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Clerk's Foreword

The work of committees is essential to the Legislative Council's functions relating to reviewing legislation and providing an effective check and balance on the Executive Government. In the post-election period, Legislative Council committees returned to full operations, with a heavy workload for members and staff.

Policy-related inquiries by the Standing Committees have covered a broad range of subject areas, including community housing, pre-trial disclosure, the *Inebriates Act 1912*, and the commercialisation of science. Oversight-focused inquiries undertaken by the General Purpose Standing Committees have included examinations of the budget estimates, complaints handling within NSW Health, local government amalgamations, and serious injury and death in the workplace. The details of these committee activities and their outcomes are provided in this volume of the Annual Report.




Figure 1.1 Meetings and hearings – all Legislative Council committees 1999-2000 to 2003-2004

Figure 1.2 Public consultation – all Legislative Council committees 1999-2000 to 2003-2004





Figure 1.3 Output – all Legislative Council committees 1999-2000 to 2003-2004

- 1.1 The Procedure Committee was appointed on 1 June 2004 to replace the former Standing Orders Committee. Under new Standing Order 205, the Procedure Committee may:
 - consider on its own initiative any amendments to the standing orders,
 - propose to the House changes in practice and procedures of the House, and
 - consider any matter relating to the procedures referred to it by the House or the President
- The Committee met twice during 2003-2004. At the first meeting (as the Standing Orders Committee), the Committee concluded its consideration of the proposed new standing orders, commenced in 2002. Following the tabling of the Committee's report entitled *Proposed New Standing Rules and Orders*, new standing rules and orders were "trialled" as sessional orders, from 14 October 2003, so that their operation could be reviewed before they would be formally adopted and approved by the Governor. This represented the first major overhaul of the rules of procedure for the House and its committees since 1895. The new standing rules and orders are expressed in modern language, are gender neutral and more comprehensive than the former rules and incorporate all current practices and procedures.
- 1.3 In April 2004 the Procedure Committee met to consider the operation of the new standing rules and orders. The Procedure Committee tabled a report entitled *Proposed New Standing Rules and Orders Second Report*, as a result of which a small number of amendments were made to the new standing rules, and orders before they were adopted by the House.

- 2.1 The Privileges Committee was first established in 1988. Between 1995 and 2003 the Committee was known as the Standing Committee on Parliamentary Privilege and Ethics. The Committee performs a specialised role and has the following functions: to consider matters relating to parliamentary privilege referred to it by the House or the President; to consider citizen's rights of reply to statements made about them in the House; and to undertake functions relating to members' ethical standards under Part 7A of the *Independent Commission Against Corruption Act 1988*. The Deputy Clerk is the Clerk to the Committee.
- 2.2 During the year the committee tabled five reports, three of which concerned citizen's right of reply matters. The remaining two reports concerned an incident which occurred in December 2003 in which a search warrant was executed in the office of a member of the House by officers of the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC). The Committee's first report on the matter considered the impact of parliamentary privilege on the powers of external bodies such as the ICAC to seize members' documents, and recommended a particular procedure by which the issues of parliamentary privilege arising in that case could be determined by the House. The second report dealt with a dispute which had arisen as to the status of a small number of the relevant documents, and recommended that the House uphold the member's claim of the privilege in relation to the documents. Citizens Right of Reply

Terms of Reference

- 2.4 1. Any person who has been referred to in the house by name, or in such a way as to be readily identified, may make a submission in writing to the President, on any one or more of the following grounds, claiming:
 - (a) that they have been adversely affected:
 - (i) in reputation;
 - (ii) in respect of dealings or association with others;
 - (b) that they have been injured in occupation, trade, and requesting that they should be able to include an appropriate response in the parliamentary record.
 - 2. (1) Where a person makes a submission to the President, the President must, as soon as practicable, consider the submission and decide whether:
 - (a) to refer the submission to the Standing Committee on Parliamentary Privileges and Ethics (referred to as "the Committee") for the inquiry and report; or
 - (b) it is inappropriate to be considered by the Committee on the grounds that the subject matter of the submission is trivial, frivolous, vexatious or offensive in character.
 - (2) The President must inform the person in writing of the decision.
 - 3. Where a submission is referred to the Committee, the Committee may decide not to consider a submission referred to it if, in the opinion of the Committee, the subject matter of the submission is not sufficiently serious or is frivolous, vexatious or offensive in character. The Committee must report its decision to the House.
 - 4. (1) Where the Committee decides to consider a submission, the Committee may confer with, but not take evidence from any person, including:
 - (a) the person who made the submission; and
 - (b) any Member who referred to the person in the House.
 - (2) In considering any submission, the Committee;
 - (a) must meet in private;
 - (b) must not consider or judge the truth of any statements made in the House or in the submission;
 - (c) must not make public:
 - any minutes of proceedings;
 - (ii) any evidence; or

- (iii) any submissions, either in whole or in part, except in its report to the House.
- 5. In reporting to the House on a submission, the Committee may recommend:
 - (a) that no further action be taken by the House or by the Committee in relation to the submission; or
 - (b) that a response by the person who made the submission, in a form the words agreed to by the person and the Committee and specified in the report of the Committee, be published in the Minutes of the Proceedings or incorporated in Hansard, and must not make any other recommendation.
- 6. Any response by a person who made a submission and which is included in a report to the House:
 - (a) must be succinct and strictly relevant to the questions in issues;
 - (b) must not contain anything offensive in character;
 - (c) must not contain any matter where publication would have the effect of:
 - (i) unreasonably adversely affecting or injuring a person, or unreasonably invading a person's privacy, in the manner referred to in paragraph 1; or
 - (ii) unreasonably adding to or aggravating any adverse effect, injury or invasion of privacy suffered by a person.
- 7. In this resolution, person includes an unincorporated association, a corporation and a body corporate.

Outcomes/comments

2.12 On 4 December 2003, on the day after the report was tabled, the House substantially adopted the recommendations of the report concerning the procedure by which documents are determined as privileged. Subsequently the documents were examined and claims of privilege were made in relation to a number of them. The ICAC disputed the privilege status of some of these documents as provided for in the procedure adopted by the House.

Inquiry into the Home Building Amendment (Insurance) Act 2002

Government response

3.2 Due 2 March 2003¹². Received 16 September 2003. The Government response is available on the website.

Outcomes/comments

3.3 The Committee's report provided a comprehensive examination of the impact of the *Home Building Amendment (Insurance) Act 2002* on home warranty insurance, builders and consumers and made 16 recommendations. The New South Wales Government announced a broad inquiry into the home warranty insurance scheme in May 2003 and the terms of reference for that inquiry included consideration of the Committee's report. The Committee has since encouraged the Minister to consider its recommendations in the context of any review or implementation of a new scheme that the Government proposes. The Committee has also written to the Minister to express its concerns about the experiences of small builders under the scheme. The Government response is available on the website.

Inquiry into the Criminal Procedure Amendment (Pre-Trial Disclosure) Act 2001 – Stage One

Government response

3.4 Due 24 March 2003. Not received (see outcomes).

Outcomes/comments

3.5 The Government accepted the Committee's single recommendation to refer the same or similar terms of reference back to the Committee in the next session of Parliament. The Attorney General re-referred the terms of reference on 30 February 2004.

Outcomes/comments

3.7 The committee's report met with considerable support from stakeholders and community groups. The Committee's principal recommendation - the creation of a specialist Child Sexual Assault Court – was supported by the Government. On 18 November 2002, the Attorney

General announced that the Government would establish a Child Sexual Assault Court, and the Court began hearing cases at the beginning of 2003. The Government response is available on the website.

The Hon Peter Breen introduced his amended Bill, the State Arms, Symbols and Emblems Bill 2003, on 22 May 2003. The Bill passed both Houses and received assent on 2 March 2004. The Act takes up many of the Committee's recommendations.

Residential and support services for people with disability

Government Response

4.2 Due 14 May 2003. Received 19 August 2003.

Outcomes/comments

- 4.3 The Committee's final report for this inquiry, Making It Happen: Final Report on Disability Services was tabled on 14 November 2002. Two interim reports, The Group Homes Proposal and A Matter of Priority were released in December 1999 and December 2000 respectively. The inquiry, which commenced in September 1999, received 316 written submissions and heard formal evidence from 135 witnesses. In addition, the Committee held community consultations in regional and rural New South Wales that were attended by a total of 555 people.
- 4.4 The inquiry has been associated with a period of substantial structural reform within disability services in New South Wales and the allocation of significant additional funding to the sector.
- 4.5 The Government's response to *Making It Happen: Final Report on Disability Services*, Report 28, was tabled in the Legislative Council on 19 August 2003 and is available on the website.

2003-2004 Inquiries

Early intervention into learning difficulties

Terms of Reference

- 4.6 That the Standing Committee on Social Issues inquire into and report on early intervention into learning difficulties during the early childhood years (ages 0-8), including the following:
 - The appropriate role of parents, government departments, non-government agencies and educational organisations in the development, delivery and evaluation of early intervention programs.
 - The adequacy of roles and responsibilities and interagency cooperation around early intervention programs for learning difficulties in NSW.
 - The ways in which early intervention practice in NSW might be informed by practice in other States of Australia and overseas, including evidence of the impact of early intervention on child protection, juvenile justice and intensive education programs.
 - Research into world's best practice in developing effective strategies to increase awareness and responsibility for assisting families in parenting skills, identifying learning difficulties and early intervention.
 - Maximising the effectiveness of assessment and early identification in ensuring improved learning outcomes from schooling for children experiencing learning difficulties.
 - Support available to families and communities to enable them to be better able to assist their children with learning difficulties.
 - Any other relevant matters.

The primary emphasis of the Inquiry is on the evaluation and development of programs for children with learning difficulties who with appropriate early intervention would be able to achieve age appropriate outcomes throughout their schooling.

The public hearings and consultations were completed in the previous financial year. The report and inquiry were discussed and considered at seven of the deliberative meetings held during the year.

Outcomes/comments

- 4.10 Early Child Development: A Co-ordinated Approach: First Report on Early Intervention for Children with Learning Difficulties was tabled on 16 October 2002. The inquiry was interrupted by prorogation. The inquiry was re-referred to the Committee on 24 June 2003.
- 4.11 The final report Realising Potential: Final Report of the Inquiry into Early Intervention for Children with Learning Difficulties, Report 30, was tabled in the Legislative Council on 16 September 2003. The report included 36 recommendations to the Government, on topics such as early childhood health services, childcare and preschool services, school entry, support for families, class sizes and therapy services.
- 4.12 The Government response, tabled in the Legislative Council on 1 April 2004, indicated that a number of recommendations were being implemented. The Government advised that the Office of Children and Young People would review the policy framework for the Families First strategy, and that review will include an examination of the Committee's recommendations.

- 4.17 The *Report on Community Housing*, Report 31, was tabled by resolution of the House on 28 November 2003. The key themes of the recommendations centre around three main issues: strategic direction, sustainability and performance management.
- 4.18 The Government Response was tabled with the Clerk of the Parliaments on 28 May 2004. Inquiries completed prior to 2003-2004 – status of Government responses

Use and management of pesticides in New South Wales

Outcomes/Comments

- On 22 September 1999 the Committee tabled its report into the use and management of pesticides in New South Wales (Volumes One and Two) that included 48 recommendations. The inquiry and report were originally requested by the Minister for the Environment as a precursory analysis of the mechanism for the introduction of amendments to the *Pesticides Act* 1978. A substantial number of the Committee's recommendations were adopted in the revised Act (*Pesticides Act* 1999).
- 5.3 In correspondence received by the Committee on 22 November 1999 the Minister for the Environment specifically advised of his willingness to adopt recommendation number 46 of the Committee's report. As a consequence, the New South Wales Environment Protection Authority (EPA) will provide annual reviews to the Standing Committee concerning the progress and impact of implementing the *Pesticides Act 1999*.
- Accordingly, on 19 February 2001, 2 May 2001, 24 April 2002 and 3 February 2003, the Committee received reports from the Minister detailing progress on the implementation of the Act.
- 5.5 In April 2004, the Minister for the Environment forwarded the fourth and final annual review to the Committee. This report includes details of effectiveness of the *Pesticides Act 1999* and the *Pesticides Amendment (Records)* Regulation 2001, the level and nature of education and enforcement activity undertaken, and information on the pesticides that are available for use in New South Wales. The Minister informed the Committee that a statutory review of the Pesticides Act 1999 will be conducted in December 2004.

Outcomes/Comments

- 5.9 The Committee received 60 submissions, heard evidence from 36 witnesses, and conducted site visits to various sites in Sydney, the Riverina district of NSW and Brisbane. A significant aspect of the Committee's information gathering was the Cooperative Research Centres Forum for more than 70 leading scientists, researchers, State and Commonwealth Government representatives, teachers and PhD students.
- 5.10 On 17 December 2003 the Committee tabled the Final Report of its Inquiry into Science and its Commercialisation in NSW. The Committee made 14 recommendations in relation to its terms of reference. The key recommendations included:
 - broadening the Government's focus on science and innovation, including the focus of commercialisation

- establishment of an Office of the Chief Scientist
- establishment of a Ministry for Science and Medical Research
- increased focus on science in education
- a 'Science in Parliament' day
- further support for Cooperative Research Centres in NSW.
- 5.11 The report recognised the importance of commercialisation, but also that this must be matched with a commitment to basic research. The Committee also recognised the need for careful risk assessment whenever Government is supporting commercial opportunities.

Government Response

- 5.12 The Government's response was tabled on 22 June 2004. The Government accepted a number of the Committee's key recommendations including:
 - the establishment of a Ministry for Science and Medical Research
 - a review of the BioFirst Strategy
 - transfer of the Innovation Council to the Ministry for Science and Medical Research (formerly administered by the Department of State and Regional Development)
 - development of intellectual property management guidelines
 - convening a government taskforce to determine the direction of science and technology in education in NSW
 - the creation of a Cooperative Research Centre liaison position within the new Ministry
- 5.13 Since tabling their response, the Government has commenced organisation of the inaugural NSW Science in Parliament event, expected to be conducted over two days in October 2004.
- A number of other key recommendations are still under consideration. The Committee will endeavour to monitor these and report on any developments in the next financial year.

Port infrastructure in New South Wales

- 5.15 That the Standing Committee on State Development inquire into and report on port infrastructure in New South Wales and in particular:
 - the NSW Government Ports Growth Plan, including any planned closure of shipping freight facilities in Sydney Harbour,

Outcomes/Comments

- 5.18 The Committee received 98 submissions from a range of individuals, industry groups and community organisations. The NSW Cabinet Office made a submission on behalf of the Government. To date the Committee has heard evidence from 61 witnesses. The Committee also conducted site visits to the four areas at the centre of the Government's Ports Growth Plan: Newcastle, Wollongong, Port Botany and Sydney Harbour.
- 5.19 The Committee tabled an interim report on 28 May 2004. The report dealt specifically with one particular aspect of the inquiry, the proposed expansion of the Port Botany container terminal owned by Sydney Ports Corporation.
- 5.20 Much of the interest in the inquiry focused on the proposed expansion of the Port Botany facility. The Committee's decision to table an interim report on the proposed expansion was motivated by its concern that alternative proposals to the Sydney Port Corporation's

Environmental Impact Study and Development Application before an Independent Commission of Inquiry for evaluation, may have less impact on the environment and be more commercially competitive.

- 5.21 The Committee considered that, as the Commission of Inquiry was due to commence its public hearing process on Monday 31 May 2004, it was obliged to alert the Minister for Infrastructure, Planning and Natural Resources, the Hon Craig Knowles MP, that the current evaluation process available to the Commissioner may prevent all feasible models for expansion of Port Botany being appropriately evaluated. As a result, the Committee unanimously agreed to table an interim report on Friday 28 May 2004, which recommended the Minister ensure that any expansion of the Port Botany terminal facilities is only undertaken after the identification and rigorous evaluation of all viable alternatives, including the Sydney Ports Corporation proposal.
- On 31 May 2004, the Hon Craig Knowles MP advised the Commissioner to expand the Commission of Inquiry's terms of reference to reflect the Committee's single recommendation in its interim report. The Commission of Inquiry issued a public notice on 31 May 2004 announcing that the public hearings for the Commission of Inquiry would be postponed to a later date in order to allow public submissions and evidence to respond to the new terms of reference.

Outcomes/comments

- 6.15 The Committee's key recommendation in its report was for the introduction of new manslaughter laws under the *Crimes Act 1900* (NSW) to increase the responsibility of employers and corporations for ensuring the health and safety of their workers. The Committee also made a number of other recommendations in relation to the role and performance of WorkCover, the lead agency with responsibility for preventing and managing serious injuries and fatalities in the workplace in NSW. In particular, the Committee made a number of recommendations in relation to WorkCover's procedures for liaising with the victims and families of victims of workplace accidents.
- 6.16 The Government is due to respond to the Committee's report by 11 November 2004. However, in a press release on 17 May 2004, the day of the report's tabling, the Minister for Industrial Relations, the Hon John Della Bosca MLC, welcomed many of the recommendations of the Committee, and noted that the Government is already moving to implement many of them. In particular, the Committee notes that WorkCover is in the process of reforming its procedures for liaising with the victims and families of victims of workplace accidents.
- 6.17 In relation to the issue of industrial manslaughter, Mr Della Bosca released on 28 June 2004 the Report into Workplace Death, Occupational Health and Safety Legislation and Other Matters in NSW, prepared by a panel of experts in occupational health and safety and industrial law. In its report, the expert panel opposed the introduction of industrial manslaughter laws in the Crimes Act 1900 (NSW), but supported the introduction of an additional offence specifically relating to workplace fatalities in the Occupational Health and Safety Act 2000 (NSW).

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6.18 The Minister has further advised that he intends to take a recommendation on the issue of industrial manslaughter to Cabinet later in 2004 following further consultation with unions and employers.
