VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, 27 MAY, 1862.

1. Opening of the Session :—The House met at Twelve o'clock, at noon, pursuant to Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the 17th day of April last, of which a copy was read by the Clerk, as follows :—

“ PROCLAMATION.

“ *By His Excellency the Right Honorable SIR JOHN YOUNG, Baronet, Knight  
“ Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross  
“ of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Captain  
“ General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales, and Vice-  
“ Admiral of the same.*

“ Whereas the Parliament of New South Wales now stands prorogued to  
“ Tuesday, the twenty-ninth day of April instant: Now, I, SIR JOHN YOUNG, in  
“ pursuance of the power and authority in me vested, as Governor of the said Colony,  
“ do hereby further prorogue the said Parliament to Tuesday, the twenty-seventh  
“ day of May next ensuing; and I do hereby further announce and proclaim, that  
“ the said Parliament shall assemble, for the despatch of business, on the aforesaid  
“ twenty-seventh day of May next, at Twelve o'clock at noon, in the Buildings known  
“ as the Council Chambers, situate in Macquarie-street, in the City of Sydney, and  
“ the Members of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, respectively,  
“ are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

“ Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this  
“ seventeenth day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand  
“ eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her  
“ Majesty's Reign.

4. Message from His Excellency the Governor :—The Usher of the Black Rod, being admitted, delivered a Message, “ That it is the pleasure of the Governor, that this

The House went, and, being returned, adjourned, on motion of Mr. Cowper, at half-past Twelve o'clock, until Three o'clock this day.

The House resumed pursuant to adjournment.

13. The Governor's Opening Speech:—The Speaker reported, that the House had this day attended the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, where His Excellency was pleased to deliver an Opening Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which, for greater accuracy, he had obtained a copy, which he then read to the House, as follows:—

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,  
AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

1. In meeting you in Parliament on the present occasion, it is my painful duty to announce the loss which has been sustained by Her Majesty, and the whole British Empire, in the sudden and premature Death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort. This melancholy event, which took place at Windsor Castle on the 14th December last, has been officially communicated by a Despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle. The character and virtues of the Illustrious Prince, whose loss we, in common with the whole Nation, so deeply deplore, will I am persuaded induce you to join with your fellow-subjects in the fervent expression of your loyal sympathy with Her Most Gracious Majesty under this afflicting dispensation.

2. The season of the year at which you are now called together is obviously the most appropriate for the despatch of the Parliamentary business of the country, and I feel much satisfaction in opening the Session sufficiently early to afford reasonable time for the transaction of public business before the arrival of the summer months.

3. I congratulate you upon the prosperity and encouraging prospects of the Colony. Trade and commerce are in a flourishing and healthy condition, population is steadily increasing and diffusing itself over the various Districts, and a spirit of contentment pervades the community.

4. The Gold Field at the Lachlan, which has already yielded large returns, promises to become still more productive. In order to maintain regular communication with that District during the winter months, and ensure to the numerous population which has been attracted into that remote district a continuous supply of the necessaries of life, it is essential that a considerable expenditure should be incurred. A special application will be immediately made to you for a grant for that purpose, and for otherwise facilitating traffic with the interior.

5. The great advantage which will arise to the Public Service from having the business of the various Departments of Government conducted in immediate contiguity with each other, renders it a matter of importance that a commencement should be made towards the erection of New Houses of Parliament and Public Offices, in accordance with the design which has been already approved by the Legislature. A proposition will be made to you to appropriate a sum for this service.

6. The question of unrestricted commercial intercourse between New South Wales and the adjoining Colonies has long engaged the attention of this Government, and the rapid settlement of population in the Border Districts renders an early adjustment very desirable. It is with much gratification that I inform you that the importance of this subject is now becoming more generally recognized, and that the Government of South Australia has sought the co-operation of this Colony in the appointment of a Commission of Representatives from the various Australian Colonies, to consider and report on the question of an uniform Tariff, which will form the basis of an arrangement by which each Colony will receive that proportion of the Revenue to which it is equitably entitled. I recommend the subject to your attentive consideration.

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

7. The Estimates for the year 1863 will be submitted to you without delay.

8. I have much pleasure in informing you that the Revenue continues to improve.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

9. I have been favoured with the opinion of the Crown Law Officers of England upon the question of the Church and School Estates, a copy of which shall be laid before you. A Bill will be presented to you, with a view of determining by Legislation the disposition of these lands.

10. The Bill for the adjustment of the outstanding accounts between this Colony and Queensland will also be brought under the consideration of Parliament.

11. Bills for placing the Constitution of the Legislative Council on an Elective basis, for abolishing State Aid to Religion, for the better maintenance and establishment of Schools for Elementary Education, for regulating the Transfer of Land, for the amendment of the Municipality Act, for consolidating and amending the Law of Insolvency, the Criminal Law of the Colony, the Customs Laws, and the Postage Acts, for regulating Dividing Fences, for regulating the Impounding of Cattle, for registering Cattle Brands, for regulating the Coal Fields, for authorizing Liens on Agricultural Crops and Produce, and for other matters of great practical interest, will also be submitted to you.

12. I earnestly pray that the blessing of the Almighty may attend your counsels, and that He may guide you to the advancement of the welfare and happiness of the people whose interests are committed to your care.

Dr. Lang then moved, and Mr. Garrett seconded the motion :—

(1.) That a Select Committee be appointed to prepare an Address in reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor on opening the present Session of the Parliament of New South Wales.

(2.) That such Committee consist of the following members,—Dr. Lang, Mr. Garrett, Mr. Atkinson, Mr. Dickson, Mr. Lackey, Mr. Weekes, Mr. Smart, and Mr. Sutherland.

Question put and passed.

And the Committee retired to prepare the Address.

And Dr. Lang having brought up the Address prepared by the Committee, the same was read by the Clerk, by direction of the Speaker, as follows :—

“ To His Excellency the Right Honorable SIR JOHN YOUNG, Baronet, Knight  
 “ Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross  
 “ of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Captain  
 “ General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of New South Wales, and  
 “ Vice-Admiral of the same.

“ MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

“ We, Her Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, in Parliament assembled, desire to express  
 “ to Your Excellency our affection and loyalty to the Person and Government of our  
 “ Most Gracious Sovereign; and to offer our respectful thanks for Your Excellency's  
 “ Speech.

“ 1. We deeply regret that the painful duty has devolved upon your Excellency  
 “ of communicating to us the mournful intelligence of the grievous and unlooked for  
 “ bereavement

“ bereavement which Her Most Gracious Majesty has sustained by the premature death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort; and we fervently unite with all Her Majesty’s faithful subjects in the general sorrow occasioned by the death of a Prince who had endeared himself to the British Nation by such stainless character and so many public and private virtues.

“ 2. We agree with Your Excellency that the present season of the year is that most appropriate for the despatch of the Parliamentary business of the Country.

“ 3. It affords us much gratification to be informed that the Colony is in a state of prosperity, and that its prospects are encouraging.

“ 4. We agree with your Excellency that immediate steps ought to be taken to ensure a continuous supply of the necessaries of life to the large population which has been attracted to the Gold Fields in the Lachlan District. And we will give our best consideration to any application which may be made for that purpose, and for otherwise facilitating traffic with the interior.

“ 5. We concur with Your Excellency that advantage will arise to the Public Service from having the business of the various Departments of Government conducted in immediate contiguity with each other; and shall be prepared to consider the proposition for immediately commencing the erection of the proposed New Houses of Parliament and Public Offices.

“ 6. We fully recognize the great value which would arise from unrestricted commercial intercourse between all the Australian Colonies, and will give our early and anxious deliberation to the subject with a view to the amicable settlement of the disputed question respecting Customs Duties.

“ 7. It is highly gratifying to us to hear that the Revenue continues to improve.

“ 8. The numerous and important measures which will be submitted to us shall receive our careful consideration, and we join with Your Excellency in the prayer that the blessing of the Almighty may direct our counsels to the welfare and happiness of the people of this Colony.”

Dr. Lang then moved, That the Address in reply to the Governor’s Opening Speech, as read by the Clerk, be now adopted by this House.

Debate ensued.

Question put and passed.

14. Mr. John Anderson Robertson:—Mr. Windeyer presented a Petition from John Anderson Robertson, Esq., Writer to the Signet, late Commissioner of Crown Lands for the District of Bligh, in this Colony, but now of Amherst House, Guernsey, stating, that under the circumstances therein set forth, he was discharged from his said office by Sir William Denison, and praying investigation of his case. Petition received.
15. Adjournment:—Mr. Cowper,—intimating that he had it in command from the Governor to state that His Excellency would be pleased to receive the Address of the Assembly in reply to his Opening Speech, at half-past three o’clock to-morrow,—moved, That this House do now adjourn until to-morrow, at three o’clock, for the purpose of proceeding to Government House, there, at half-past three o’clock, to present to the Governor their Address in reply to His Excellency’s Opening Speech. Question put and passed.
- Whereupon the Speaker left the Chair, and the House stood adjourned, at five minutes after Six o’clock, until To-morrow, at Three o’clock.

*Message No. 2.*

With reference to the Address of the Legislative Assembly of 30th ultimo, the Governor has pleasure in transmitting a copy of the Despatch, which, on receipt of the Resolutions communicated to him by the Legislative Assembly, dated 13th September, 1861, he addressed to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, enclosing these Resolutions, and requesting instructions on the points raised in them.

With this Despatch the Governor forwarded all the papers on the subject, which have at various periods been ordered to be printed by the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly.

The Secretary of State, in replying, enclosed a copy of the opinion obtained from the Law Officers of the Crown, in England. This opinion was no doubt considered by His Grace, as the answer to the Governor's queries, and it was transmitted accordingly, for his information and guidance.

The covering Despatch His Grace thought proper to mark "Separate," thus withdrawing it from the regular numbered series and category of Despatches liable to be called for by Parliament—the Governor, therefore, has no authority to produce it.

The Governor thinks it right to say that the general management of the Church and School Lands, and the appropriation of the proceeds arising from their disposal, are matters of local concern, and may properly be dealt with by the local Legislature.

While the Law Officers of the Crown have given the opinion that the Crown is still Trustee of these lands, there is no wish to interfere, farther than to see that due respect be paid to the interests (if any) of individuals, and the question decided in a regular and constitutional manner, either by the judgment of a Court of Justice, or by an enactment in which all three branches of the Legislature shall concur.

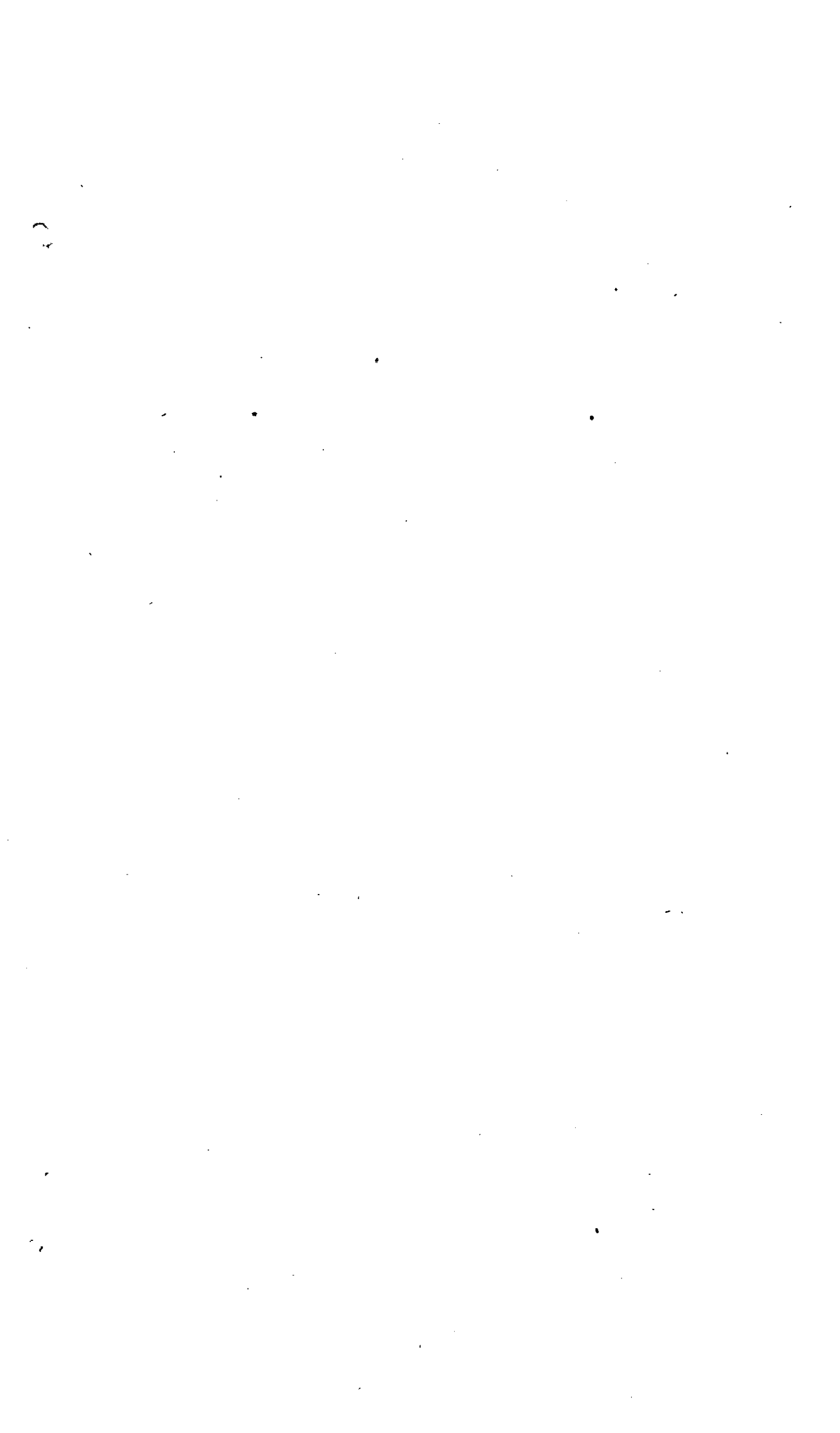

" We, the Members of the Legislative Assembly in Parliament assembled, believing that the maintenance of perfect religious equality is essential to our well-being and happiness as a people, and observing that the British Government have, by a Despatch from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, ordered the Clergy of the State Church of England, in this Country, to take precedence of all other religious bodies on State occasions. We, in consequence of this position assumed by the British Government, unanimously passed a Resolution, maintaining, that perfect religious equality should in all time coming, be observed in the Colony of New South Wales. This Resolution was transmitted to Her Majesty's Government in England, and we are sorry to be informed, by a Despatch from the British Government, in answer, that the British Government decline to recommend the unanimous Resolution of this House to the consideration of Her Majesty. We consequently again transmit to Her Majesty's Government in England the same Resolution, accompanied by this protest, maintaining the same principle, namely:—That no religious body shall, on any occasion, take precedence of any other religious body in this Country.

" That we protest against any such invidious distinction, as is implied by the order which gives precedence to the Clergy of the State Church of England, being introduced here—a distinction only calculated to engender rancour, animosity, and the bitterest feelings of ill-will amongst the various religious sects, and to endanger that peace and happiness which have so uniformly attended the people of this Country. We consider the principle involved in this Resolution and protest of vital importance to the happiness and well-being of all the religious denominations in this land, and respectfully hope that the British Government, on re-considering this matter, may shew that deference to the unanimously expressed wish of this House, and give that consideration to the importance of the principle involved in this Resolution and protest which common justice and an enlightened appreciation of the rights of a majority of the people of New South Wales would naturally dictate."

That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs, which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.

We, in consequence of this position assumed by the British Government, unanimously passed a Resolution, maintaining, that perfect religious equality should in all time coming, be observed in the Colony of New South Wales. This Resolution was transmitted to Her Majesty's Government in England, and we are sorry to be informed, by a Despatch from the British Government, in answer, that the British Government decline to recommend the unanimous Resolution of this House to the consideration of Her Majesty. We consequently again transmit to Her Majesty's Government in England the same Resolution, accompanied by this protest, maintaining the same principle, namely:—That no religious body shall, on any occasion, take precedence of any other religious body in this Country.

"That we protest against any such invidious distinction, as is implied by the order which gives precedence to the Clergy of the State Church of England, being introduced here—a distinction only calculated to engender rancour, animosity, and the bitterest feelings of ill-will amongst the various religious sects, and to endanger that peace and happiness which have so uniformly attended the people of this Country. We consider the principle involved in this Resolution and protest of vital importance to the happiness and well-being of all the religious denominations in this land, and respectfully hope that the British Government, on re-considering this matter, may shew that deference to the unanimously expressed wish of this House, and give that consideration to the importance of the principle involved in this Resolution and protest which common justice and an enlightened appreciation of the rights of a majority of the people of New South Wales would naturally dictate."

That it should therefore be enacted that every Immigrant, whether male or female, of from fourteen to fifty years of age, arriving in the Colony direct from Europe, or the person or persons paying his or her passage, should receive, on his or her arrival, or be held entitled to, Twenty acres of any such land as may be open at the time for Free Selection under the Lands Act, as a free gift, and to other Ten acres at the end of two years thereafter, if he or she should then be resident in the Colony; and that half that extent, or Ten and Five acres respectively, should be allowed for each child of from one to fourteen years of age; provided that Immigrants, arriving in this Colony with five or more children, shall not be excluded from participating in this arrangement although upwards of fifty years of age.
  - (3.) That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs, which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.

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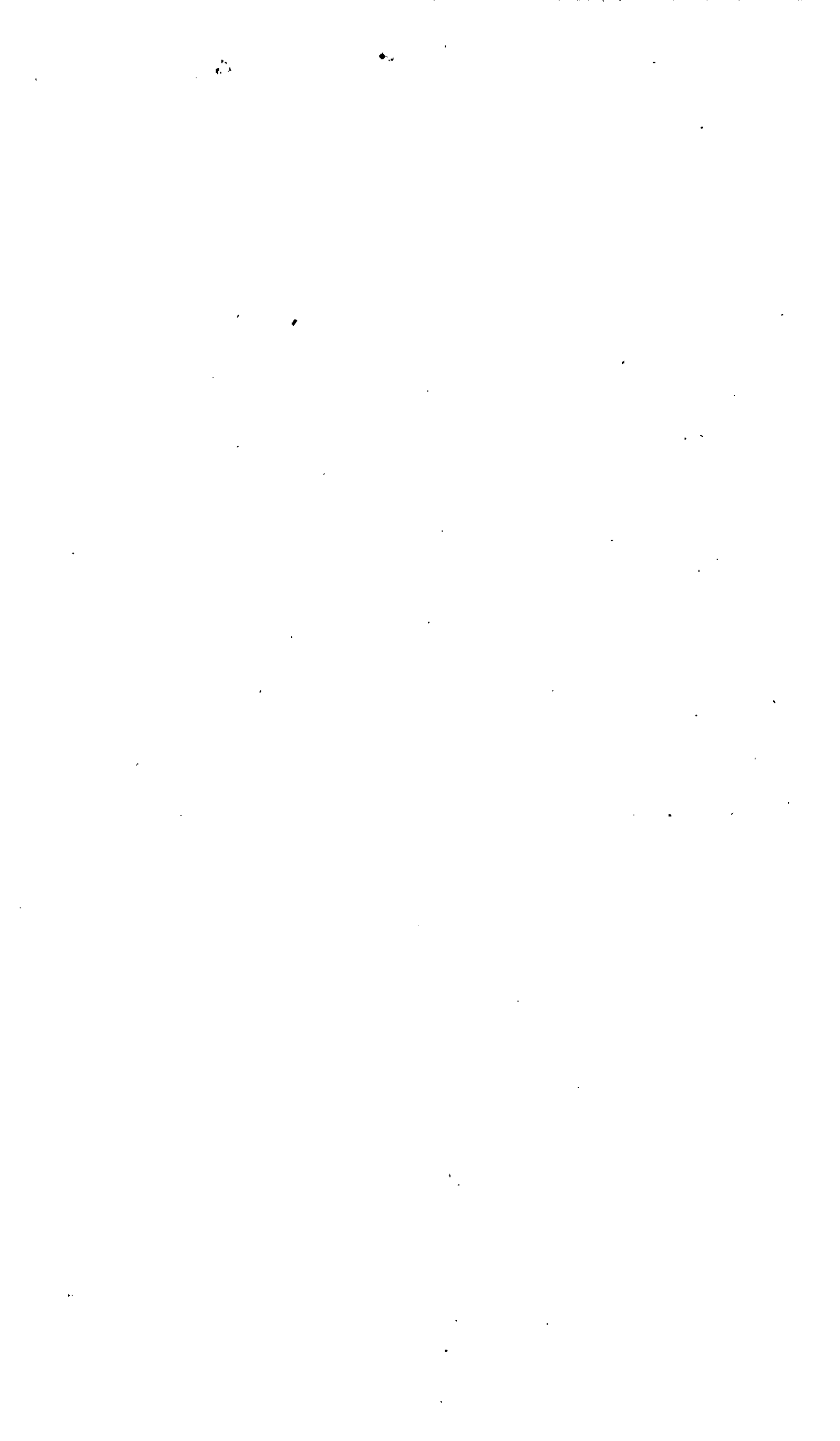

That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs, which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.

Religious Equality:—Mr. Buchanan moved, pursuant to amended notice, That in the opinion of this House the principle of perfect religious equality shall be observed on all occasions in this Country, and that the following protest against the English Government disregarding the Resolution of this House, to the above effect, already sent them, be adopted. That this Resolution and Protest be conveyed by address to His Excellency, with a request to transmit the same to the Home Government.

“ We, the Members of the Legislative Assembly in Parliament assembled, believing that the maintenance of perfect religious equality is essential to our well-being and happiness as a people, and observing that the British Government have, by a Despatch from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies,

“ Colonies, ordered the Clergy of the State Church of England, in this Country, to take precedence of all other religious bodies on State occasions. We, in consequence of this position assumed by the British Government, unanimously passed a Resolution, maintaining, that perfect religious equality should in all time coming, be observed in the Colony of New South Wales. This Resolution was transmitted to Her Majesty’s Government in England, and we are sorry to be informed, by a Despatch from the British Government, in answer, that the British Government decline to recommend the unanimous Resolution of this House to the consideration of Her Majesty. We consequently again transmit to Her Majesty’s Government in England the same Resolution, accompanied by this protest, maintaining the same principle, namely :—That no religious body shall, on any occasion, take precedence of any other religious body in this Country.

“ That we protest against any such invidious distinction, as is implied by the order which gives precedence to the Clergy of the State Church of England, being introduced here—a distinction only calculated to engender rancour, animosity, and the bitterest feelings of ill-will amongst the various religious sects, and to endanger that peace and happiness which have so uniformly attended the people of this Country. We consider the principle involved in this Resolution and protest of vital importance to the happiness and well-being of all the religious denominations in this land, and respectfully hope that the British Government, on re-considering this matter, may shew that deference to the unanimously expressed wish of this House, and give that consideration to the importance of the principle involved in this Resolution and protest which common justice and an enlightened appreciation of the rights of a majority of the people of New South Wales would naturally dictate.”

Mr. Cowper moved the Previous Question.

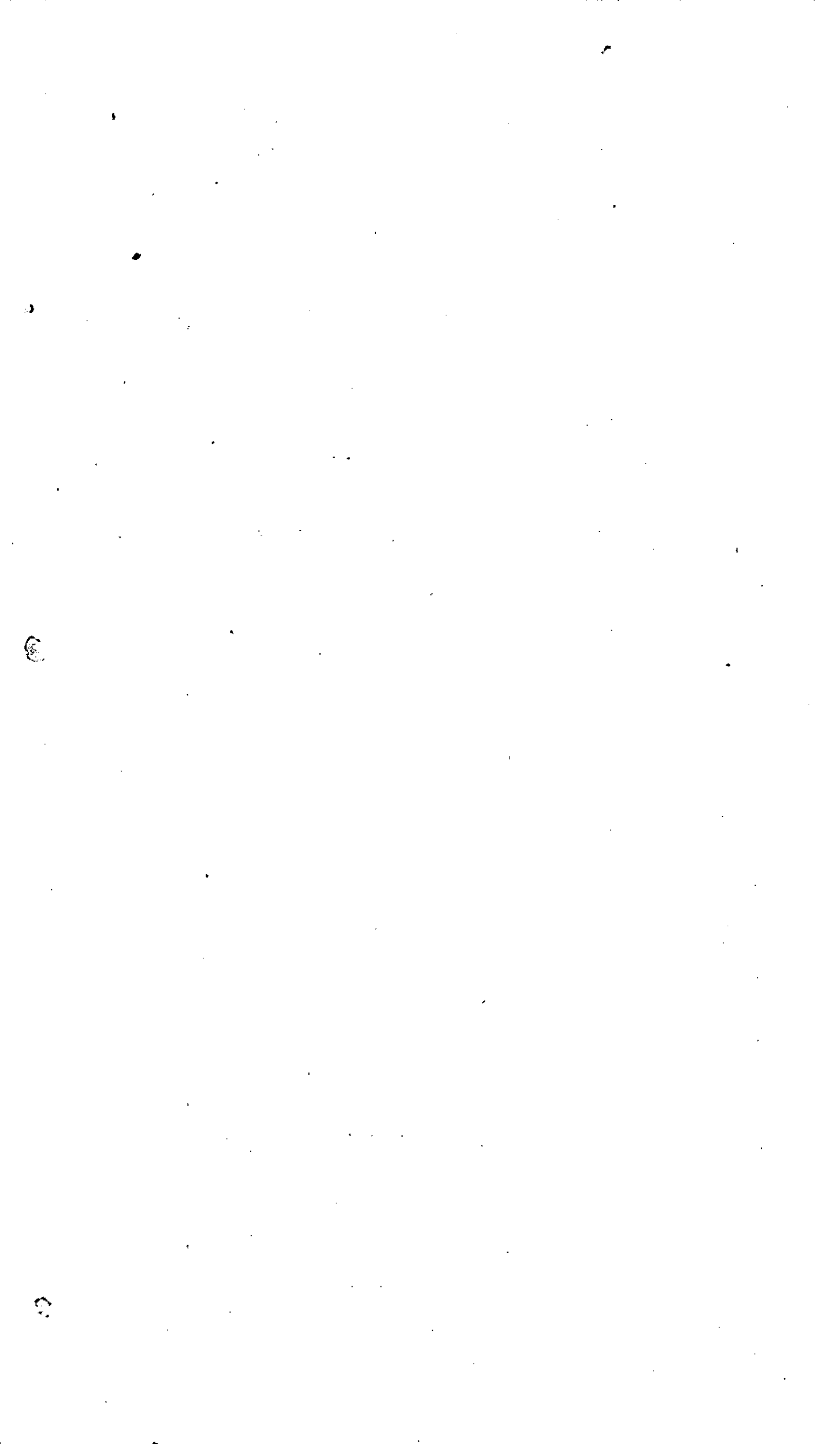

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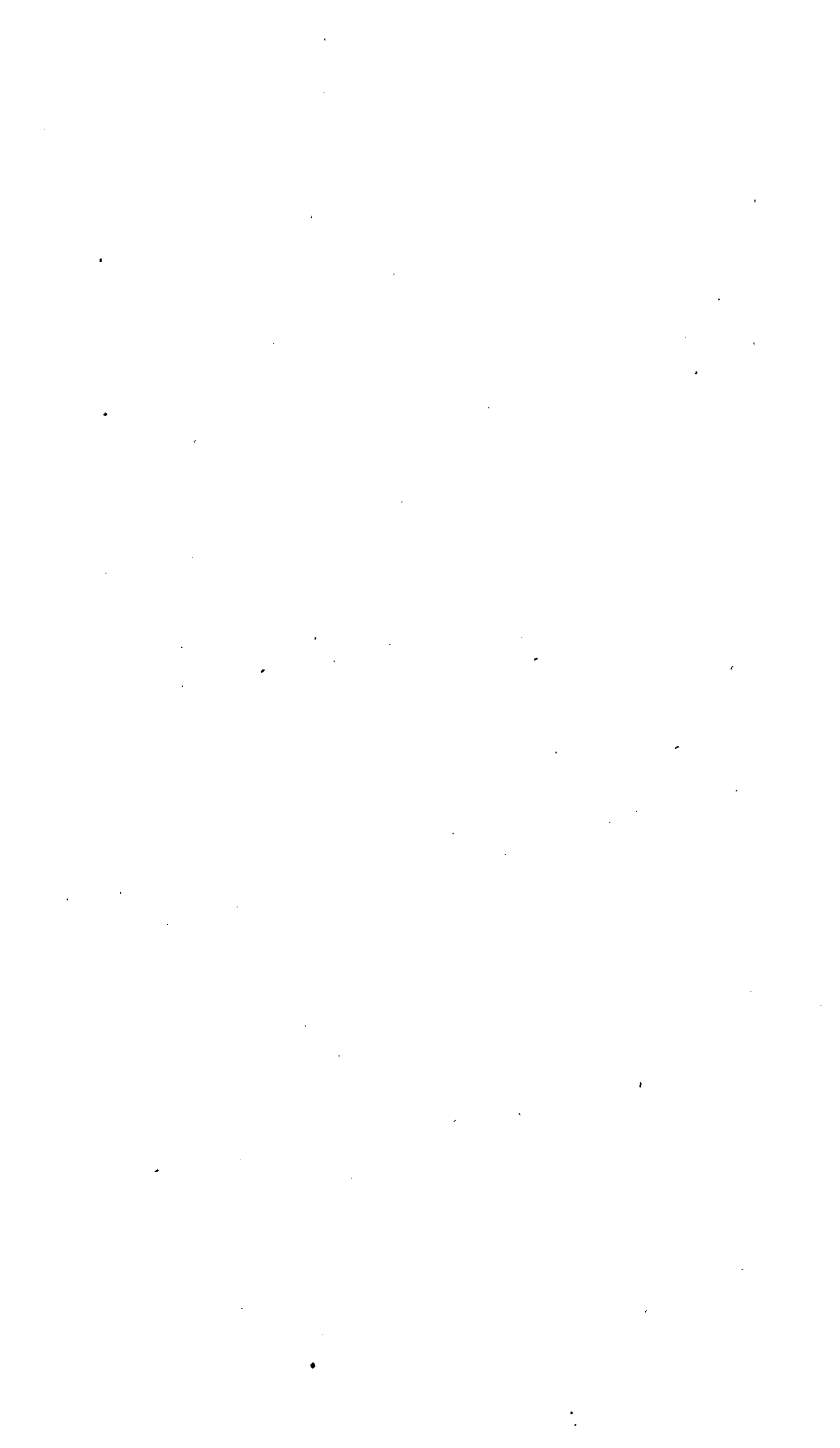

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

THURSDAY, 3 JULY, 1862.

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment; the Speaker took the Chair.  
Petition of G. U. Alley (*Point of Order*):—Mr. Smart, on behalf of the Chairman, brought up the Report from the Standing Orders Committee, in reference to the Petition of G. U. Alley,—which was read by the Clerk, by direction of the Speaker, as follows:—

Irregularity in Petitions—(*Point of Order*):—Mr. Smart, drawing attention to the two Petitions presented by Mr. Piddington, on the 1st instant, and recorded in Entries 2 and 5, in the Votes and Proceedings of that day, as having been respectively signed by Jabez Bunting, as Chairman of certain Public Meetings held at the Glebe, protested, on behalf of the Electors of the Glebe, against the use of their authority in these matters by the said Jabez Bunting.  
The Speaker said, that as, according to the practice of Parliament, if the Chairman of a Public Meeting signs a Petition on behalf of those assembled it is only received as the Petition of the individual, the two Petitions in question could only be regarded as those of Mr. Jabez Bunting.

8. DR. LANG to move for leave to bring in a Bill to legalize the exchange of a small triangular portion of the original allotment of the Scots Church, lying on the south side of Jamison-street, for a similar triangular portion of the allotment of the late Sir John Jamison.
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  - (1.) That, in the opinion of this House, it is expedient and necessary that additional facilities, besides those implied in the Lands Act, should be afforded by the promotion of the Immigration into this Colony of reputable and industrious families and individuals from the Mother Country and the Continent of Europe; as also for the growth of Cotton and other semi-tropical products, for which the soil and climate of New South Wales have long been proved to be admirably adapted.
  - (2.) That it should therefore be enacted that every Immigrant, whether male or female, of from fourteen to fifty years of age, arriving in the Colony direct from Europe, or the person or persons paying his or her passage, should receive, on his or her arrival, or be held entitled to, Twenty acres of any such land as may be open at the time for Free Selection under the Lands Act, as a free gift, and to other Ten acres at the end of two years thereafter, if he or she should then be resident in the Colony; and that half that extent, or Ten and Five acres respectively, should be allowed for each child of from one to fourteen years of age; provided that Immigrants, arriving in this Colony with five or more children, shall not be excluded from participating in this arrangement although upwards of fifty years of age.
  - (3.) That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs., which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.

That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs., which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.

1. MR. GARRETT to move for leave to bring in a Bill to allow the Bulli Coal Company to construct a Railway from land of its own at Bulli to Bellambi Harbour.
2. MR. DANGAR to move, That in the opinion of this House the Government should institute an inquiry into the conduct of J. B. Bettington, Esq., J.P., of Merriwa, and Mr. John Morris, Clerk of Petty Sessions, in connection with the late assault upon Mr. Murray.

That, in the opinion of this House, it is expedient and necessary that additional facilities, besides those implied in the Lands Act, should be afforded by the promotion of the Immigration into this Colony of reputable and industrious families and individuals from the Mother Country and the Continent of Europe; as also for the growth of Cotton and other semi-tropical products, for which the soil and climate of New South Wales have long been proved to be admirably adapted.
  - (2.) That it should therefore be enacted that every Immigrant, whether male or female, of from fourteen to fifty years of age, arriving in the Colony direct from Europe, or the person or persons paying his or her passage, should receive, on his or her arrival, or be held entitled to, Twenty acres of any such land as may be open at the time for Free Selection under the Lands Act, as a free gift, and to other Ten acres at the end of two years thereafter, if he or she should then be resident in the Colony; and that half that extent, or Ten and Five acres respectively, should be allowed for each child of from one to fourteen years of age; provided that Immigrants, arriving in this Colony with five or more children, shall not be excluded from participating in this arrangement although upwards of fifty years of age.
  - (3.) That it should also be enacted that, during the three years commencing on the first of January next, a *bonus* in land to the extent of Ten acres be given to the grower of every bale of good cleaned Sea Island Cotton, without any admixture of damaged or discoloured, being the growth of the Colony, and weighing 300lbs., which may be exported to Great Britain or elsewhere, and that a *bonus* of one-half that extent should be allowed for the two next following years; provided that if the Cotton for which such *bonus* is claimed be of the common coarser description, the *bonus* shall be only one-half the extent allowed for Sea Island Cotton.
6. MR. DANGAR to move, That there be laid upon the Table of this House, a Return shewing,—
  - (1.) The amount paid, since the introduction of Responsible Government, as Compensation for opening Public Roads, whether main or minor, through private property.
  - (2.) The names of the parties to whom such compensation has been paid.

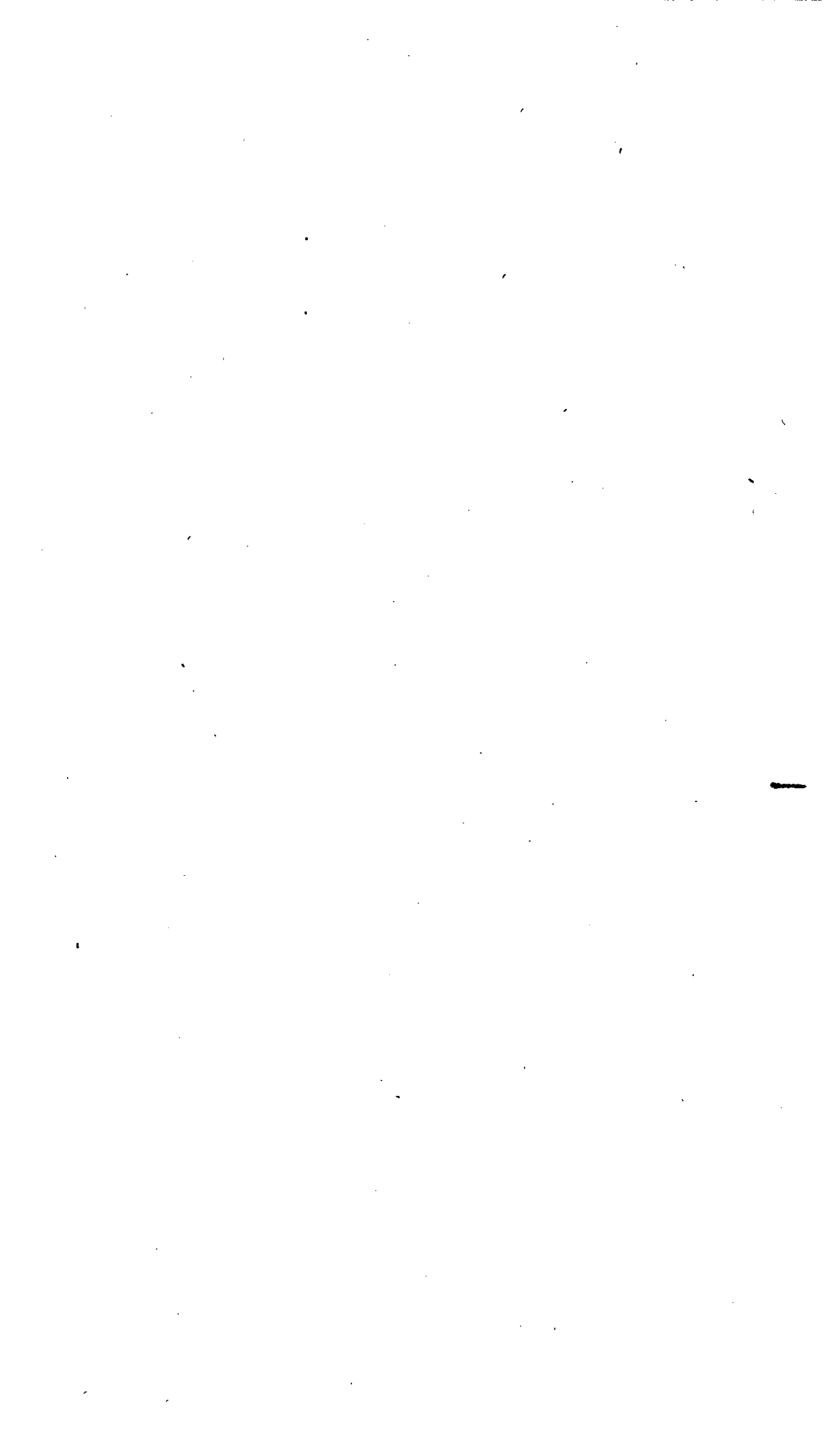

That it should therefore be enacted that every Immigrant, whether male or female, of from fourteen to fifty years of age, arriving in the Colony direct from Europe, or the person or persons paying his or her passage, should receive, on his or her arrival, or be held entitled to, Twenty acres of any such land as may be open at the time for Free Selection under the Lands Act, as a free gift, and to other Ten acres at the end of two years thereafter, if he or she should then be resident in the Colony ; and that half that extent, or Ten and Five acres respectively, should be allowed for each child of from one to fourteen years of age ; provided that Immigrants, arriving in this Colony with five or more children, shall not be excluded from participating in this arrangement although upwards of fifty years of age.

DALGLEISH to ask THE SECRETARY FOR PUBLIC WORKS the following questions, having reference to enquiry made and reply given in this House on the 17th of January last—when Mr. Lucas asked the Secretary for Public Works, “Whether the Government have directed the Colonial Architect, or any other public Officer, to take prompt and effectual measures for the abatement of an offensive and dangerous public nuisance, which has been repeatedly notified during the last twelve months by the Municipal Officer of Health to arise from the escape of night soil from the Gaol of Darlinghurst over the adjacent parts of the City; and if such directions have been given, why the nuisance above referred to still remains unremoved and undiminished.” The Secretary for Public Works is reported to have returned the following answer,—“That, in pursuance of instructions issued from the Works Department, the Colonial Architect had caused steps to be taken for the temporary abatement of the nuisance complained of, and had stated that further steps would at once be taken for the permanent remedying of the evil, by carrying out of an effective system of drainage at Darlinghurst Gaol,”—
  - (1.) Whether the Government intend to abate the offensive and dangerous nuisance above referred to by an effective system of drainage?
  - (2.) Whether the Secretary for Public Works deems that the evil complained of has been adequately remedied by the recent construction alluded to by the Municipal Officer of Health in his Reports dated April 14th, 1862, and June 10th, as under?

“April 15, 1862.

“Town Hall, Health Officer's Department,  
“April 14th.

“Gentlemen,—The duties of the City Health Officer, as laid down for his guidance in the Corporation Act, render it imperative in him to bring under the notice of the City Council ‘all nuisances or other local causes tending to produce, aggravate, or continue diseases, or otherwise injure the health of the inhabitants.

“I therefore consider it my duty to bring under official notice, through the City Council, the objectionable sanitary condition of certain cesspools within the walls of Darlinghurst Gaol, which have recently been erected. They are very extensive, and are calculated to contain a large quantity of filth; are exposed to the open air, &c. The effluvia from them are already very perceptible within the walls of the Gaol, and, if not soon removed, will give rise to malaria, causing and extending zymotic diseases.

“These open pools of filth must, necessarily, rapidly fill, from the number of persons within the establishment; and when they require emptying, which must be frequent, will be productive of an intolerable nuisance throughout the whole neighbourhood.

“So long as Darlinghurst Gaol is without sewerage and drainage, this, and the previous nuisance, so often complained of (and but even now partially removed only by the erection of cesspools within the walls), must not only be prejudicial to the health of the prisoners, but also become a dangerous sanitary evil to the whole community.

“Recent events in Europe show how apt such causes as those referred to are liable to give rise to, and extend, epidemic and endemic diseases, and that from want of cleanliness, by sewerage and drainage, where large numbers are congregated together, the rich and higher classes are no more exempt from such diseases than the poor and needy.

## " IV. NUISANCES, &amp;c.

" I must now beg to refer to some dark sanitary spots in the City over which  
" at present the Corporation have no control, and for their existence that body are  
" not responsible.

" 1. The drainage from Darlinghurst Gaol continues still to flow into Palmer-  
" street, to the injury of the inhabitants there; open cesspools have been formed  
" within the Gaol walls.

" 2. The Dead House on the Circular Quay still remains, and will become an  
" unsightly object to the sailors, when they occupy the Home, close by.

" 3. The Tank Ditch still remains filthy and dirty, giving off its pestilential  
" effluvia.

" 4. In Parramatta-street may be observed a large reservoir of dirty water,  
" embanked up to supply the Sugar Refining Company's Works; this water is most  
" impure, being the drainage from the surrounding hills, and from a rivulet into  
" which the water from Messrs. Tooth's brewery and wool-washing establishment  
" empties. There is no means of letting this stagnant water off—no floodgates—the  
" only escape is by an overflow, which occurs only in very wet weather. It is very  
" evident, therefore, that this impure stagnant water, so dammed up, must be unfit  
" for any use in refining sugar, and that the miasmatic emanations produced must  
" become injurious to public health. It is quite time such a sanitary evil was  
" removed. The remedy is simple enough, but perhaps might be a little expensive."

(3.) Whether the Secretary for Public Works is aware that the open cesspools aforesaid, in the Gaol of Darlinghurst, are within a few yards of a water tank used for drinking and other purposes by the prisoners, and that no shelter of any kind has been made at the cesspools for privacy, or the protection of the prisoners from the vicissitudes of the weather, when resorting to such cesspools?

(4.) Whether the open cesspools aforesaid were made with the consent or approval of the Gaol authorities, viz. :—the Sheriff, the Visiting Magistrates, and the Medical Officer of the Prison, or of any one of those officers?

(5.) Whether any Report has been received from the Medical Officer of the Prison as to the probable effect of a large accumulation of night soil in the Gaol of Darlinghurst, during the summer months, on the health of the inmates, and of the residents in its neighbourhood?

(6.) Has the flow of night soil from the Gaol of Darlinghurst, over the neighbouring streets, been effectually stopped, as the City Health Officer reports on the 14th April, that at that time the nuisance was only partially removed?

(2.) Whether the Secretary for Public Works deems that the evil complained of has been adequately remedied by the recent construction alluded to by the Municipal Officer of Health in his Reports dated April 14th, 1862, and June 10th, as under

“Town Hall, Health Officer's Department,

“Gentlemen,—The duties of the City Health Officer, as laid down for his guidance in the Corporation Act, render it imperative in him to bring under the notice of the City Council ‘all nuisances or other local causes tending to produce, aggravate, or continue diseases, or otherwise injure the health of the inhabitants.’

“I therefore consider it my duty to bring under official notice, through the City Council, the objectionable sanitary condition of certain cesspools within the walls of Darlinghurst Gaol, which have recently been erected. They are very extensive, and are calculated to contain a large quantity of filth; are exposed to the open air, &c. The effluvia from them are already very perceptible within the walls of the Gaol, and, if not soon removed, will give rise to malaria, causing and extending zymotic diseases.

“These open pools of filth must, necessarily, rapidly fill, from the number of persons within the establishment; and when they require emptying, which must be frequent, will be productive of an intolerable nuisance throughout the whole neighbourhood.

“So long as Darlinghurst Gaol is without sewerage and drainage, this, and the previous nuisance, so often complained of (and but even now partially removed only by the erection of cesspools within the walls), must not only be prejudicial to the health of the prisoners, but also become a dangerous sanitary evil to the whole community.

“Recent events in Europe show how apt such causes as those referred to are liable to give rise to, and extend, epidemic and endemic diseases, and that from want of cleanliness, by sewerage and drainage, where large numbers are congregated together, the rich and higher classes are no more exempt from such diseases than the poor and needy.

It is quite time such a sanitary evil was removed. The remedy is simple enough, but perhaps might be a little expensive.”

“ So long as Darlinghurst Gaol is without sewerage and drainage, this, and the previous nuisance, so often complained of (and but even now partially removed only by the erection of cesspools within the walls), must not only be prejudicial to the health of the prisoners, but also become a dangerous sanitary evil to the whole community.

“ Recent events in Europe show how apt such causes as those referred to are liable to give rise to, and extend, epidemic and endemic diseases, and that from want of cleanliness, by sewerage and drainage, where large numbers are congregated together, the rich and higher classes are no more exempt from such diseases than the poor and needy.

## " June Quarterly Report.

## " IV. NUISANCES, &amp;c.

" I must now beg to refer to some dark sanitary spots in the City over which  
" at present the Corporation have no control, and for their existence that body are  
" not responsible.

" 1. The drainage from Darlinghurst Gaol continues still to flow into Palmer-  
" street, to the injury of the inhabitants there; open cesspools have been formed  
" within the Gaol walls.

" 2. The Dead House on the Circular Quay still remains, and will become an  
" unsightly object to the sailors, when they occupy the Home, close by.

" 3. The Tank Ditch still remains filthy and dirty, giving off its pestilential  
" effluvia.

" 4. In Parramatta-street may be observed a large reservoir of dirty water,  
" embanked up to supply the Sugar Refining Company's Works; this water is most  
" impure, being the drainage from the surrounding hills, and from a rivulet into  
" which the water from Messrs. Tooth's brewery and wool-washing establishment  
" empties. There is no means of letting this stagnant water off—no floodgates—the  
" only escape is by an overflow, which occurs only in very wet weather. It is very  
" evident, therefore, that this impure stagnant water, so dammed up, must be unfit  
" for any use in refining sugar, and that the miasmatic emanations produced must  
" become injurious to public health. It is quite time such a sanitary evil was  
" removed. The remedy is simple enough, but perhaps might be a little expensive."

(3.) Whether the Secretary for Public Works is aware that the open cesspools aforesaid, in the Gaol of Darlinghurst, are within a few yards of a water tank used for drinking and other purposes by the prisoners, and that no shelter of any kind has been made at the cesspools for privacy, or the protection of the prisoners from the vicissitudes of the weather, when resorting to such cesspools?

(4.) Whether the open cesspools aforesaid were made with the consent or approval of the Gaol authorities, viz. :—the Sheriff, the Visiting Magistrates, and the Medical Officer of the Prison, or of any one of those officers?

(5.) Whether any Report has been received from the Medical Officer of the Prison as to the probable effect of a large accumulation of night soil in the Gaol of Darlinghurst, during the summer months, on the health of the inmates, and of the residents in its neighbourhood?

(6.) Has the flow of night soil from the Gaol of Darlinghurst, over the neighbouring streets, been effectually stopped, as the City Health Officer reports on the 14th April, that at that time the nuisance was only partially removed?

## VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

FRIDAY, 1 AUGUST, 1862.

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment; the Speaker took the Chair.  
Paper:—Mr. Weekes laid upon the Table, Rotoru to Order, in reference to Travelling Expenses of Government Officers, made by the Legislative Assembly, on motion of Mr. Lucas, on 20th January, 1862.  
Ordered to be printed.
2. Alterations in Library Arrangements:—Mr. Cowper, on behalf of the Chairman, brought up the following Report from the Library Committee:—

“ The Library Committee of the Legislative Assembly have the honor to report  
 “ to your Honorable House that your Committee having, this day, in a  
 “ Conference sought by them with the Library Committee of the Legislative  
 “ Council, considered, conjointly with the latter, a proposal for certain altera-  
 “ tions in the Library arrangements, submitted by the latter to the former  
 “ Committee during the Session of 1861—the said Committees have agreed  
 “ conjointly to the following Resolutions.

“ Your Committee therefore beg to recommend that the said Resolutions be adopted  
 “ by your Honorable House, viz. :—

- “ 1. That, so far as practicable, all works, including the Journals of the Lords and  
 “ Commons and other Parliamentary Books of Reference, of which there is  
 “ but one Copy, be kept in the Parliamentary Library for use of the Members  
 “ of either House. In cases where there is a duplicate copy of any work, one  
 “ is to be kept in the Reading Room of each House for the exclusive use of  
 “ its Members.
- “ 2. That the annual vote for the Parliamentary Library be expended under  
 “ direction of the Joint Committee hereinafter mentioned, and that application  
 “ be made to the Government to place on the Estimates a sum not exceeding  
 “ £100 for each Reading Room, to be expended by the respective Library  
 “ Committees in the purchase of Standard Works of Reference, Newspapers,  
 “ Periodicals, Pamphlets, &c.
- “ 3. That the management of the Parliamentary Library be entrusted to a Joint  
 “ Committee, consisting of the Members of the Library Committees of the two  
 “ Houses, the presence of at least three Members of each such Committee  
 “ being necessary to form a Quorum; but that each Reading Room be  
 “ managed exclusively by the Library Committee of the House to which it  
 “ belongs.
- “ 4. That the President, if present, or, in his absence, the Speaker, be the Chairman  
 “ of the Joint Committee. In the absence of both those Officers, the Chairman  
 “ shall be appointed by the Members present.
- “ 5. That the meetings of the Joint Committee, or Library Committee of either  
 “ House, be convened by the Librarian, by order of the President or Speaker,  
 “ or on the requisition of two Members of any such Committee; and every  
 “ notice of any such meeting shall state the objects for which it is convened.
- “ 6. That the Librarian attend all meetings of the Joint Committee, or of the  
 “ Library Committee of either House, keep the Minutes of their Proceedings,  
 “ and carry out their directions, and be responsible for the Books in the  
 “ Parliamentary Library and Reading Rooms.
- “ 7. That, whenever the Joint Committee resolve upon any proceeding requiring  
 “ the sanction of the two Houses, the matter be reported to each House by one  
 “ of its own Members.

“ 8.

- " 8. That separate Catalogues be kept of the Books belonging to the Parliamentary Library, and to each Reading Room. That it be the duty of the Librarian to check the Catalogues at least once in every year, in order to ascertain that all the Books in the Parliamentary Library and in each Reading Room are in their places, or otherwise properly accounted for. After every such inspection the Librarian shall furnish to the Joint Committee, and to the Library Committee of each House, a list of any Books which may thereupon appear to be missing from the Parliamentary Library or either Reading Room, as the case may require.
- " 9. That there be kept in the Parliamentary Library and in each Reading Room a Loan Book, in which all particulars of the loan and return, or non-return, of Books shall be regularly entered; and an Order Book, in which all particulars of Books, Newspapers, Periodicals, or Pamphlets, which any Member of either House may desire to have added to the Parliamentary Library, or to the Reading Room of either House, shall be entered for the information of the Joint Committee or Library Committee, as the case may be.
- " 10. That whether in the case of the Parliamentary Library, or of either Reading Room, every Book, Newspaper, Periodical, or Pamphlet, be stamped and entered in its proper place in the Catalogue immediately upon its receipt by the Librarian.
- " 11. That the Librarian report annually upon the numbers and condition of the Books, &c., in the Parliamentary Library and in each Reading Room, distinguishing those added and those proposed to be added since last Report.
- " 12. That the Librarian be charged with the accounts of the Parliamentary Library and of each Reading Room, and with payment for all Books purchased or ordered under direction of the Joint Committee or Library Committee of either House."

Ordered, on motion of Mr. Cowper, to be printed.

3. Informality in Petition (*Point of Order*):—The Speaker, drawing attention to one of the two Petitions from Murrurundi, against the passing of the Matrimonial Causes Bill, presented on Tuesday, the 29th ultimo, by Mr. Dangar, and recorded in Entry No. 13 of the Votes and Proceedings of that day, stated that, since the reception of the Petition, it had been discovered to be addressed to the Legislative Council, and was therefore inadmissible by the Assembly. The Petition was accordingly returned to the Honorable Member who presented it, and the Entry alluded to discharged.

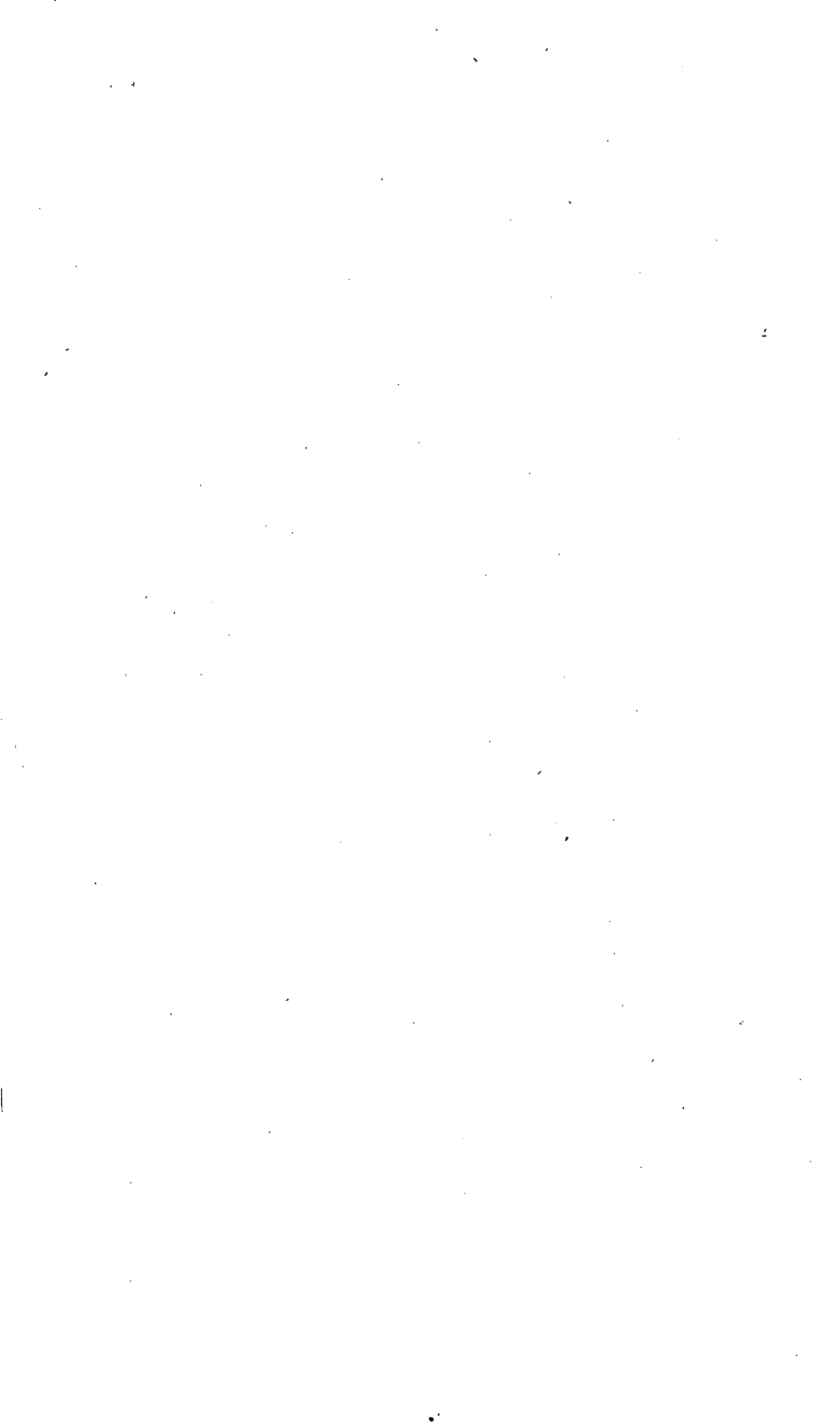

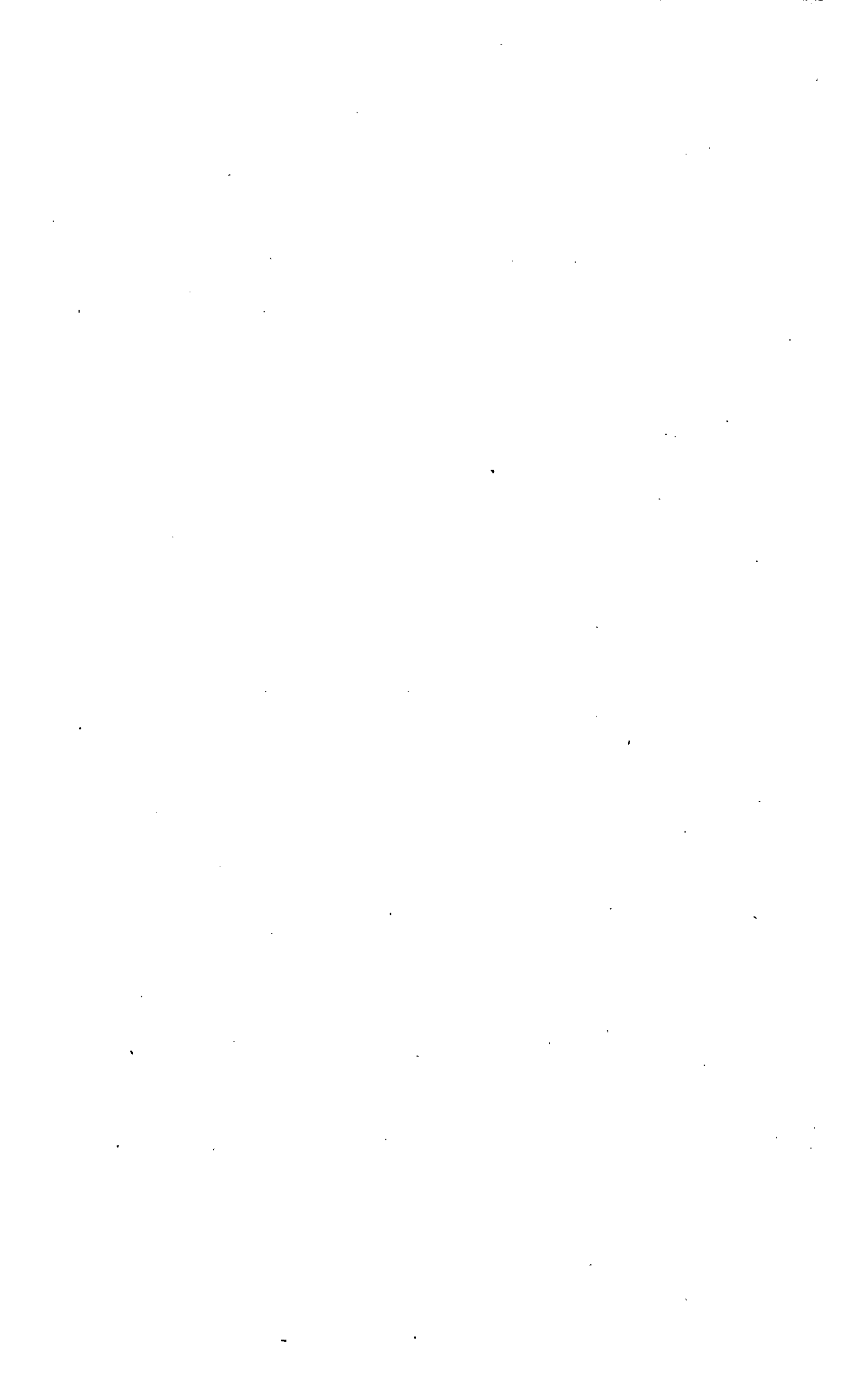

THURSDAY, 28 AUGUST, 1862.

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment; the Speaker took the Chair.  
Member of Legislative Council as Witness:—The Speaker reported that the following Message had been received, yesterday, from the Legislative Council:—

MR. SPEAKER,

In answer to the Message from the Legislative Assembly, dated the 27th August, requesting leave for the Honorable John Fletcher Hargrave, a Member of the Legislative Council, to attend and be examined before a Select Committee of the Legislative Assembly appointed "to consider and report upon the Bill to legalize the Exchange of a certain piece of Land in connection with the Scots' Church, in Jamison-street, Sydney," the Council acquaints the Assembly that leave has been granted to its said Member to attend and be examined by the said Committee, if he think fit.

2. Motion withdrawn:—Mr. Cowper, on behalf of Mr. Weekes, withdrew the Motion standing in the name of Mr. Weekes, No. 1 on the Notice Paper of Government Business for to-day.
3. Proposed Standing Order (*Division Bell—Minute Glass*):—On motion of Mr. Cowper, the Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the proposed Standing Order, in substitution for Standing Orders Nos. 4 and 5.  
The Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to the following proposed Standing Order, in substitution for the Standing Orders of this House, Nos. 4 and 5, viz.:—

"If, at any time after the commencement of the Business of the Day, notice be taken by any Member, or the Chairman of a Committee of the Whole report (whether upon Division or otherwise), that there is not a Quorum of Members present in the House or the Committee, as the case may be, the Sergeant-at-Arms, by direction of the Speaker, shall ring the Division Bell, and one of the Clerks Assistant at the Table shall simultaneously turn a Minute Glass; and, at the expiration of one Minute by the Glass, the Speaker shall count the House, and if there be not twenty Members present (exclusive of the Speaker), shall adjourn the House to the next day of Meeting: Provided that if, on any Division in the House, it appear, by the Lists handed in by the Tellers, that there is not a Quorum present, the Speaker shall adjourn the House at once, without the Bell being rung, or the Minute Glass turned."

Mr. Cowper then moved, That the proposed Standing Order, in substitution for Standing Orders Nos. 4 and 5, reported as agreed to by the Committee of the Whole, be now adopted as a Standing Order of this House.

Question put and passed.

Whereupon, Mr. Cowper moved, That the Standing Order, as so adopted by this House, be, by the Speaker, presented for approval to His Excellency the Governor.

Question put and passed.

4. Postponements:—The Orders of the Day of Government Business, Nos. 2 and 3, postponed, on motion of Mr. Cowper, to follow, consecutively, the Order of the Day of Government Business, No. 4.
5. Land Titles Declaration and Transfer Facilitation Bill, (Order No. 4 of Government Business):—Mr. Cowper moved, That the Speaker do now leave the Chair, and the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of this Bill. Debate ensued.  
Question put and passed.  
Whereupon, the Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into the said Committee.  
The Chairman having reported the Bill with Amendments, the House adopted the Report, and ordered the Bill, as so reported, to be read a third time on Wednesday next.
6. Coal Fields Regulation Bill:—On the Order of the Day, for the further consideration in Committee of this Bill, being read, the Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for such further consideration.  
The Chairman reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again at a later period of the day.
7. Disorder:—Mr. Piddington brought under notice, a disorderly proceeding which, during the usual period of retirement for refreshment, had just occurred in the Refreshment Room, and which had issued in the Honorable Member for Morpeth (Mr. Buchanan) having struck the Honorable Member for Mudgee (Mr. Terry); and appealed to the Speaker for interference in the matter, on the ground of the misconduct charged being a breach of the Privileges of this House.  
The Speaker stated that, as the disorderly conduct in question had not occurred in the House, or any of its Committees, he did not consider himself called upon to interfere in the matter.  
Mr. Buchanan then, rising in his place, proceeded to narrate the circumstances alluded to; and, in the course of his narrative, made use of an expression, in reference to Mr. Terry, to which exception was immediately taken by Mr. Speaker, who at once called the Honorable Member to order.  
Whereupon, Mr. Dick moved, That the words be taken down.  
Question put and passed.  
The Clerk then, by direction of the Speaker, took down the words excepted to, which were, as stated by Mr. Dick, at the instance of the Speaker, "all the more a Coward."  
The Speaker calling upon Mr. Buchanan to offer his explanation, and then withdraw;—the Honorable Member stated that he would, in order that the business of the Country might go on, withdraw the words—but would, outside the House, repeat them to the Honorable Member for Mudgee. Mr. Buchanan then withdrew.  
Mr. Dick requiring that the words taken down be read, the same were read by the Clerk accordingly, by direction of the Speaker.  
Whereupon, Mr. Dick moved, That the words, as taken down, are highly unparliamentary and disorderly, and ought to be retracted.  
Question put and passed.  
The Speaker directing the Serjeant-at-Arms to inform the Honorable Member for Morpeth that a Resolution had been passed in the matter in question,—the Honorable Member resumed his place, and the Speaker, addressing him directly, informed him of the Resolution of the House, and called upon him to retract the words.  
And the Honorable Member retracting the words—with a qualification,—  
And Mr. Hay objecting to such a retraction,—  
And the Speaker declaring that the retraction should be entirely unqualified,—  
Mr. Buchanan stated that he had already made an unqualified retraction.  
The matter was then allowed to drop.
8. Coal Fields Regulation Bill:—On motion of Mr. Robertson, the Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the further consideration of this Bill.  
The Chairman reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again at a later period of the day.  
(Disorderly Conduct):—The Chairman also reported that the Honorable Member for Morpeth (Mr. Buchanan) had repeatedly interrupted the business of the Committee, and, although called to order by him, had not desisted from such interruption, and had refused to sit down at his desire.  
The Speaker called upon Mr. Buchanan to explain, and the Honorable Member having addressed the House,  
The Speaker said that, as the Honorable Member had offered his explanation, it was for the House to take steps in the matter.  
Whereupon, Mr. Windeyer moved, That, in the opinion of this House, the Honorable Member for Morpeth is guilty of Contempt, in wilfully and vexatiously interrupting the orderly conduct of Business in this House.  
Question proposed.  
The Speaker then calling upon the Honorable Member to offer any explanation he had to make, and afterwards to withdraw,—  
Mr. Buchanan addressed the House, and then withdrew.  
Question then put and passed.

I avail myself of this opportunity to give expression to my deep sense of, and my thankfulness for, the high consideration I have always met with from the House. I have to offer my grateful acknowledgments for the assistance Honorable Members have always afforded me in maintaining the dignity of the Chair and the laws and usages of Parliament.

I am fully sensible of the great forbearance that has been extended to me in the discharge of the delicate and onerous duties which devolved upon me. But whatever my shortcomings may have been, I can assure the House that I have endeavoured to make myself well acquainted with, and to guide our proceedings according to, the practice of that great model to which we all look up, not only with respect, but with veneration—the British House of Commons.

I also think it but right, on this occasion, to acknowledge the assistance I have uniformly received from the Clerks at the Table. I cannot but bear testimony to the efficiency and the zeal with which they and all the officers of the House, discharge their public duties.

I shall through life retain the deepest sense of the honor which was conferred upon me in having been twice unanimously elected Speaker of this Assembly. I resign that office now, because, after my length of service within these walls, I wish for lighter duties—because I am desirous of still having a voice in the councils of the Country,—and because it may not be altogether out of place to show that the highest offices in the State may be well won, if not best won, by long and faithful service among the representatives of the people.

But I shall not leave this Assembly without great regret. Many of the most interesting recollections of my life, while I was yet young, are associated with the time, now nearly twenty years ago, when I first took my seat in this Chamber as an elected Member. I cannot easily forget the distinguished men with whom I was then associated. Of those, three only, Mr. Cowper, Dr. Laing, and Mr. Suttor, are still in the House. In those days our powers of Legislation were restricted. The Customs Department, the Surveyor General's Department, the Post Office, the administration of the Waste Lands, were all withheld from our control. In our powers “we were cribbed, cabined, and confined.” Schedules under the Constitution Act of that day appropriated large sums of the public money without our consent. But within those twenty years great reforms have been effected. All now is changed, the management of our local affairs rests absolutely

absolutely with ourselves. I for one have no fear for the future. The Legislation of the Country is sound. In the new position I am about to fill, I trust it may be in my power to act cordially with this House, and with greater activity and efficiency than I could manifest here, in promoting such measures as, founded on just principles, may be conducive to the general welfare.

After this night my voice will be heard no more in this Chamber; but when I leave it, my last words shall be the heart-felt expression of that prayer which was adopted by this House—and which I will take the liberty of extending also to myself—that the blessing of the Almighty may in our different spheres attend our Councils, and guide us to the happiness and prosperity of the people whose interests are committed to our care.

Mr. Cowper then, complimenting the Speaker on his past services, moved, That this House do now adjourn.

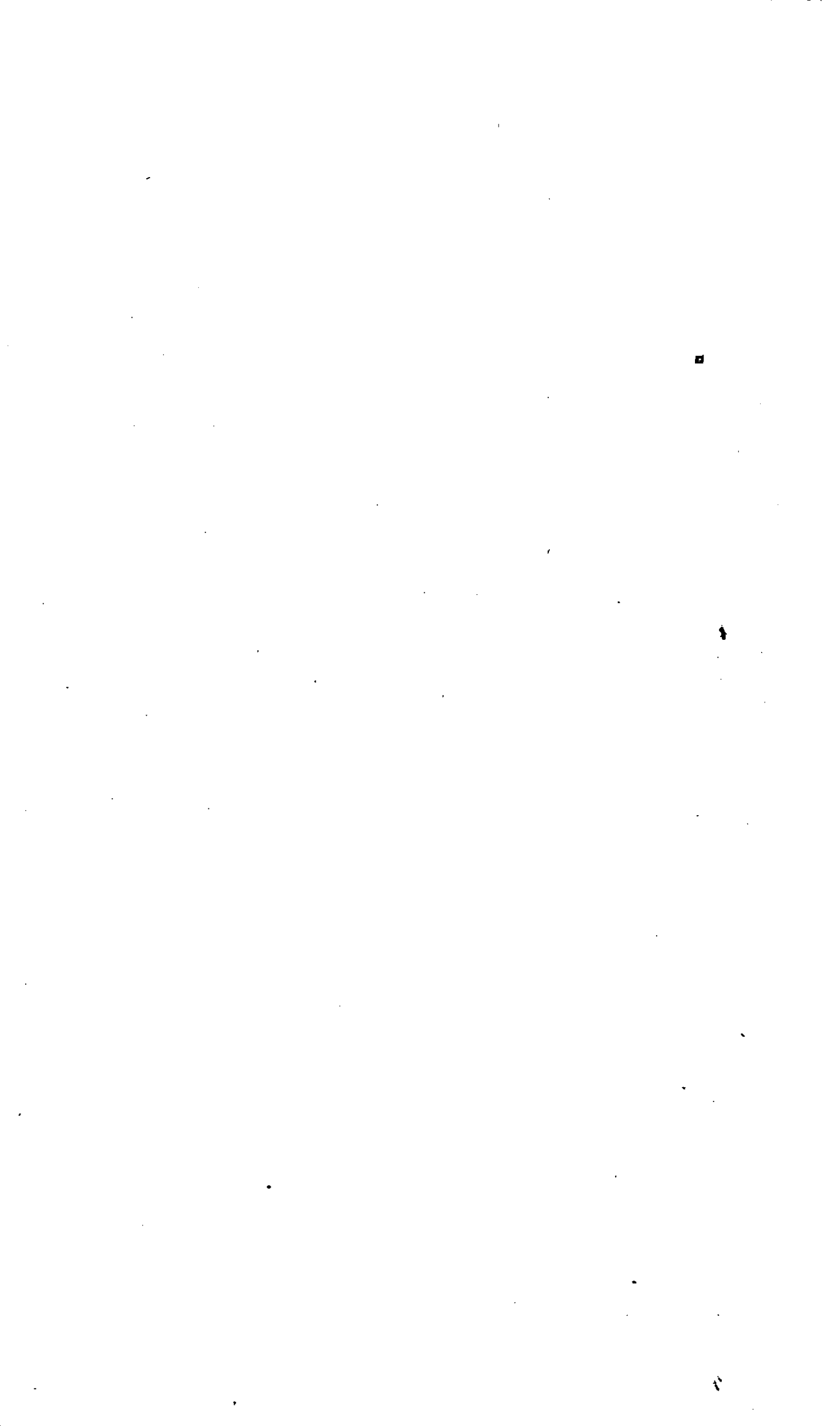

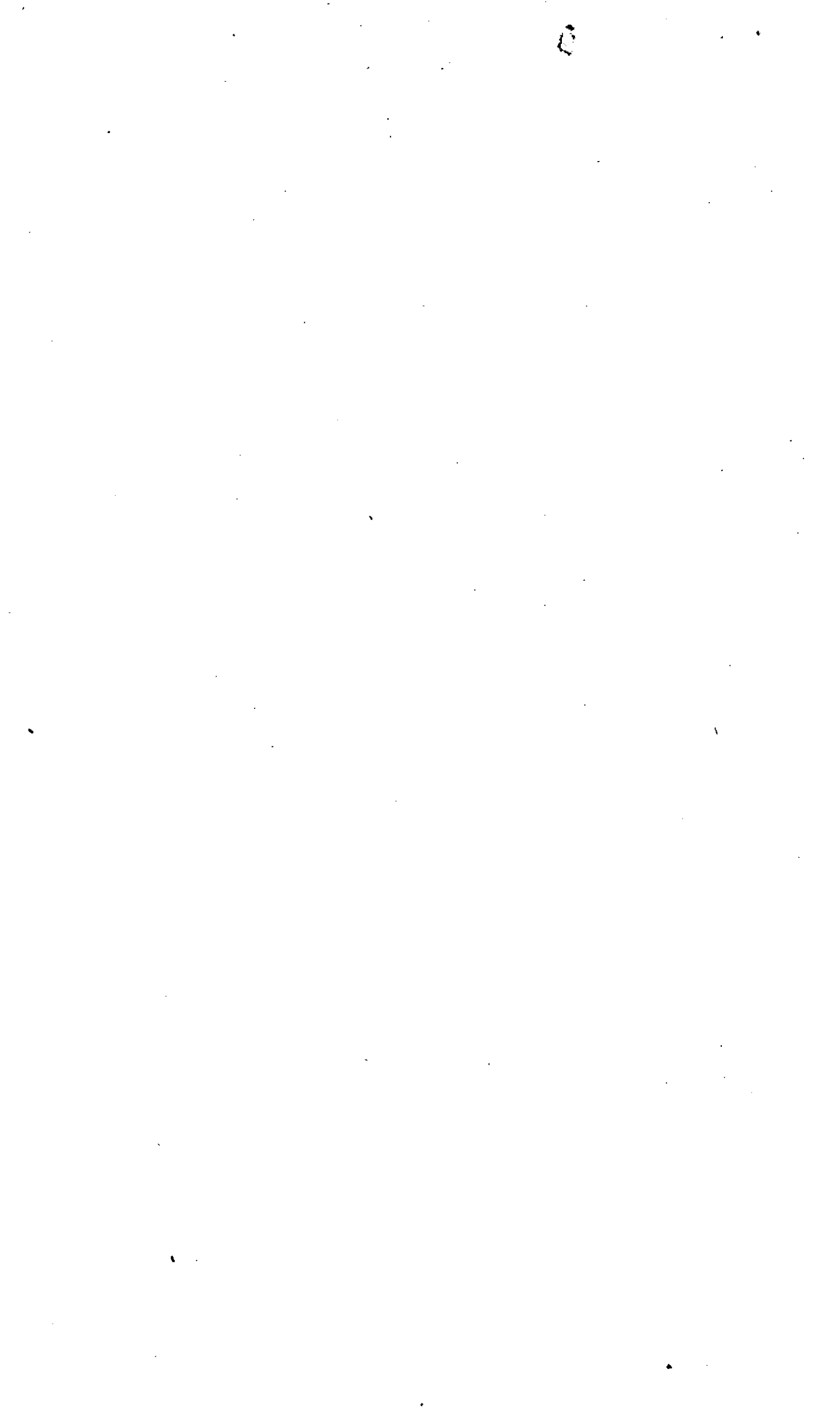

The Speaker overruled the objection, being of opinion that the Bill, although dealing with an existing charge upon the Consolidated Fund, did not impose any additional charge thereon beyond that which the law already sanctioned, and was therefore properly introduced into this House.

(*Privilege*) :—Mr. Morris then raised the question as to the power of the Legislative Council to Amend this Bill with reference to the analogous restrictions upon the House of Lords to alter Money Bills, of which class the Honorable Member considered this to be.

The Speaker said that this, though not strictly a Money Bill, and containing no greater charges or appropriation than those already authorized by law,—yet did contain provisions respecting a charge on the People ; and strict Parliamentary usage would appear to show that any Amendments made by the Council, the effect of which would be to alter the Appropriation provided in the Bill as it left this House, were objectionable, as an interference with the peculiar functions of the Representative Body.

In a similar case, the House of Commons would probably order the Bill to be laid aside ; when, if thought fit, a new Bill embodying the Amendments might be introduced. But, on some occasions, that Body had agreed to waive the point ; and it was for this House now to decide whether it would do so on the present occasion.

Mr. Cowper then moved, " That " the Speaker do now leave the Chair, and the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the Amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Morris moved, That the Question be amended by omitting all the words after the word " That," with a view to inserting in their place the words " the Bill be " laid aside."

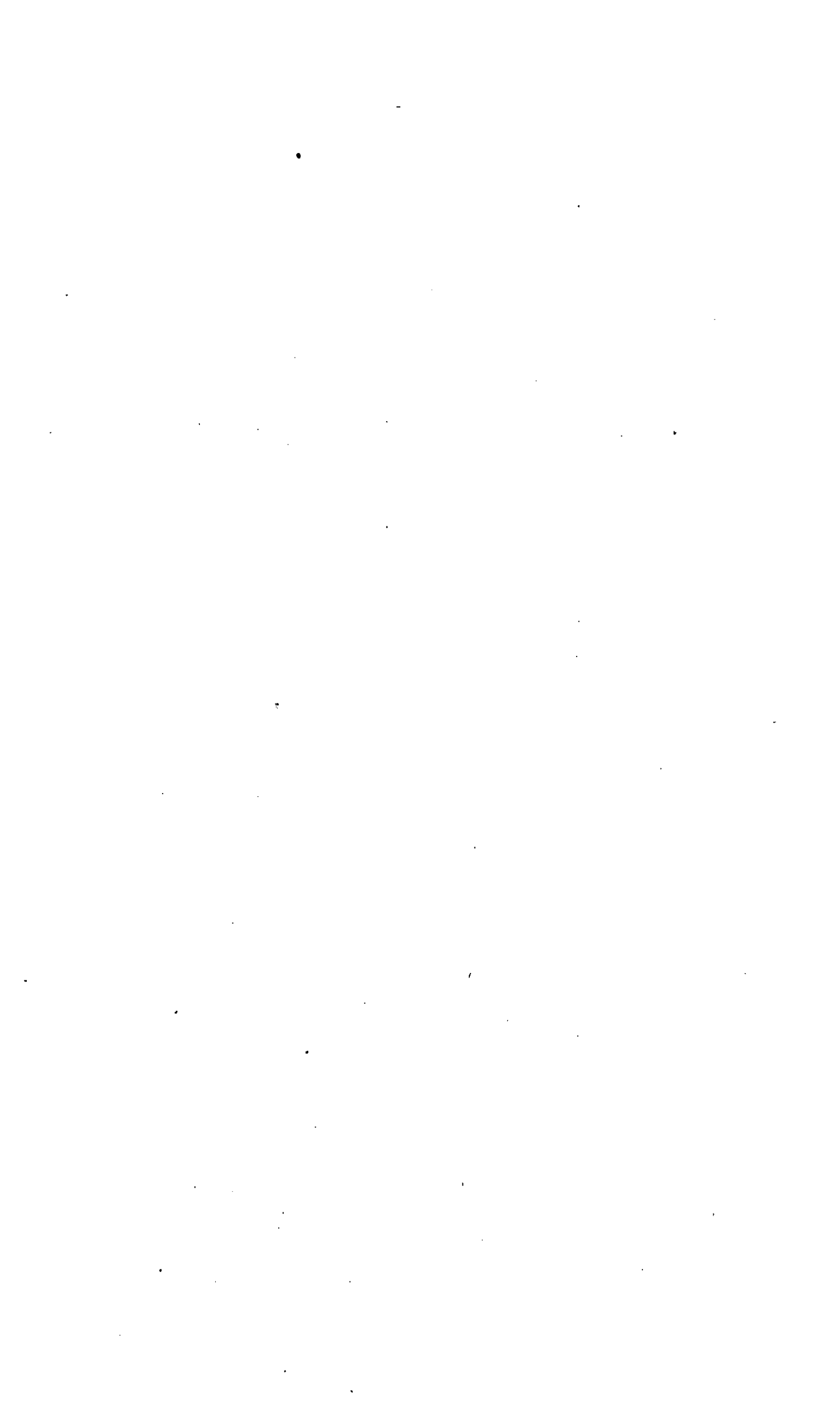

This could not be done with any portion of the Public Revenue.

He, therefore, considered it his duty not to decline putting the Question to the House ; though the case was, no doubt, one of considerable complexity.

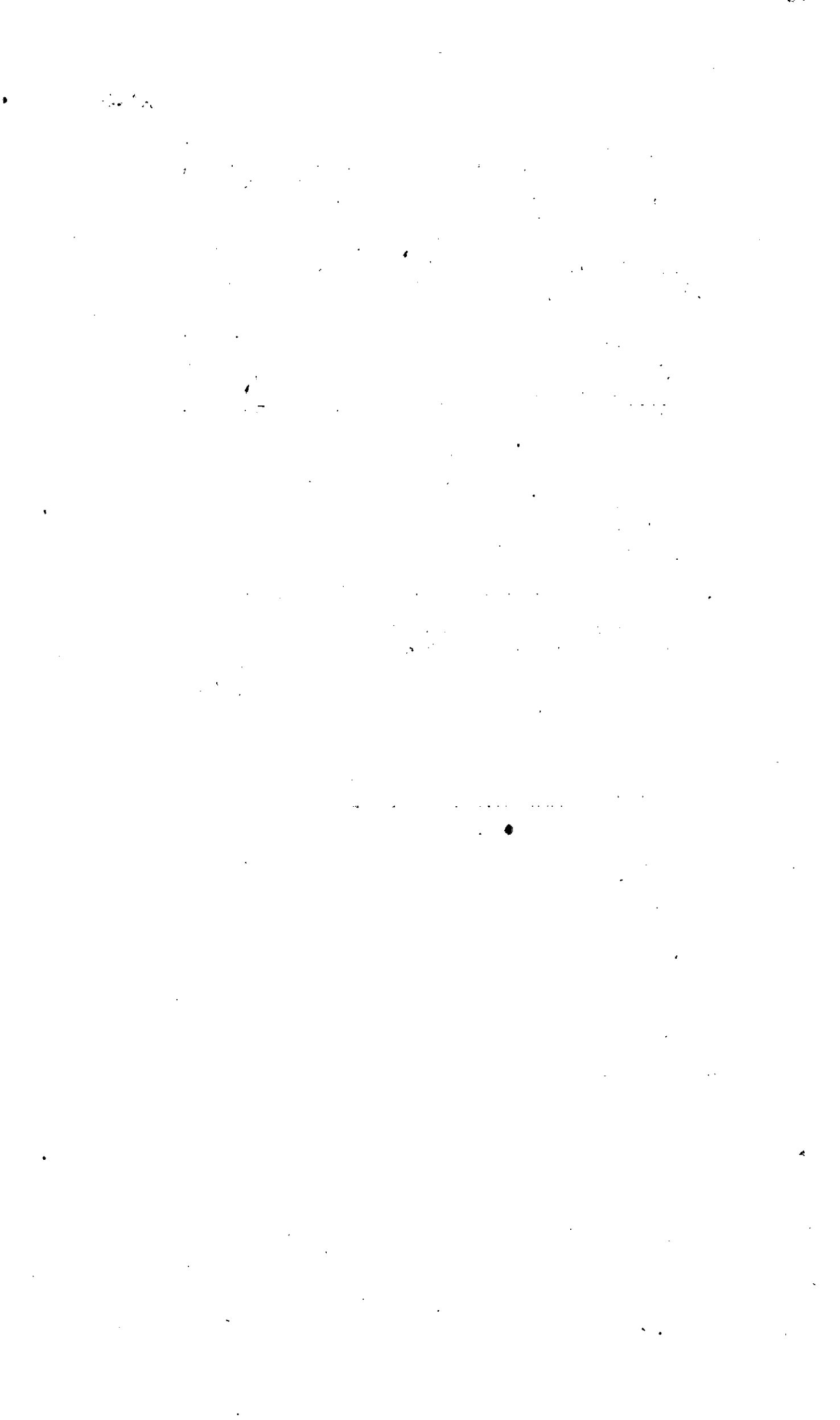

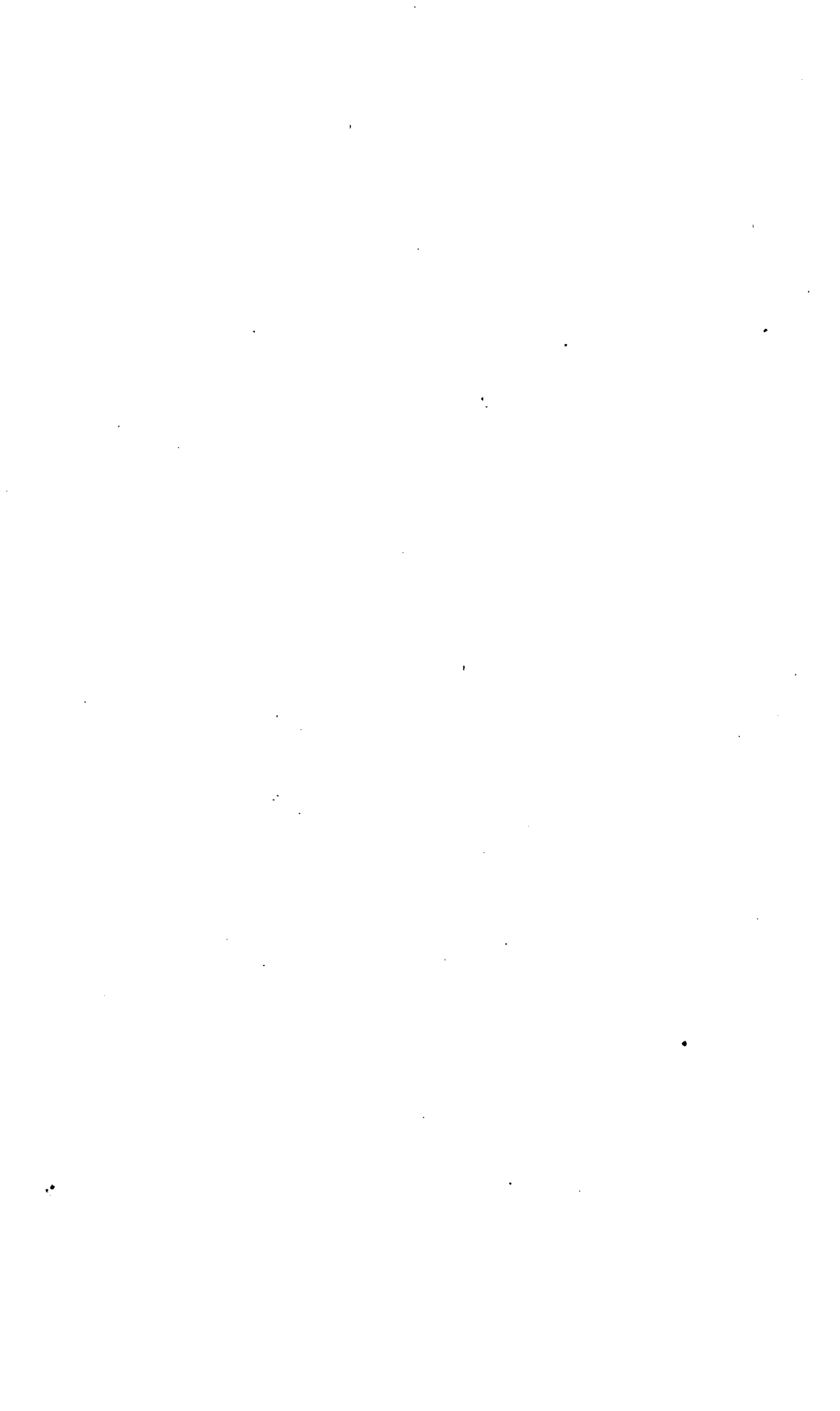

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment; the Speaker took the Chair.

Question of Privilege:—Mr. Garrett, drawing attention to the publication in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of this day's date, of a document headed "Parliamentary Paper," and purporting to be a Report from a Select Committee of this House now sitting in the matter of Mr. Thomas Charles Bentley, which Committee had not brought up any Report,—submitted that, in his opinion, such publication was a breach of the Privileges of this House.

And the Speaker explaining the practice of the Imperial Parliament in such cases,—Mr. Garrett moved, That this House, having had brought under its notice the publication in the *Sydney Morning Herald* of this day (the 20th December), of a document purporting to be the Report of a Select Committee of this House on the Petition of Mr. T. C. Bentley, is of opinion that such publication is a gross breach of the "Privileges of this House," and that the Clerk of Select Committees, the Government Printer, and the Proprietor of the *Sydney Morning Herald* be examined at the Bar, as to the publishing of the above document.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Morris moved, That the Question be amended by omitting all the words after the words "Privileges of the House."

4. Petition of Thomas Charles Bentley:—The consideration of this subject (*as recorded in Entry 2 above*) resumed.  
5. Black Rod:—The Usher of the Black Rod was admitted; and having delivered a Message, "That it is the pleasure of the Governor that this Honorable House do forthwith attend His Excellency in the Legislative Council Chamber," the House attended accordingly, and the Honorable the Speaker addressed His Excellency the Governor as follows:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

The Legislative Assembly has now voted the Supplies for the Service of Her Majesty, and also an amount for the purpose of enabling the Government to carry on certain Public Works. I have now the honor to present to your Excellency two Bills passed for this purpose, intituled, respectively, "An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain sums to make good the Supplies granted for the Service of the year 1862-3," and "An Act to enable the Government to raise a Loan for certain Public Works"; and, on behalf of the Members of the Legislative Assembly, elected by the people of this Colony, to pray that the Royal Assent may be given to these Bills.

6. Presentation of Bills:—The Honorable the Speaker then presented to His Excellency the two Bills specified in his Address (*recorded in the last preceding Entry*), and also the following Bills:—

(3.) "An Act to regulate the sale by retail of Wine Cider and Perry produced in the Colony."

(4.) "An Act to authorize the establishment of Bonded Distilleries and Bonded Sugar Houses."

(5.) "An Act for the better regulation of Coal Fields and Collieries."

(2.) "An Act to prohibit future grants of Public Money in aid of Public Worship."

9. Assent to Bills:—After which His Excellency was pleased to subscribe and declare his Assent, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, to the undermentioned Bills:—

(1.) "An Act to enable the Government to raise a Loan for certain Public Works."

(2.) "An Act to appropriate and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of New South Wales certain sums to make good the Supplies granted for the Service of the year 1862-3."

10. Prorogation Speech:—After which His Excellency was pleased to make to both Houses of Parliament the following Speech:—

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,  
AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

1. It affords me much pleasure to be enabled to terminate the Session of Parliament, and to release you from further attendance on your legislative duties, before the close of the year.

2. Long and arduous as the Session has been, it must be satisfactory to you to feel that your labours have been, in many respects, attended with interesting results, and that you have passed several measures of importance.

3. The question of State Aid to Religion has for years been the subject of much irritation; and should the Bill for Prohibiting Future Grants for Public Worship receive the assent of Her Majesty, I trust that the equitable settlement of this difficult question will put an end to religious agitation, which is always injurious to the social happiness of a community.

4. I congratulate you upon the passing of the Real Property Act, by which the great advantages of the system of Registration of Titles and Transfer of Landed Property, originally introduced into South Australia, are now extended to this Colony.

5. Among other Public Acts of importance may be enumerated the Coal Fields Regulation Act, the Queensland Debt Act, the Cotton Encouragement Act, and the Trustees and Mortgagees Act.

6. In addition to the Public Acts of the Session, several Private Acts have been passed which will have a most beneficial operation, more especially those for the Incorporation of Companies for the construction of Railways, and for working Coal Fields. I attach much weight to the development of the Coal Trade, the prospective value of which it is impossible to overrate.

7. The increased amount voted for the promotion of Immigration will, I hope, be the means of adding considerable numbers of virtuous and industrious families to our population.

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

8. I thank you for the provision which you have made for meeting the public expenditure, and assure you that the Supplies which you have granted shall be disbursed with judicious economy.

9. I have much gratification in stating that the Revenue continues steadily to increase, and, as compared with previous years, exhibits a satisfactory result.

HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,  
AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,—

10. Arrangements for the proposed meeting at Melbourne, of the Representatives from the various Australian Colonies, to consider the question of an Uniform Tariff, have been so far matured that it is expected to take place early in the ensuing year. It will be a matter for sincere congratulation if this Conference should result in a satisfactory adjustment of a question so largely affecting the material interests of the Colony.

11. A Drought, which however is as yet but partial, and which I trust will be temporary, is in some degree affecting the prospects of the Colony, and giving rise to apprehensions for the future. I earnestly hope that, by the favour of Divine Providence, so great a calamity as a lengthened period of dry weather may be arrested, and that we may soon be blessed with seasonable Rains.

12. I now prorogue this Parliament to Tuesday, the tenth day of February next.
