmead Hospital, and an Occupational Health Unit at Sydney Hospital have been opened

The Government spent nearly \$80 million on capital programmes in the health sector last year.

The Government will provide funds in excess of this expenditure in the current transcral year.

This programme will include:

Fairfield Hospital

A major new wing at St Vincent's Hospital to contain nine operating theatres and therapy and outpatients facilities.

A new Pathology Department at the St George Hospital

The Rankin Park Hospital at Newcastle

A specialist unit at the Prince of Wales Teaching Hospital for training doctors and others in the care of the aged

A Rehabilitation and Geriatric Day Care Unit at the Mona Vale Hospital.

The primary industries of the State are of vital importance to the State's economy and my Government is ever mindful of the benefits to all sections of the community derived from the rura, sector.

Record levels of grain harvest were achieved from wheat, barley and oats over the past year.

The grain export terminal to be constructed at Port Kembla will provide a much needed facility for the expansion of grain exports

Research is a significant factor of the Government's involvement in agriculture and fisheries. This year some \$17 million is to be spent on the building projects related to research in raral areas.

Furthermore during 1985 it is proposed to establish the Fisheries Research Institute at Cronulla.

The Glenfield Veterinary Research Centre is being progressively relocated onto rands acquired at Camden Park Estate.

The Government has decided to introduce a Total Catchment Management Programme aimed at preserving land and water resources within all the major river valleys of the State.

The Government's commitment to Youth and Community Services was demonstrated by a record expenditure of \$472 million in the past (mancial year an increase of 28 per cent over the previous year.

Some \$32 million was affocated through the Children's Services Fund, and \$13 million was provided for cash and other emergency assistance

Access to community services at the local level has been expanded with the opening of 14 new Community Welfare Offices.

Under the Commonwealth State Children's Capital Works Programme, a Juither 50 children's centres will begin this financial year

The funding of Youth and Women's Refuges has increased. In the Youth Refuge Programme there are now 67 funded services providing accommodation for almost 700 young people.

My Government will be strongly promoting the International Youth Year in 1985 and will allocate \$1.5 million to this end

The Government will increase support for community based services for the disabled. A new Disabled Persons advisory body will be established to replace the Advisory Council on the Handicapped. Disabled persons and their families will have majority representation on the new body.

Protection of children against abuse has been a high priority. A Task Force has been established to investigate cases of child sexual assault.

My Government is committed to ensuring proper provision of services for the elderly.

It has established the first Office of Aged Services. Initiatives to assist aged persons to maintain independent lifestyles are being further developed in close consultation with the elderly.

My Government is strongly committed to uniform Commonwealth-State consumer protection legislation as a means of reducing costs to industry and to the consumer alike.

Legislation will be introduced to mirror the consumer protection provisions of the Commonwealth Trade Practices Act.

The new Consumer Credit legislation will be fully implemented, providing vastly improved protection for borrowers.

My Government will continue to help home buyers facing difficulty in maintaining mortgage repayments. During 1983-84, in excess of \$5 million was committed to assist 1 400 needy families.

The Department of Consumer Affairs will give special attention to the problems of ethnic consumers and will establish an Ethnic Advisory Unit.

In recognition of its important role the Government has created a separate Ministerial portfolio and Department of Local Government.

The Government has established its Aboriginal Land Rights programmic and already in excess of \$9 million has been allocated to the New South Wales Aboriginal Land Council, balt of which has been distributed for land purchases. More than 100 title-holding local land councils have now been formed.

A \$2 million "self help" housing programme will enable Aboriginal people to restore and build their own houses

Under the Urban Development Programme, the Government will continue to ensure that adequate supplies of serviced land are available so that reasonable price levels can be maintained.

The Government will introduce legislation to streamline the environmental planning system in New South Wales.

The acquisition of the A.N.L. site at Mort Bay, with an area of over six hectares, will provide increased public access to the Pairamatta River.

The Government will further its programme of the protection of the State's coastal and wetlands areas. A large area of land at Bass Point on the South Coast will be developed as a State Recreation Area.

The first stage of the Buderoo National Park, located just west of Kiama, is to be established late this year. Plans are proceeding for the inclusion of Christmas Bell Plain in the Lake Innes Nature Reserve and the addition of Crown and State owned land to the Blue Mountains National Park

The Government has nominated the North Coast Rainforest national parks for World Heritage listing.

The former Quarantine Station at North-Head, comprising some 65 buildings and pricesless Aboriginal and European artifacts, is to be restored under a proposed \$3 million programme.

Development works in the Rocks area, in excess of \$400 million are underway

The Government's programme designed to upgrade sporting facilities in Sydney is continuing.

Construction of a new stadium at Cumberland Oval, and an International Hockey Centre at Homebush Bay are the first in a series of new projects proposed over the next 10 years. The International Sports Centre at Homebush Bay will be opened by the end of the year.

The New South Wales Academy of Sport at Narrabeen is scheduled for full-time operation in January next year. A Sports Medicine Centre is included in this project.

I out ism is regarded by the Government as a major potential growth industry and therefore the Government has a deep involvement in the promotion of tourism in New South Wales.

The establishment this year of the Tourist Commission will further promote the Lourist Industry in New South Wales.

Tourism marketing in 1984-85 will extend beyond the local and national market to focus primarily on Japan and North America.

The Government is continuing to take positive steps to promote Sydney as a banking and financial capital not only for Australia but for the whole of Asia. Further stamp duty relief on financial transactions will be announced in the Budget.

To help co-ordinate the necessary measures to make Sydney a large and dynamic centre, the Government has established the Financial Industry Consultative Council. The Council comprises the representatives of all major sections of the New South Wafes banking and finance industry and will be personally chaired by the Premier or in his absence the Treasurer.

My Government has co-operated with the Commonwealth Government in the establishment of the National Crimes Authority, Complementary legislation will be introduced and will permit references to the Authority by my Government.

The Commissioner for Public Complaints will be appointed shortly.

The Government has established the New South Wales Police Board to promote and ensure an efficient and effective Police Service

The legislation to provide for the appointment of commissioned Police Officers on the basis of merit, will commence shortly.

During the year the authorized strength of the Police Force increased by some 635 positions

The Government recognizes the importance of new technology in administrative and operational efficiency in police operations. A new Police computer network, encompassing six new major computer systems and costing in excess of \$10 million, is proposed over the next three years.

Home protection legislation will be introduced.

New anti-theft squads are to be formed in all Police Districts.

Greater community support and consultation with the Police Force is being encouraged. The new Community Relations Bureau has commenced operations.

Major redevelopments are planned for the State's prisons. Some \$14 million is being spend on work at Long Bay to include provision of hospital facilities.

A Task Force has been established to report on the adequacy of present facilities for women in New South Wales prisons.

The strength of the New South Wales Fire Brigades has been substantially increased over the past year.

Significant improvements have been achieved in the co-ordination of State rescue and emergency services organisations. An expanded Co-ordinating Committee has been established

A training programme for volunteer bush fire fighters is being introduced in the eastern part of the State.

The Government will continue to pursue vigorous policies for the development of the arts and cultural activity.

The Sydney Theatre Company is to be relocated on the top floor of one of the Walsh Bay wharves. This imaginative re-cycling of an historic building will provide an exciting venue for theatre goers.

A performing arts centre will be provided for Wollongong and a cultural centre for Parramatta to serve the western region of Sydney.

The Government will support a Youth Arts Festival to be held in Sydney in May, 1985.

The Government is proud of its programme of restoration of historic Stateowned sandstone buildings. Hyde Park Barracks will shortly be opened to the public as a museum of history.

A programme of floodlighting a number of Sydney's major historic buildings and structures, including the Sydney Harbour Bridge, is being undertaken.

The new museum train will undertake a four-year programme of tours of country areas

The Government is continuing its programme of relocating public sector offices, with particular emphasis to the western Sydney Area. The proposals will significantly improve employment opportunities and provide additional Government services in the region.

A further 1 000 staff from the Departments of Police and Technical and Further Education will be relocated to the Government Insurance Office Building at Parramatta.

New buildings are shortly to be constructed at Blacktown and Liverpool. Approximately 1 000 staff will be moved to these locations during 1986.

Work has commenced on Government office building at Wollongong. It is expected to be occupied by mid-1986 and some 550 staff will be accommodated

Before 1988, the year in which the first four year term of this Parliament is due to expure, further Parliamentary reforms will be submitted to the people of New South Wales.

The most important will propose that Members of the Legislative Council be elected for two terms of the Legislative Assembly, that is to say eight years.

There will be a review and amendment of the Parliamentary Flectorates and Elections Act and a redistribution of the electoral districts in the Legislative Assembly.

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

In accordance with your constitutional role as the House of Parliament to which the elected Government is wholly and solely responsible, a Bill to appropriate funds from the Consolidated Fund for the State's recurrent and capital expenditures in 1984-85 will shortly be placed before you.

2. RETIREMENT OF DOUGLAS LESLIE WHEELER FROM THE POSITION OF CLERK OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.—Mr Speaker informed the House that he had received a letter dated 3 September, 1984 from Mr Douglas Leslie Wheeler, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, intimating his intention to retire from the position of Clerk of the Legislative Assembly from 12th October, 1984; and that formal approval was given to his retirement from that date. Mr Speaker said "Mr Wheeler joined the Legislative Assembly staff on 17th March, 1947, and served in most positions on that staff. That experience gave him first hand knowledge of all ramifications of parliamentary work. On 1st January, 1967, he was appointed Second Clerk-Assistant; on 1st February, 1974, Clerk-Assistant; and as from 19th February, 1981, was appointed Clerk of the Legislative Assembly. He was attached to the staff of the House of Commons during May and June 1975, where he undertook a procedural course.

During his term of office as Clerk, Mr Wheeler represented this Parliament at a number of Commonwealth Parliamentary Association conferences and at conferences of Presiding Officers and Clerks. He was also Clerk to the Australian Constitutional Convention on several occasions. During World War II he served with the Royal Australian Air Force as navigator and saw two years' active service while based in England with his squadron operating over Germany. - MESSAGE FROM THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.—Mr Speaker reported a Message from the Legislative Council, dated 25 October, 1984, A.M., returning the Appropriation Bill, without amendment
- 2. STATEMENTS BY LEADER OF THE NATIONAL PARTY.—Mr Speaker made reference to the proceedings in this House on the motion for Dissent from the ruling of the Chair given on 17 October, 1984, moved pursuant to Notice by the Honourable Leader of the National Party on 23 October, 1984. Mr Speaker informed honourable members that he felt bound to draw the attention of the House to certain paragraphs which appeared in the Sydney Morning Herald and the Daily Telegraph on Wednesday, 24 October, 1984 and extracts from certain radio and television broadcasts of Tuesday, 23 October, 1984 and Wednesday, 24 October, 1984, in which the actions of the Speaker were maliciously criticised by statements emanating from the Honourable Leader of the National Party.

Mr Speaker read to the House parts of the newspaper reports and transcripts of the radio and television interviews wherein the Honourable Leader of the National Party was directly quoted as making reflections upon the Chair.

Because of the gravity of the attack by the Honourable Leader of the National Party on the Chair and his unbecoming conduct as a member of this House Mr Speaker asked him to apologise for his statements and make an unreserved withdrawal of them.

In light of the refusal of the Honourable Leader of the National Party to apologise, Mr Speaker deplored his action in resorting to the media as a means of attacking the Chair, and strongly deprecated such conduct as a violation of the traditions of parliamentary procedure. Mr Speaker said that honourable members are aware that all the rights and privileges of this House have not been enacted by Parliament. It is incumbent upon honourable members themselves, therefore, to preserve not only these rights and privileges, but above all, the dignity of this Parliament.

This House looks particularly to those of its members who hold high positions to uphold the treasured traditions of the Westminster system. Mr Speaker said he was sorry that the Honourable Leader of the National Party has forgotten his responsibility in this respect. All honourable members will appreciate that the Chair is debarred from engaging in controversy in the media. The Standing Orders and the practice of the House provide sufficient means for honourable members to express dissatisfaction with actions of the Chair.

Mr Speaker added that he was distressed that the Honourable Leader of the National Party, a parliamentarian of 25 years standing, who has held the high offices of Acting Speaker and Chairman of Committees, and who is currently entrusted with the leadership of the National Party, should behave in such an improper and demeaning way as to undermine the confidence of the public in our Parliament.

 - (a) If he is a member supporting the Government Mr Sheahan may appoint a member of the Legislative Assembly supporting the Government as an alternative member.
 - (b) If he is a member supporting the Opposition Mr Dowd may appoint a member of the Legislative Assembly supporting the Opposition as an alternative member.

And the person so appointed shall be a member of the delegation for that sitting or that session or part session as the case may be.

(4) That the foregoing resolutions be forwarded to the Legislative Council with a message requesting that the Legislative Council also declare Mr Neville Kenneth Wran, Q.C., M.P., to be Leader of the Delegation.

- (3) A Minister may, during or after his second reading speech, table for incorporation in *Hansard* additional detailed or explanatory information to assist members in their understanding of the bill.
- (4) Except as provided in this resolution the procedure on bills shall be in accordance with the Standing Orders.

24. ADJOURNMENT OF THE HOUSE:

- (b) the question under Standing Order 1758 "That the question be now put" having been agreed to, the provisions of such Standing Order shall apply.
- (3) If at the time of interruption a Minister desires to move a motion for the extension of the sitting—
 - (a) any business then under discussion shall be suspended until such motion is agreed to and then be resumed pursuant to the extension agreed to;
 - (b) and the House is in Committee, the Speaker shall resume the Chair and when such motion is agreed to, the Chairman shall resume the Chair and the Committee resume its deliberations and proceed pursuant to the extension agreed to;

Provided that if at the time of interruption-

- (a) a division is in progress, the division shall be completed and the result announced:
- (b) the Question under Standing Order 1758 "That the Question be now put" having been agreed to, the provisions of such Standing Order shall apply.
- (4) Debate upon the question "That this House do now adjourn" shall not exceed forty minutes with five private members being permitted to speak to such motion for no more than five minutes each and replies by Ministers being limited to three minutes for each matter.

2. PRIVILEGE- MINISTERIAL RECORDS:

The Honourable Member for Gordon, Mr Moore, said that the use by the Government of records of a previous administration of ministerial correspondence from a Member of this Parliament to a member of a previous administration was contrary to Westminster Convention and constituted a breach of privilege.

Mr Speaker stated that in relation to matters outside this House there are no privileges. There is no accepted privilege regarding the revealing of material held by Ministers. He ruled that no prima facie case of breach of privilege had been established.

The Honourable Member for Lane Cove, Mr Dowd, said that Members of Parliament in carrying out their functions and duties must be able to make representations to Ministers without those representations being canvassed in the House.

Mr Speaker stated that no privilege is involved in Ministers raising matters relating to constituents arising from either correspondence or verbal inquiry from Members. He ruled that no prima facie case of breach of privilege had been established.

- (2) That such Committee consist of three members of the Legislative Council and five members of the Legislative Assembly.
- (3) That at any meeting of the Committee any three members shall constitute a quorum, provided that the Committee shall meet as a Joint Committee at all times
- (4) That Mr Gabb, Mr Phillips, Mr Langton, Mr Webster and Mr Walsh be appointed to serve on such Committee as members of the Legislative Assembly.
- (5) That the Committee have leave to sit during the sittings or any adjournment of either or both Houses, to adjourn from place to place, to make visits of inspection within the State of New South Wales and other States and Territories of Australia, and have power to take evidence and send for persons and papers, and to report from time to time.

8. Mr Smith to move-

That leave be given to bring in a Bill for an Act to protect private property from unjust acquisition by the Crown.

(Property Rights Protection Bill.)

9. Mr Smith to move—

- (1) That Standing Order 79 be amended by leaving out "forty-five" with a view to inserting "sixty" instead thereof.
- (2) That the amended Standing Order be presented by Mr Speaker to His Excellency the Governor for approval.

C10. Mr SCHIPP to move—

- (1) That a Select Committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the effects of natural disasters in New South Wales with particular reference to—
 - (a) government assistance schemes in relation to-
 - (i) availability of funds and their allocations;
 - (ii) establishment of permanent natural disaster relief schemes; and
 - (iii) co-ordination of relief with other Governments;
 - (b) insurance industry policies in relation to—
 - (i) adequate insurance policies to protect the public, and
 - (ii) cost of premiums of associated insurance.

- (2) That such Committee consist of Mr Beckroge, Mr Bowman, Mr Hay, Mr Knowles, Mr Neilly, Mr Webster and the mover.
- (3) That the Committee have leave to sit during the sittings or any adjournment of the House, to adjourn from place to place, to make visits of inspection within the State of New South Wales and other States and Territories of Australia, and have power to take evidence and send for persons and papers, and to report from time to time.

C11. Mr SMITH to move—

- (1) That a Select Committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the disposal and recycling of domestic and industrial waste products.
- (2) That such Committee consist of Mr Aquilina, Mr Fisher, Mr Hay, Mr Langton, Mr Neilly, Dr Refshauge and Mr Smith.
- (3) That the Committee have leave to sit during the sittings or any adjournment of the House, to adjourn from place to place and to make visits of inspection within the State of New South Wales, within the other States and Territories of Australia and overseas.

C12. Mr COLLINS to move—

- (1) That a Select Committee be appointed to investigate and report upon the desirability of the introduction of television and radio to cover proceedings of the N.S.W. Parliament and to consider—
 - (a) whether such coverage would involve the establishment of a radio and television unit within Parliamentary staff;
 - (b) what limitations, if any, should apply to use of such broadcast material;
 - (c) what modifications, if any, would be required to the Chamber to facilitate such coverage; and
 - (d) all relevant issues raised by the Joint Select Committee on Parliamentary Privilege relating specifically to such broadcast proposals.
- (2) That such Committee consist of Mr Beckroge, Mr Gabb, Mr Mochalski, Mr West and the mover.
- (3) That the Committee have leave to sit during the sittings or any adjournment of the House, to adjourn from place to place and to make visits of inspection within the State of New South Wales, other States of Australia, the Australian Capital Territory and overseas.

Mr COLLINS to move—

That this House reaffirms its right and responsibility to the people of N.S.W. to review the cost-effectiveness of Universities and Colleges of Advanced Education established under N.S.W. legislation with particular reference to—

- (1) the inability of graduates to obtain employment after completing courses;
- (2) the employability of graduates according to various courses and institutions;
- (3) the need for course options to include provision for projected vacancies in the workforce:

(4) the ultimate need for any organisation in receipt of public funds to account to the people through their elected representatives especially the Public Accounts Committee of this Parliament.

14. Mr Greiner to move-

That this House condemns the State and Federal Governments for their callous disregard of the needs of the elderly of New South Wales with particular reference to—

- (1) the assets test;
- (2) the proposed capital gains tax;
- (3) the Medicare 35-day rule:
- (4) the proposed Federal estate and death duties;
- (5) the freeze on services provided by home care service;
- (6) the continued refusal to approve extensions to nursing home services; and
- (7) the F.I.D. tax on pensions.

15. Mr Schipp to move—

That this House notes the failure of the Minister for Housing to complete appropriate arrangements with the Commonwealth Government to allow the Pilot Housing Scheme at Holsworthy to proceed to completion and supports the reference of this matter to the Public Accounts Committee to investigate and report on—

- (1) the reasons for the scheme being abandoned in 1976 after expenditure in excess of \$6 m;
- (2) the financial implications for the State and the loss of public housing opportunities;
- (3) the potential for immediate completion and release of Stage 1 comprising 550 building lots; and
- (4) the potential for extension of the development to provide further opportunities for low to medium income homeseekers in the western suburbs.

16. Mr BECK to move-

That this House censures the Minister for Agriculture for his failure to protect the Cattle Industry in New South Wales against the ravages of ticks by—

- (1) abolishing compulsory dipping of cattle in the tick quarantine area;
- (2) failing to control his department and allowing such decisions to be taken by the bureaucracy; and
- (3) failing to accept the advice to the Livestock and Grain Producers Association, Dairy Farmers Association, Cattle Men's Union, Australian Veterinary Associations, Cattle Council of Australia and numerous public meetings in the tick area.

17. Mr PARK to move-

That this House-

- (1) condemns the Government for its failure to compensate former coal owners whose property was confiscated in January, 1982 under the Coal Acquisition Act 1981, and
- (2) calls upon the Government to-
 - (a) make public the findings and recommendations of the Task Force which was appointed in February, 1982; and
 - (b) proceed immediately to pay compensation on just terms or repeal the legislation.

18. Mr COLLINS to move—

That this House recognising the cultural significance and earning potential to this State of the film industry and noting the overlapping facilities provided by the Australian Film Commission and the N.S.W. Film Corporation in Los Angeles, California to market Australian Films, calls on the Government to negotiate for the Australian Government to entirely take over that overseas role, thereby freeing funds for spending within this State.

Mr Yabsley to move—

That this House in expressing extreme concern about the abuse of illicit drugs, particularly within Corrective Services institutions and noting the need for the establishment of a complete programme of preventative and remedial action in relation to drug abuse, co-ordinated by a national drug authority, condemns the government for allowing the insidious trade of illicit drugs and associated crime to continue.

20. Mr Collins to move—

That this House, noting the high rate of youth unemployment particularly in the western region of Sydney, and recognising the inability of several councils in the western region to participate in the Hawke Government's Community Employment Programme due to severe pressures on them and their ratepayers, urges the Government to call on the Hawke Government to revise these Community Employment Programme inadequacies.

Mr Collins to move—

That this House, expressing its concern at cutbacks announced by the Australia Council to freeze the funding level for major theatre companies and the Australian Ballet, with particular reference to—

- (1) the consequent effect on the Sydney Theatre Company and Nimrod Theatre;
- (2) the increased burden on the Government; and
- (3) the need for clarification of the respective roles and priorities of both State and Federal Governments in Arts funding:

calls upon the Government to urge the Hawke Government to reverse the decision to divert funds away from flagship companies with world-recognised standards of excellence.

22. Mr COLLINS to move—

That the N.S.W. Government-

- (1) remind the Hawke Government of its commitment to the workforce at Cockatoo Dockyard in Sydney made before the last federal election to construct a second supply ship for the Royal Australian Navy;
- (2) reaffirm the Government's commitment to win the R.A.N. submarine replacement contract for this State;
- (3) review its stated preference to construct those submarines at the Newcastle State Dockyard; and
- (4) recognise that any such decision in favour of Newcastle would be at the expense of 2 500 existing jobs at Cockatoo Dockvard.

23. Mr Smith to move-

That the Government immediately reduce freight charges, port charges and royalties to the coal industry to enable producers to profitably produce coal and maintain employment when the current stockpiles are depleted.

C24. Mr MURRAY to move-

- (1) That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to inquire into and report upon the appropriate role, operation, functions and financial arrangements for local government in this State with particular reference to—
 - (a) greater autonomy and power in decision making at the local level through local government councils;
 - (b) duplication and delays in decision making which restrict the progress and development of local government areas of this State;
 - (c) the imposition on ratepayers of meeting 50 per cent of pensioner rates, fees to the N.S.W. Planning and Environment Commission and the N.S.W. Board of Fire Commissioners, and the effects arising from the abolition of the Local Government Assistance Fund; and
 - (d) the implementation of a scheme where unemployed people can participate in projects which will benefit the community and those who are unemployed.


