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Introduction

This paper summarises the results of the 2019 election for 21 members to serve in the New South Wales Legislative Council. The 2019 election was the twelfth since the introduction of popular election in 1978. It was the seventh for 21 members following the re-structure of the Council brought about by a 1991 referendum. It was the fifth since the abolition of group voting tickets following the 1999 'tablecloth' ballot paper election, and the first since group voting tickets were abolished for Senate elections in 2016.

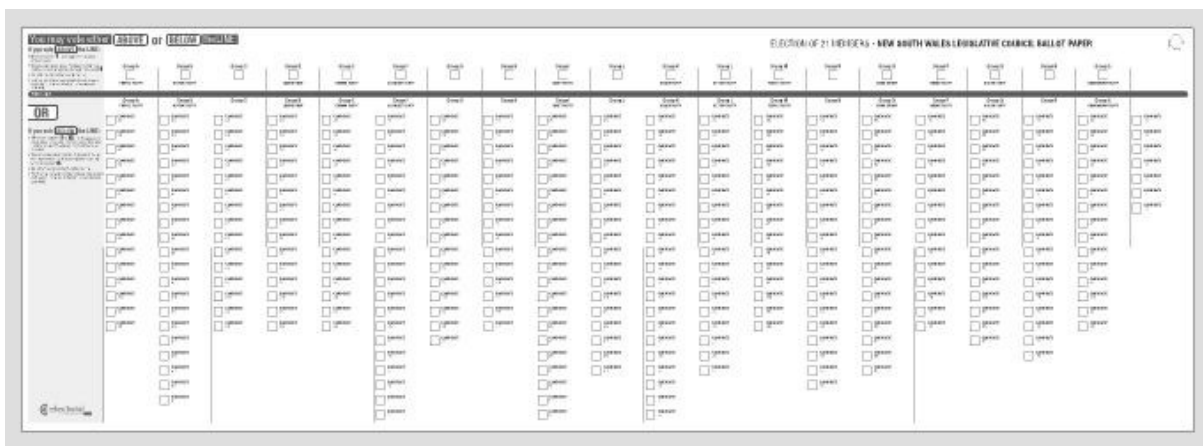
The electoral system used for the 2019 election has evolved over time. In 1978 New South Wales adopted the ballot paper and counting method then in place for the Senate. The one variation from the Senate system was a move away from full to semi-optional preferential voting. A minimum 10 preferences were required initially, increased to 15 after the 1991 Council re-structure.

Changes to the Senate's electoral system introduced in 1984 were subsequently adopted for Legislative Council elections. The 1988 election was the first to utilise group voting tickets and a divided ballot paper with 'above' and 'below' the line voting. Party names were included on ballot papers for the first time in 1991. A 1991 referendum also re-structured the Council to span two terms of the Legislative Assembly rather than three. The referendum increased the number of members to be elected every four years from 15 to 21 and reduced the quota from 6.25% to 4.55%. The first election for 21 Legislative Councillors was held in 1995.

A failure to update rules governing party registration led to an explosion of candidates and parties contesting the 1999 election. Many parties were related, and complex group voting tickets were lodged in a tactic that has become known as preference 'harvesting'. It produced a tablecloth sized ballot paper with 81 columns and 264 candidates triple-decked on ballot papers one metre wide by 700mm deep.

As a result of the 1999 election, group voting tickets were abolished ahead of the 2003 election and tougher registration rules introduced for parties. The divided ballot paper was retained but parties were required to nominate at least 15 candidates for access to an above-the-line voting square. A new form of above-the-line voting was introduced allowing voters to mark second and further preferences using the group voting squares. Voters could still vote for candidates below-the-line with a minimum 15 preferences.

The abolition of group voting tickets ended party control over between-party preferences. Combined with the tougher party registration rules, this reduced the number of columns on the ballot paper but increased the number of candidates. An example of the current ballot paper is shown below.



Between 2003 to 2015, more than 80% of voters continued to complete their ballot paper with a 1-only above-the-line vote. Only around 15% of voters used the new above-the-line preferences option, with fewer than 3% of electors voting below-the-line.

In the decade following the NSW changes, the problems that had afflicted the 1999 Legislative Council election began to arise at Senate elections. There was an increase in party registrations and candidate nominations, and preference 'harvesting' began to distort results. This culminated in the 2013 Senate election when the Australian Electoral Commission made magnifying sheets available to voters so they could read the increasingly small fonts on ballot papers.

In 2016 the Turnbull government altered the Senate's electoral system along similar lines to the steps taken in NSW. One significant difference concerned instructions for an above-the-line vote. Voters were instructed to mark at least six preferences above-the-line, though a savings provision allowed any vote with a valid first preference above-the-line to remain formal. In contrast to the high rate of 1-only voting at NSW Legislative Council elections, only around 5% of Senate ballot papers have been marked as 1-only above-the-line votes at Senate elections.

The 2019 Legislative Council election was the first since the Senate change were introduced in 2016. As is highlighted in Sections 2 and 3 of this publication, familiarity with the new Senate system induced a significant increase in voters marking above-the-line preferences on their ballot papers.

The Structure of this Publication

The publication begins with a broad overview of the election result before delving into greater detail on preferences, ballot paper completions, votes by party and party vote by electoral district.

- Appendix** examines prospects for the 2023 Legislative Council election

Statistical Highlights

- A total of 346 candidates contested the 2019 Legislative Council election, down from the record 394 candidates in 2015. There were 21 columns on the ballot paper, down from the record 25 under the current system in 2015. The 21 columns represented 20 groups, 19 with a group voting square, one without, and one column of eight ungrouped candidates. (See past records on candidates and groups contesting election, Table 7.4, page 83)
- The 2019 election was for Legislative Council positions last contested in 2011 when the Coalition won a landslide victory. Compared to the 2011 election, the Coalition lost three seats and the Greens and Christian Democrats lost one each. The Labor Party gained two seats, Pauline Hanson's One Nation won two seats on its return to NSW elections, and the Animal Justice Party gained one seat. (See membership changes, Table 1.3, page 6)
- The 2019 election was the first since 1981 at which the Christian Democrats (previously known as Call To Australia) failed to elect a member. It was the first victory for Pauline Hanson's One Nation since the party last contested a NSW election in 1999. Former Federal Labor Party Leader Mark Latham entered the Legislative Council as the lead candidate for One Nation. (See newly elected members, Table 1.5, page 7)
- As at previous elections under the current electoral system, 17 candidates were elected early in the count during the distribution of surplus to quota votes. The four final vacancies were filled at the end of the count by candidates with less than a quota of votes. (See Table 2.1 page 18)
- For the third election in a row, the distribution of preferences allowed a lower placed candidate to come from behind and win one of the final seats. As in 2015, the beneficiary of preference flows was the Animal Justice Party. (See Section 2, page 18)
- At the end of the count, the rate of exhausted preferences during the exclusion of final candidates from each group was 72.2%, down from more than 82% at the four elections since the current electoral system was introduced in 2003. This lower rate of exhaustion is almost certainly due to voters having more awareness of ATL voting with preferences from experience at the 2016 Senate election. (See Table 2.17 page 28)
- Only 2.7% of ballot papers were counted as 'below the line' votes, but this was the highest rate since 2003. As a percentage of all ballot papers, 69.7% of ballot papers were counted as single '1' ATL line votes, and 27.6% were counted as ATL votes with preferences. (See Table 3.1, page 29)
- The percentage of above the line votes with preferences increased from 15.3% to 27.6%, almost twice the rate recorded at previous Legislative Council elections. The most likely cause of this increase was voter experience with the new Senate voting system where voters are instructed to number at least six preferences above the line. (See Table 3.1, page 29)
- The parties with the highest proportion of above the line votes with preferences were Keep Sydney Open 47.3%, Socialist Alliance 43.2%, Greens 43.1%, Sustainable Australia 35.8%, and Australian Conservatives 35.5%. The group with the lowest proportion was Pauline Hanson's One Nation at 15.7%. (See Table 3.1, page 29)
- As in 2015, the Animal Justice Party won election after passing higher polling parties on preferences. Parties that helped elect Animal Justice had lower rates of exhausted ATL preferences, including the Greens (59.5%), Socialist Alliance (61.3%), Sustainable Australia (70.6%) and Keep Sydney Open (59.8%). (See Table 3.3 page 31)
- Conservative minor parties had higher rates of exhausted ATL preferences at the end of the count, including Shooters, Fishers and Farmers (81.2%) and the Liberal Democrats (82.0%). A major factor in the defeat of the Christian Democrats was weak flows of preferences on the exclusion of other right of centre political parties. (See Table 3.3 page 31)

- The 2019 election provided two instances of a party polling above 2% and failing to be elected. The Christian Democrats polled 2.28% (0.5003 quotas) and the Liberal Democrats 2.18% (0.4794 quotas). The Liberal Democrats were passed and excluded on preferences while the Christian Democrats reached 2.54 quotas but were the last excluded party. The only previous case of a group polling more than 2% and not winning was Pauline Hanson polling 2.41 quotas as an Independent in 2011 but being passed on preferences.
- In 2015 the Animal Justice Party polled 1.78% (0.29 quotas) and reached 2.12% (0.47 quotas) after preferences to provide the lowest vote for a winning party under the current system. In 2019 Animal Justice repeated the feat with the second lowest vote for a winning party. The party polled 1.95% (0.4286 quotas) and strong flows of preferences saw the party pass the Liberal Democrats and Christian Democrats to reach 2.74% (0.6018 quotas) and win one of the final four seats.
- The highest polling below-the-line candidates were all lead candidates on party tickets. By far the highest polling was Mark Latham (One Nation) with 18,021 votes, 5.9% of his party's votes. David Shoebridge (Greens) polled 11,421 votes or 2.6% of Greens votes. Lead Labor candidate Tara Moriarty polled 11,847 and lead Liberal Catherine Cusack 10,958, but both represented less than 1% their party's votes. The highest vote for a lower placed candidate was 4,438 for Penny Sharpe who was second on the Labor ticket. (See candidate votes in Table 1.6, page 8)
- Since 2003 the Legislative Council electoral system has elected 17 MLCs from filled party quotas at the start of the count. The final four vacancies at each election have not been filled until the final step in the distribution of preferences. High rates of exhausted preferences mean the final vacancies are almost always filled by candidates with less than a quota of votes. (See Appendix, page 84)
- Pauline Hanson as an Independent was defeated in 2011 despite polling more than a half a quota with 2.41% of the vote, the highest vote recorded for a candidate who was not elected. The Animal Justice Party in 2015 polled just 1.78% or 0.39 quotas to record the lowest vote for a successful candidate. (See discussion on electing candidate from partial quotas, p 88)
- The Liberal/National Coalition have recorded a higher vote at the last two NSW Senate elections than they did at the 2019 Legislative Council election. Labor recorded roughly the same vote at both elections, while the 2022 NSW Senate election suggests the Greens could win three seats in 2023. (See Appendix page 91)
- The last two NSW Senate elections suggest One Nation will win a seat. The Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party poll poorly at Senate elections but usually perform better at Legislative Council elections. (See Appendix page 91)
- Contesting its first state election in 2023, results for the last two NSW Senate elections suggest the Legalise Cannabis party is strongly placed to elect an MLC in 2023. (See Appendix page 91)

The 2019 Legislative Council election was conducted for the 21 positions last elected in 2011. Continuing members elected in 2015 remain in place until the 2023 election.

Changes in Council membership at the 2019 election are shown in Table 1.3. Ignoring party defections, the party changes compared to 2011 represent –

- a loss of three seats by the Coalition, two Liberals and one National
- a loss of one seat each for the Greens and Christian Democrats
- a gain of two seats by Labor
- a gain of two seats by Pauline Hanson's One Nation
- a gain of one seat by the Animal Justice Party

- Twelve members were re-elected in 2019, five did not contest re-election, and four were defeated
- Nine new members were elected, five being replacements for retiring or defeated members, including Damien Tudehope transferring from the Legislative Assembly.
- New members included One Nation's Mark Latham, who represented the seat of Werriwa in the House of Representatives 1994-2005 and served as Federal Labor Party Leader 2004-2005.
- Two continuing members of the Legislative Council resigned to contest lower house seats at the 2019 election. Labor's Lynda Voltz resigned and was elected as member for Auburn, replaced in the Legislative Council by Rose Jackson. National Ben Franklin resigned ahead of the 2019 election to unsuccessfully contest the lower house district of Ballina. He was re-appointed to his Council vacancy after the election.
- Shortly after his re-election in 2019, National Niall Blair announced his resignation and was replaced in the Legislative Council by Sam Faraway.
- Liberal Democrat candidate David Leyonhjelm resigned from the Senate to unsuccessfully contest the Legislative Council election.

Group Second Preferences

Large parts of the Legislative Council's electoral system is set out in Schedule Six of the NSW Constitution Act (1902). Schedule Six is constitutionally entrenched and can only be amended by referendum. The Schedule has always required a minimum number of candidates preferences, 10 from 1978 to 1991 and 15 since 1995. Schedule Six did not prevent the divided ballot paper and group voting tickets being introduced in 1988, but the minimum preferences requirement of Schedule Six forced group voting tickets to have a minimum 10 (later 15) preferences.

The electoral system changes introduced after the 1999 election retained the divided ballot paper but abolished group voting tickets. To meet the minimum preferences requirement, the new rules required groups and parties to nominate a minimum 15 candidates so that a single '1' above-the-line could be imputed as a formal vote for the required minimum 15 candidates.

However, Schedule Six does not include a provision for dealing with deceased or disqualified candidates. To avoid a group's ATL votes being declared informal if the group lost a candidate, parties are required to lodge a Group Second Preference that can be used to add extra preferences and insure the formality of ATL votes.

Group Second Preference have been lodged at every election since 2003 but to date have never been used. The 2019 register of Group Second Preferences is listed below for documentation. There is no requirement that registered how-to-votes correspond to Group Second Preferences .

Section 2 – Distribution of Preferences

First Preference Totals

Surplus Distributions - Counts 2 to 18

Of all formal votes cast at the 2019 election, 97.3% were completed using the above the line voting option, concentrating each party's vote with its lead candidate. On the tally of first preference votes, five groups had more than the quota. Count 1 elected the lead candidate of these five groups, their surpluses being distributed as preferences through Counts 2-6.

After Count 1, the distribution of surplus to quota votes was a process by which the party surplus trickled down each group's list of candidates, electing candidates in listed order. Once all filled quotas had been set aside with elected MLCs, a partial quota remained with the next candidate on each party's list.

The first 17 members were declared elected with a full quota of votes through these distributions during Counts 2 to 18. After count 18, the count proceeded by the successive exclusion and distribution of preferences from the lowest polling candidate. After the exclusion of all other candidates, the four remaining candidates were declared elected with less than a quota of votes at Count 343.

The order of election and count at which candidates were elected is shown in Table 2.1

Counts 2-18 declared elected and distributed the preferences of the first seven Liberal/National candidates, six Labor candidates, two Greens, and the lead candidates for Pauline Hanson's One Nation and the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party.

The NSW Legislative Council's electoral system makes it possible to calculate how many votes leaked out of each party's ticket during the initial stages of the count. As an ATL vote cannot leak out of a group, all preferences that leak at this early stage are derived from BTL votes for the group's lead candidate.

The net leakage of votes from the five over-quota parties, and where escaping preferences flowed, is shown in Table 2.2.

To explain Table 2.2 with reference to Labor leakage, six candidates were declared elected by count 18 as the Labor surplus trickled down the party's candidate list. A total of 1,567 votes leaked out of the Labor group during these distributions, all sourced from the 11,847 below-the-line votes for lead candidate Tara Moriarty. A total of 522 votes leaked to candidates in the Green group, another 155 to Liberal/National candidates, and lesser numbers to candidates of other parties.

The leakage of One Nation's preferences is of note. One Nation lead candidate Mark Latham recorded 18,021 BTL votes, the most of any candidate on the ballot paper. Taking account of the transfer value, this means about 6,114 of his BTL votes were distributed, and 3,056 leaked to other parties. That means around half of the personal BTL vote for Mark Latham went '1-Latham' and then 2 for candidates of other parties. The table shows those the preference destinations.

These leakages had no significant impact on the count. Even the relatively large leakage of One Nation preferences represented only 1% of the party's first preference vote. Note that the 84 votes leaking from the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party to the Socialist Alliance represents 'donkey' votes.

Summary of Counts 19 to 329

At the end of Count 18, no candidate remained with more than a quota of votes. The count switched at this point to the successive exclusion and distribution of preferences from the lowest polling candidates. Some notable counts were -

- Count 19 excluded the lowest polling candidates, David Walter of Advance (Group F), with 1 vote.
- Count 50 was the first to exclude a candidate with 10 votes.
- Count 89 was the first to exclude a candidate with 20 votes.
- Count 167 was the first to exclude a candidate with 50 votes.
- Count 220 was the first to exclude a candidate with 100 votes.
- Count 300 excluded Anthony Monaghan with 434 votes. Monaghan was the lead candidate of group H, a two-person group with no ATL voting square.
- Count 318 was the first to exclude a candidate with 1,000 votes.
- Count 323 excluded Danny Lim, the final Ungrouped candidate, who had 1,674 votes on exclusion. With only 8 candidates in the Ungrouped column, a formal vote required preferences beyond the Ungrouped column and only 20% of Lim's preferences exhausted, the highest flow being 14.6% to the Greens.
- Count 328 excluded James Jansson, the lead candidate in Group S, who held 3,254 votes on exclusion. Of his votes, 55.5% exhausted with the strongest flow to another party being 8% to the Greens.
- Count 329 excluded the second remaining Labor candidate, Julie Sibraa, who had 3,646 votes on exclusion.

By the end of Count 329, all candidates in Group H, Group S and the Ungrouped column had been excluded. From each of the other 18 columns on the ballot paper, only one candidate remained. All other candidates from these groups had either been elected or excluded. The total of votes for each remaining candidate included the surplus to quota ATL votes for groups that had already elected members, and all ATL votes for groups that polled less than a quota.

Between Counts 18 and 328, all between party preferences distributed had been BTL votes. With the 18 remaining candidates representing groups with an ATL voting square, all further preference distributions would be dominated by the preferences of ATL votes.

Details of Preference Distribution, Counts 329 to 343

Table 2.3 on the next page shows the totals by candidate at the end of Count 329. All votes are partial quotas, with filled quotas for the 17 elected candidates excluded from party totals and the change in vote columns. The descending vote order of the candidates had not changed from the ordering of partial quotas at Count 1, demonstrating that the distribution of below-the-line preferences has little impact on the order parties finish.

The final two columns in Table 2.3 show the change in party/group total votes since the tally of first preferences by party at Count 1, and the change since all filled quotas had been dealt with at Count 18. The change columns do not include the quotas set aside for elected candidates.

Count 340 excluded William Bourke of Sustainable Australia (Group C). Of his 74,967 votes (1.68%), only 63.1% exhausted, while 14.1% flowed to Animal Justice, 9.0% to Labor and 5.3% to Keep Sydney Open. The party had recommended second preference for Keep Sydney Open, but the structure of the how-to-vote with a fourth preference for Animal Justice appearing first possibly confusing voters.

This distribution was critical in changing the order of candidates, Emma Hurst of the Animal Justice Party passed David Leyonhjelm (Liberal Democrats) to sit in fifth place in the race for the final four seats, narrowly behind Paul Green (Christian Democrats).

Count 341 excluded Tyson Koh of Keep Sydney Open (Group N). Of his 92,945 votes (2.09%), only 56.4% exhausted, 20.9% flowed to Labor and 12.2% to Animal Justice, though Animal Justice had appeared higher than Labor on the party's how-to-vote. Keep Sydney Open preferences pushed Animal Justice's Emma Hurst ahead of both the Christian Democrats and One Nation, leaving her third in the race for one of the final four vacancies.

Former Senator David Leyonhjelm of the Liberal Democrats (Group O) was now the lowest polling candidate with 103,927 votes (2.33%). He was excluded at Count 342 and 78.3% of his preferences exhausted, the party not having recommended preferences on its how-to-vote material. This left Christian Democrat MLC Paul Green last of five candidates in the race to fill the final four vacancies.

Count 343 excluded Christian Democrat Paul Green (Group Q) without distributing the preferences from his 113,108 votes (2.54%). With only four candidates remaining to fill four vacancies, all four remaining candidates were declared elected.

The final four candidates were elected with less than a quota. In order of election, they were Wes Fang (National) on 0.7803 of a quota (3.55%), Mark Buttigieg (Labor) 0.7463 (3.39%), Emma Hurst (Animal Justice) 0.6018 (2.74%), and Rod Roberts (One Nation) on 0.5858 (2.66%).

Summary of Counts 329-343

The count description on the previous pages set out the preference distributions for the 14 parties/groups excluded between Counts 327 and 342. A consequence of the voting system used since 2003 is that most ballot papers exhaust their preferences at these late stages of the count. Table 2.17 (next page) summarises the overall flow of preferences between Counts 327 and 343.

A total of 476,667 ballot papers were distributed during these counts. Of these, 344,045 or 72.2% exhausted their preferences before reaching one of the final five candidates. Of the 132,632 votes that reached one of the final candidates, 44,646 flowed to Labor (9.4% of all votes, 33.7% of votes with preferences), 34,352 reached Animal Justice (7.2%, 26.0%), Liberal/National 25,604 (5.4%, 19.3%), One Nation 16,741 (3.5%, 12.6%) and Christian Democrats 11,109 (2.3%, 8.4%).

As discussed in the ballot paper survey in Section 3 (see page 29), the 2019 election saw a significant increase in the number of ATL ballot papers with more than a single preference. While 72.2% of ballot papers still exhausted preferences in the final stages of the count, the rate had been above 82% at every election since the current electoral system was introduced in 2003. It is likely that the new Senate electoral system, with ballot paper instructions to complete at least six ATL preferences, has encouraged more voters to express ATL preferences.

Of particular importance for the 2019 results, the rate of exhausted preferences was generally higher amongst right of centre parties distributed (Liberal Democrats, SFF) than for left of centre parties of different hues (Socialist Alliance, Greens, Voluntary Euthanasia, Sustainable Australia, Keep Sydney Open). These differential preference rates proved critical to Emma Hurst of the Animal Justice Party winning the final vacancy at the expense of Christian Democrat Paul Green.

Section 3 (see page 29) provides more analysis of preferences based on ballot paper research.

Comment: The percentage of ATL ballot papers with preferences rose from 15.3% in 2015 to 27.6% in 2019. The rate of 1-only ATL voting fell from 83.0% in 2015 to 69.7% in 2021. The 2019 election was the first since the current electoral system was introduced in 2003 at which the rate of 1-only ATL voting fell below 80%.

As noted earlier with Table 2.17, the likely cause of the increase in ATL preference voting is the new Senate electoral system, used by voters at the 2016 Senate election. The new Senate ballot paper's instructions are that a voter should indicate at least six ATL preferences. At both the 2016 and 2019 Senate elections, more than 90% of voters indicated preferences.

As noted in relation to the rate of preference exhaustion during the distribution of preferences (see Table 2.17), the rate of 1-only ATL voting was generally higher for right-of-centre parties than left of centre parties.

Comment: As noted in the previous section, the rate of exhausted preferences was higher for parties such as One Nation, Shooters, Fishers and Farmers, and the Liberal Democrats. The only right-of-centre party with a low rate of exhaustion was the Australian Conservatives (61.9%), producing a significant flow of preferences to the Christian Democrats. The failure of other right of centre parties to generate preference flows that was responsible for the Christian Democrats being passed by Animal Justice in the race for the final seat.

This contrasts with the Greens, Keep Sydney Open, Animal Justice, Socialist Alliance, and Sustainable Australia. These parties all had higher percentages of ATL ballot papers with preferences and produced the relatively strong preference flows that elected the Animal Justice Party to one of the final seats.

Table 3.2 shows only second preferences for each party. A better way to understand the final preference flows is by analysing the effective preferences of each party, as shown in Table 3.3.

An 'effective preference' is a ballot paper that reaches one of the remaining candidates at the end of the count. In the case of the 2019 NSW Legislative Council election, an effective preference was a ballot paper that reached one of the final five parties at Count 343 - the Liberal/National Coalition, Labor Party, Animal Justice, One Nation and the Christian Democrats. A ballot paper that did not reach one of these five parties had no effective preference and exhausted.

Table 3.3 below shows the effective ATL preferences for each party/group excluded between Counts 328 and 342. It differs from the summary of final preference distributions in Table 2.17 (page 28) by removing the intermediary distributions and by excluding BTL preferences. The five party columns in Table 3.3 are percentage of ATL destination preferences for the party listed in the second column. The final column shows the percentage of exhausted ATL ballot papers for each party.

Table 3.3 differs from the second preferences shown in Table 3.2 because it tallies the destination preference rather than simply the second preference. The Greens appeared prominently as a second preference party in Table 3.2, but as the party had been excluded by Count 342, many second preferences for the Greens flowed on to become effective preference for one of the final five parties.

Comment: Table 3.3 removes the intermediary preference flows discussed in Section 2 and summarised in Table 2.17 (page 28). The totals in Table 3.3 are close to the values in Table 2.17, with differences accounted for by Table 3.3 excluding below the line votes.

As noted in previous tables and is evident again in Table 3.3, the rate of exhausted preferences amongst right of centre parties played a significant role in the Christian Democrats being defeated by Animal Justice in the race for the final seat. With the exception of Australian Conservative preferences, all the stronger flows of preferences were to Labor and Animal Justice. The flows to the Liberal/National Coalition, to One Nation and the Christian Democrats, were much weaker due to higher rates of exhausted preferences.

Comment: Table 3.4 shows the relationship between how-to-votes and the number of preferences recommended by parties. The highest rates of 1-only voting were recorded for parties that recommended a 1-only vote. The Liberal/National and Labor groups also had high rates of 1-only ATL voting and much lower rates of BTL voting. The parties at the bottom of the list that recommended preferences and all had much higher rates of ballot papers with preferences.

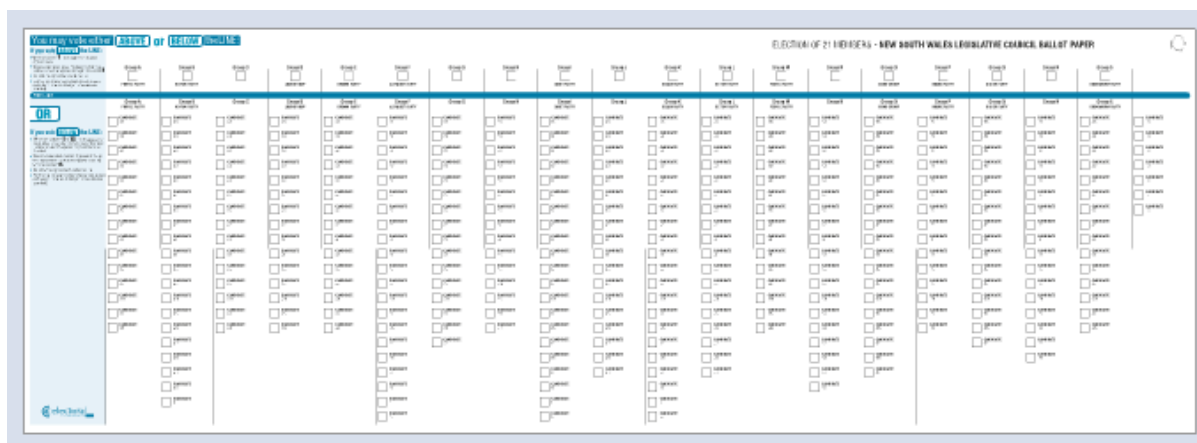
Changes of Party names

- The Open Party was known as Keep Sydney Open at the 2019 election
- The Voluntary Euthanasia Party contested the 2019 election but has since changed its name in merging with the Reason Party, a party registered to contest Victorian and Federal elections.

The NSW Legislative Council Ballot Paper and Voting Instructions

- The NSW Legislative Council has been popularly elected from a single state wide electorate since 1978. Between 1978 and 1991, 15 members were elected to serve three terms of the lower house. Since 1995 there have been 21 members elected serving two terms of the lower house.
- **The quota for election is 4.55%**, one twenty-second of the vote. The quota was 202,325 votes at the 2019 election and will be slightly higher in 2023.
- A candidate's quota for election can be made up of first preference votes and votes received as preferences. Preferences can come from two sources, surplus to quota preferences from elected candidates, and preferences transferred from excluded candidates.
- The Legislative Council ballot paper is divided into two areas. (See sample ballot paper below). Electors can vote 'above-the-line' for groups and parties by numbering the printed group voting squares, or 'below-the-line' by numbering boxes next to candidate names.
- Parties and groups are allocated fixed columns on the ballot paper. Allocation of columns is decided by random draw for position after the close of nominations. Columns are given a letter 'A', 'B', 'C' etc left to right across the ballot paper.
- Candidates who choose not to be grouped appear in the final "Ungrouped" column. Positions in the Ungrouped column are determined by random draw.
- Columns for registered parties have party names appear above-the-line next to the group voting square. **Independents and non-party groups do not have a name appear above the line.**
- When voting above-the-line, a voter must number at least one square for a formal vote. Further preferences are optional. This differs from the new Senate system where ballot paper instructions are to complete six preferences. The abolition of group voting tickets in 2000 means that parties can no longer control between-party preferences. The only between-party preferences that count are those completed by voters.
- **When voting below-the-line, voters must number at least 15 squares.**
- **A party must nominate at least 15 candidates to have a group voting square printed above-the-line.**
- A single '1' marked above-the-line is imputed to be an ordered sequence of preferences for the group's candidates below-the-line with preferences in the order the names are printed.
- An above-the-line vote with preferences is imputed to be for the candidates of the first-choice party in order listed, then the second-choice party's candidates in order listed, and so on for further above-the-line preferences.

Some Statistics on Voting at the 2019 Election

- The information below is taken from the 2019 Ballot Paper Survey in Section 3. (See page 29)
- In 2019, ballot papers with a single '1' vote above-the-line made up 69.7% of formal ballot papers. Another 27.6% were above-the-line votes with a further preference sequence, and 2.7% of votes were below the line votes.
- The rate of informal voting in 2019 was a very high 6.35% and above 10% in seven districts with high concentrations of voters whose first language is not English. The majority of informal votes were blank ballots and the informal rate in most districts was twice that recorded for the lower house. (See Table 4.1, page 33)
- The rate of above-the-line voting with preferences nearly doubled in 2019, probably due to voter experience with the new Senate system in 2016.
- Since the 2019 election, NSW electors have voted twice at elections using the new Senate electoral system. **It is likely that the number of above-the-line votes with preferences will increase significantly at the 2023 NSW election.**
- The single '1' above-the-line vote rate varied by party, the lowest rate being 47.9% for the Socialist Alliance and the highest rate 78.2% for Pauline Hanson's One Nation. The by-party rates of Above and below-the-line voting, with or without preferences, can be found in Table 3.1 on page 29.
- If a ballot paper is examined for preference distribution and does not have a further preference for a candidate remaining in the count, it is said to 'exhaust' its preferences and can play no part in filling further vacancies.
- In 2019 the high rate of exhausted preferences for right-of-centre parties on exclusion, and the relatively lower rate for left-of-centre parties, played an important part in the electing the Animal Justice Party to the final vacancy ahead of the Christian Democrats.
- For more information of ballot paper completion, preference flows and exhaustion rates, see the 2019 preference count explanation in Section 2 (page 18) and the ballot paper survey in Section 3 (page 29).

Electing Candidates with Filled Quotas

- While voting and especially counting is conducted as a contest between candidates, the Legislative Council count is better understood by first accumulating candidate votes into party totals and looking at the race as a contest between parties.
- The overwhelming majority of votes held by a party are initially held by the lead candidate of each party group. Leakage of preferences out of party tickets during the distribution of preferences is negligible given fewer than 3% of votes are completed below the line.
- Rather than express party totals as votes or percentages, it is easier to understand the contest by converting party votes to quota totals.
- For example, at the 2019 election, the Liberal/National Party Coalition ticket polled a total of 1,549,751 votes or 34.82% of the formal vote. Including both above and below the line votes, 99.5% of the group's vote was held by the lead candidate at the start of the count.
- Expressing the party total as quotas, the Coalition had 7.6597 quotas on first preferences. This total tells you the Coalition will elect seven MLCs and transfer down the ticket a residual or partial quota of 0.6597.
- In 2019 the Christian Democratic Party polled 101,328 votes or 2.28%. Of those votes, the lead candidate held 99.3%. The votes equated to a partial quota of 0.5008 for the lead candidate.

- The Legislative Council count proceeds at Count 1 by declaring elected the lead candidate of groups with more than a quota of votes. In 2019 there were five parties with more than a quota of votes on first preferences whose lead candidates were declared elected on the first count.
- The next stage of the count distributes the surpluses of the elected lead candidates. This involves the surplus of the lead candidate trickling down each party's ticket and electing further candidates until the point where no remaining candidate on any ticket holds a full quota.
- In the case of the Coalition ticket, the 7.6597 quotas sees one quota of votes put aside for the elected lead candidate, and around 6.65 quotas transferred to the second candidate. The partial quota drops slightly due to leakage of preferences. After the second candidate is declared elected, 5.65 quotas are transferred to the third candidate, and the process continues until seven quotas are set aside and the partial quota of around 0.65 is transferred to the eighth candidate on the Coalition ticket.
- At the five elections since the current electoral system was introduced, 17 candidates have been elected by this trickle down of filled quotas.
- Table A.4 below breaks down elections since 2003 and shows the party composition of members elected by filled quotas early in the count, and the party composition of members elected from partial quotas after the distribution of preference.

Electing Candidates from Partial Quotas

- After all votes for filled quotas have been set aside, the count proceeds to by excluding the lowest polling candidates and distributing preferences. Until very late in the count, this involves the exclusion of lower order candidates on party tickets. Most of these votes fold upwards to the lead candidate for each group and so do not alter the party totals significantly.
- In 2019 there were more than 300 exclusions and distributions of lower placed candidates. Once all lower placed candidates had been excluded and distributed, the partial quotas for the 18 remaining groups were barely changed from Count 1 and all groups were in the same descending order of partial quota they had been after the count of first preferences. (See Table 2.3 page 21)

- Once all lower order candidates have been excluded, the only candidates that remain in the count are lead candidates for parties and groups that polled less than a quota, or the next candidate on the list for groups that polled more than a quota. For example, the remaining Coalition candidate was the eighth candidate after the election of seven members from filled quotas.
- The overwhelming majority of votes for candidates at this stage of the count consisted of above-the-line votes, held either as the lead candidate of a group, or sourced from the partial quota passed down a party ticket from elected candidates.
- At every election since the current system was introduced, the final four seats have been filled by remaining candidates at the end of the count once all others had been excluded. Only one of the 20 final candidates, Christian Democrat Fred Nile in 2007, reached a quota after preferences. Several others may have reached quota had the preferences of the final excluded candidate been distributed rather than the final seats being declared filled without distribution.
- The high rate of exhausted preferences advantages parties that begin the count with the largest partial quotas as it is difficult for a trailing candidate to catch and pass a leading candidate with so many preferences exhausting. At the 2003 and 2007 election, preferences had no impact, and the final four vacancies were filled by the parties that began the count with the largest partial quotas.
- At the last three election, preferences did change the party composition of the final seats filled.
- **In 2011, preferences allowed the third Greens candidate and eleventh Coalition candidate to pass Pauline Hanson (Independent) on preferences.** Hanson had begun the count with a larger partial quota than both the Greens and Coalition.
- **In 2015 the Animal Justice Party passed the higher polling No Land Tax Party on preferences to win the final seat.**
- **In 2019 the Animal Justice Party won the final seat by passing two parties that began the count with larger partial quotas, the Liberal Democrats and the Christian Democrats.**
- Table A.5 (next page) sets out the electoral fate of all parties to begin the count with initial partial quotas above 0.39.
- **A rough rule is that parties with a partial quota above 0.5 (2.28%) have a good chance of election, though parties above 0.5 have missed out on election twice, and five that began with less than 0.5 have been successful.**
- **The highest partial quota for a defeated candidates was Pauline Hanson (Independent) on 0.53 quotas or 2.41%.** Hanson also had the highest partial quota after preferences for a defeated candidate, reaching 0.56 quotas or 2.53%.
- Hanson was beaten narrowly by the Coalition who began on 0.49 quotas (2.22%) and reached 0.56 quotas (2.56%) and the Greens who began on 0.45 quotas (2.03%) reaching 0.57 quotas (2.59%). The Coalition victory over Hanson was by just 1,306 votes at an election where the quota was 185,274 votes.
- **The lowest successful partial quota was 0.39 (1.78%) by the Animal Justice Party in 2015.** The party reached 0.47 quotas (2.12%) passing the No Land Tax Party that began on 0.42 quotas (1.90%) and finished on 0.45 quotas (2.12%), the lowest count after preferences for a successful candidate.
- The second lowest successful partial quota was also Animal Justice with 0.43 quotas (1.95%) in 2019, doing better on preferences to reach 0.60 quotas (2.74%). Animal Justice passed both the Christian Democrats beginning on 0.50 quotas (2.28%) and the Liberal Democrats 0.48 (2.18%).
- The expected higher rate of above-the-line preferences in 2023 could increase the importance of preferences, though parties beginning the count with a higher partial quota will still be advantaged. Against this, the increase in preferences at Senate elections has not had a significant impact on changing the party elected to the final seat.

Commentary

- Held just seven weeks after the 2019 state election, the Coalition's vote at the senate election was almost four percentage points higher than at the 2019 Legislative Council election. The result would have delivered the Coalition a ninth seat using the Legislative Council quota.
- Labor's vote was almost the same at both elections, the Greens about one percentage point lower but still electing two members.
- Support for both One Nation and the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers was considerably lower at the 2019 Senate election and only One Nation would have elected an MLC based on the Legislative Council quota.
- One Nation had a higher profile lead candidate in Mark Latham at the 2019 Legislative Council election compared to the Senate election.
- The Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party have always polled more strongly at NSW Legislative Council elections than Senate elections.
- The Help End Marijuana Prohibition party has since been re-named Legalise Cannabis and will contest the 2023 NSW election. The party polled well enough at the 2019 Senate election to be in the race for the 21st seat based on the Legislative Council quota.

Commentary

- Despite the defeat of the Morrison government, the Coalition still polled two percentage points higher than at the 2019 Legislative Council election and would have still won eight seats based on the state quota.
- Labor polled only slightly higher in 2022 compared to 2019 and would still have elected seven MLCs.
- A repeat of the Greens' 2022 NSW Senate result could see the party elect three LCs for the first time since 2011.
- One Nation's support was down on the 2019 result but would still be enough to elect an MLC.
- Support for the United Australia Party was enough to elect an MLC but the party is not registered to contest NSW elections.
- Legalise Cannabis would have a strong chance of election based on its 2022 Senate result.
- Animal Justice polled around the same support it has attracted at the last two NSW Legislative Council elections. As at those elections, the party would have competed to win one of the final Legislative Council positions on preferences.
- The Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party have always polled more strongly at NSW Legislative Council elections than Senate elections.
